Poison Sprinkled on a Dead Man's Vital Organs

TO FASTEN A CRIME ON A WOMAN.

Proof That George Scealey of Vienna Was Not Murdered.

An Analysis Shows That He Died from Found to Justify the Conclusion That He Died from Poison-An Elgin Mystery Which Science Unravelled - An Effort To Be Made to Discover the

was ordered and the remains of Scealey, exhumed. The stomach and portions of the liver and kidneys were submitted to a provincial analyst at London. Provincial Detective Greer was given charge of the case. He found the post mortem had been slovenly conducted

The report of the analyst also showed that there was an enormous quantity, of the poison in the body.

A Second Analysis.

The detective's suspicions were aroused that the poison was sprinkled on the kidneys and hver after the body had been exhumed and the organs removed. That in fact a conspiracy existed to fasten the crime of murder on the woman Best, although Scealey had died from natural causes. But the parties to the conspiracy betrayed themselves by their stupidity at the crucial moment.

Those instrumental in having the body, exhumed claimed that Scealey was slowly poisoned by parties who would benefit by his death. Scealey had no suspicion that he was being done to death. He could not see these atoms when they, passed his lips—they imparted no taste that enabled him to know. His senses were not acute enough to perceive the meksengers of death as they struck him down. These were the pleas set forth. But Detective Greer knew something about the actions of poisons. Arsenic when administered passes off through the kidneys in 45 minutes, and only a few traces are found after death. There was too much poison found in Scealey's body.







TO BE COMPLETED IN 1899.

New Court House Has Already Cost \$700,000 - Architect Lennox Enter-tains the Council. tains the Council.

The City Council, with a number of officials, ex-aldermen and contractors were the guests of Architect Lennox at the Court House yesterday. Two hours were pleasantly spent in inspecting the works and at luncheon. The host was called on for a speech and gave a short history of the progress of the building since he first took hold of it in 1885. Many chairmen had come and gone since then. Ald. Walker, first, who secured the site; then Ald. Hastings, who pushed along the plans; Ald. Hunter, who put a hole in the ground; Ald. Jones, who put through the scheme of combined buildings; Ald. Gibbs, who let the contracts; Ald. Small, who saw the construction commence and the difficulties with the contractor arise, and finally Ald. Crawford, the present chairman, to whom much of the present progress was due.

whom much of the present progress was due.

There had been no boodling, either, in connection with the Court House and not one cent of money wasted. Comparisons had been instituted between the building and the new Parliament buildings. Both edilices would cost about the same. \$1,300,000. The Court House covered 61-2 the one would be 104 feet high at the highest point, the other 93 feet. The cube of one was 81-2 million cubic feet, of the other 7 million cubic feet, it would thus be seen that the Court House was the cheaper of the two, although it had been said that the Parliament buildings was the cheapest edifice on this continent.

Since Architect Lennox took charge in the fall of '92, 65 feet of wall has been raised. The roof and one story are yet to be put on. For two years the work has been done by day labor, but this will stop and the building finished by contract as soon as the walls are completed. \$700,000 has already been expended. Next year Mr. Lennox will ask for \$25,000 extract on make the cor-

pleted. \$700,000 has already been expended. Next year Mr. Lennox will ask for \$25,000 extra to make the corridors and the roof fireproof. There is now enough stone on the premises to complete the walls.

The new council chamber will be one-third smaller than the present one, but on the third storey will be an audience hall capable of holding 2000 or 3000 people.

Amongst the contributors to The Weekly Examiner was Professor Goldwin Smith, who wrote regularly for it for some time. 


