Congregational Church Destroyed By Fire.

The Watford Congregational Church was completely destroyed by fire during the early hours of Tuesday morning. The fire was discovered about I o'clock by Mr. W. S. Fuller, but not before it had gained considerable headway and the roof was in flames shortly after the alarm was given. The origin of the fire alarm was given. The origin of the fire is a mystery, as the building had not been occupied since Sunday night, and the caretaker was in the building on Monday alternoon when everthing seemed alright. The building was a brick veneer and with the furnishings was worth at least \$3000. Originally it was a frame building situated on Victoria St. and was built in 1875. About the year 1888 the structure was moved to Main St. and brick veneered, and an addition built on the rear. The church was a neat building, well finished, artistically decorated and comfortably furnished. Everything was consumed, including two o gans and a quantity of new music books which had just been purchased. was an insurance of \$1300 in the Royal Insurance Co. on the building and con-tents. The blaze was a fierce one. Luck-ily there was little wind, and but for that fact, combined with the good work done by the Fire Brigade and citizens, some of the nearby buildings would also have been consumed. A letter from Mrs. J. G. Boyd, of Petroles but later of St. Albions, England, to her sister, Mrs. John Zavitz, of Brooke, will prove interesting to their many friends who will be pleased to hear of Mrs. Boyd's asfe arrival on New Year's Day to join her husband at Pauk Brandan, Sumatra, O.K.:—We left Southamton on the 22nd of Nov. We sailed through the Straits of Messina. We also had a sight of where the great earthquake was but we saw very little of Mount Etna. The steamer stopped one and a half days at Marse lles. We went ashore but it simply poured rain all the time which prevented us a great deal from sight seeing. It is a very busy city, such a number of big steamers get coaled up here. We got off at Lisbon and secured a guide who could speak English to show us around. We went to the royal palace which was the residence of King Emmanuel and his mother. Railway Passes

There is a member of the Quebec House who believes that riding on railways free of charge is the legiti mate right of all members of the Legislature, and with this in view Mr. Bissonette, who sits for Stand-stead, recently introduced a bill to that effect. He doesn't want to ride "courtesy" of the railway, but by right of his occupying the position he does. He explains in his measure that the Legislative councillors and and members of the Legislature no longer receive a mileage allowance. and in lieu to this he wants the railways operating within the province to make good the deficiency. same question was brought up some years ago in the Federal House by the member for South York, Mr. Maclean's argument being that when railways now issue passes to members it is a species of bribery, whereas if it was a matter of law or rather custom, the bribing feature would cease to exist. As it now stands, members of the Federal House may utilize a railway pass and then charge up their mileage, which the Government pays. They collect from the the railways on the one hand and from the Government on the other. As a matter of fact, there appears only one way out, and that is to pass laws which will prevent the railways giving passes to members of the Legislatures, the Federal House, the Senate, or to any one connected with the Governmental services, either Provincial or Federal. 

The Father of a Girl Falls Into a Trap

In the Pitti gallery at Florence, Italy, is a celebrated portrait before which is always a crowd of gazers. It is the likeness of a Mme. Le Brun and was painted by berself during the eighteenth century. She is represented sitting beside her easel with her bead turned toward those before her, and it seems that real eyes are looking from the canvas and real lips are parted, showing real teeth.

One morning Lina King, the daughter of a wealthy American banker and member of that set which claims to be the cream of New York society, being in Florence and in the Pitti gallery, stopped before this portrait. A young artist was copying it. His clothes were shabby, but there was an ideal look in his face that at once drew one's attention. His eyes were large and lustrous, reminding one of those of the Christ child of Raphael in the celebrated painting of the Sistine Madonna.

Miss King had stopped to have look at the portrait, but remained to feast her eyes on the copyist. She spoke some Italian and asked him a few questions as to the original of the portrait. Miss King laughed and replied in first rate New York English whereupon the artist confessed that he was an American art student.

Miss King artfully drew from him how long he would be engaged on the copy and at what hours he would work on it. He was as artful as she, telling her that he might be several weeks in completing the copy and he worked every morning from 11 to 12 o'clock. He was making it for an English lord who would pay him enough for it to enable him to pursue his studies in Florence for a whole year.
