



Haul Of Ten Fishing Boats

Canadian Cruiser Curlew Makes Seizure of American Craft In N. B. Waters.

Charged With Illegal Work and Heavy Fines are Imposed.

The Most Important Episode of the Kind for Years.

Eastport, Me., Nov. 28.—Ten American fishing craft, including eight sailing vessels and two steamboats, have been seized by the Canadian fisheries protective cutter Curlew and fined for illegal fishing in Canadian waters off a tributary of Passamaquoddy bay, near St. George, N. B. The fishing craft were taken to Eastport on Sunday night. Three specific charges were preferred: That they had fished on Sunday; that they had fished in Canadian waters; and that they had used illegal gear.

It is understood that the fines will be paid and that the entire matter will be disposed of without involving any international questions. The aggregate value of the craft is estimated to be \$20,000. The seizure is the most extensive that has been made by a Canadian cruiser for some years.

Washington, Nov. 28.—The American state department officials do not expect any issues between the governments of Canada and the United States arising out of the seizure of American fishing vessels by the former's cutter Curlew.

In the London instance the question has been raised and the vessels were released, but in the case of the Curlew, the seizure was sufficient to make it a matter of controversy a matter of diplomatic negotiations.

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 28.—Hon. R. Prefontaine, Canadian minister of marine and fisheries, arrived in this city tonight on board the Canadian cruiser Curlew. The minister is on a trip of inspection on the great lakes.

Minister Prefontaine was handed a batch of official dispatches when he landed at the front. He is expected to receive the same in the afternoon. Among them were telegrams relating to the seizure of American fishing vessels by the Curlew.

London, Nov. 28.—The foreign office has issued the following English translation of the declaration signed at St. Petersburg by Sir Charles Hardwicke, British ambassador, and Count Lamsdorff, Russian minister of foreign affairs.

"His Britannic Majesty's government having agreed to enter into the international convention of inquiry established by the Hague convention articles 9 to 14 of the Pacific settlement of international disputes, the task of elucidating by investigation the questions of fact connected with the incident which occurred during the night of October 21-22, 1904, in the North sea, in the event of the firing of guns on a fishing vessel, is hereby undertaken by the two governments, and the undersigned, being duly authorized, have agreed upon the following provisions:

"Article I.—The international commission of inquiry shall be composed of five members (commissioners), of whom two shall be officers of the British and two of the Russian navy, and one shall be a neutral member chosen by agreement between the two governments above mentioned; in the event of no agreement being arrived at, the selection of the fifth member of the commission shall be made by the two governments in agreement with the Emperor of Austria and King of Hungary, and the two high contracting parties shall likewise appoint a legal adviser to advise the commissioners, and part in the labor of the commission.

"Article II.—The commission shall inquire into and report all circumstances particularly on the question as to where the responsibility lies and the degree of blame attaching to subjects of the two contracting parties, or to subjects of other countries, in the event of their responsibility being established by the inquiry.

"Article III.—The commission shall follow the details of procedure which it deems proper for the purpose of accomplishing the task with which it has been entrusted.

"Article IV.—The two high contracting parties undertake to supply the commission with all the means and facilities necessary to enable it to acquire its information and to execute its task correctly and in due time.

"Article V.—The commission shall assemble in Paris as soon as possible after the signature of this agreement.

"Article VI.—The commission shall present its report to the two high contracting parties, signed by all the members of the commission.

"Article VII.—The commission shall vote by a majority of a majority of the members of the commission, and the expense of the commission shall be borne by the two high contracting parties in equal shares.
