Liberal Toryism. The new Montreal liberal journal calls

In other words the Times wants Mr. Maoson to repeat Mr. Letellier's coup d'etat. The advice is not likely to be accepted even if Mr. Masson's party sympathies did not stand in the way. The punishment which the British government allowed the dominion government to visit on Letellier's head will keep all other governors from attempting to exercise the power they were supposed to have under the confederation act of forcing an appeal to the

But we call the Times' attention to another aspect of this matter. With the best intentions Mr. Letellier made a huge tactical blunder when he dismissed the De Boucherville government. Mr. Joly was able to maintain himself in power for a few months and put the finances and public works of the province in shape, but this was no sooner done than he was driven out, and the last state of Quebec has been worse than the first. All that can be done for any self-governing people is to leave them alone. If they will keep in power corrupt politicians who allow their friends to plunder the treasury they must be left to bear the burdens im posed by their own folly. Those who sow the wind sooner or later reap the whirlwind.

More important still is the rank toryism of the Times' appeal, which ought not to be endorsed by the Quebec liberals. Let us have no whining in this country. If the ministry in office are doing wrong show them up. The facts can be got at through the agency of legislative machinery. Let them be enforced and if the people choose to go on cherishing a brood of vampires, they must be left to their idols. No heroic remedy applied by a lieutenant-governor can save them.

**Rusiness and Polities.** The suspension of a large wholesale house, with pretty large liabilities, is on narrowest. the face of it a commercial event. The whole fabric of an expected gigantic business for many years to come, with at least reasonable profits attached, has disappeared like a vision of the Arabian nights. The deed has been done by Mr. Ross, of course with the approval of Mr. Mowat and the rest of Sir John, and who can say all evil and his colleagues. It is something quite out of the ordinary course of business; it is done by a government, not by a bank or by another commercial house. And it has about it the complexion of politics quite as much as of business, looking only at the relations between the suspended firm and the local government. But the event in question may lead to others, of a far more pronounced political character. The elder Campbell, we believe, started in business as the agent of the Nelson publishing firm in Edinburg, and has been substancially the agent of that firm ever since, to a greater or lesser extent.
