

Editorial Items.

Hon. A. N. Richards is now spoken of as Chief Justice of Manitoba, in place of Governor Morris.

It is stated that Mr. Auger, an Advocate, will oppose Mr. Cauchon in the county of Montmorenci.

The banquet in honor of the Reform victories at the recent Ontario elections, will be held in the Music Hall, Toronto, on the 8th of January, the opening day of the Legislature.

The St. Thomas Home Journal says that Mr. Thos. Hodgins, M. P. P. for West Elgin, has been offered the position of Referee in the Court of Chancery.

The sudden return of the Hon. M. Langevin to Quebec is said to have been occasioned by a fresh breaking out of the Cauchon difficulty.

The recent decisive action of the Quebec Legislature in connection with the Cauchon-Chauveau jobberies is having its results, which will probably lead to the permanent advantage of the Province.

Hon. Wm. McDougall, on his return from England, it is said, will take up his abode in Ottawa, whether as a member of the Government or not is, of course, not known at present.

After a violent and protracted debate the French National Assembly has rejected by a vote of 409 to 201, the petitions for its dissolution.

The Canadian Pacific Railway. The following is the exposition of the arrangement made of the settlement of the Pacific question, taken from the Ottawa Times (Government organ):

It would have saved the Government much trouble and responsibility if it had been found possible to bring about the amalgamation of the two rival companies, the 'Interoceanic' and the 'Canada Pacific,' and to accomplish this object no effort was spared by the Government.

But on its proving impossible, negotiations were opened with leading men of both companies, and the result has been an agreement to raise the necessary capital among the people of Canada, and to submit to such restrictions as will prevent the danger which has been apprehended, that the control of the road and of the lands would fall into the hands of foreigners interested in a rival project.

We understand that the Board of Directors is to consist of thirteen members—five from Ontario, four from Quebec; and one specially selected to represent the interests of each of the other Provinces of the Dominion. The stock will be distributed in the same proportion, it being part of the scheme to open books and offer to the general public in each Province, the entire amount, it being understood that no director shall be allotted more than one hundred thousand dollars worth of stock.

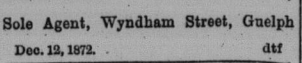

Mr. Banks has moved a Bill in the American House of Representatives not only to increase the President's salary from \$25,000 to \$50,000 per annum, commencing on the 4th of March 1873, but also to extend the term of office of the Vice-President and President from four to six years, and rendering the latter ineligible for a second term.

A bill has been brought into the Quebec Legislature to make the salaries of public officials liable to seizure, to the amount of one-fourth thereof by any creditor. The law as it stands protects the salaries of all servants of the Crown from seizure for debt. When the bill above referred to was given notice of to the Quebec Legislature, the Premier is reported to have proposed that all public officials' notoriety in debt would be punished by dismissal from office.
