SITUATION IN EAST ALARMS That it was extremely interesting but also somewhat alarming to visit the Near Eastern countries after an absence from them and to note their progress in some of their activities was the statement made last evening by W. Jessup, National Secretary for the Foreign Work of the Canadian Y.M.C.A., who arrived in the city. During the course of an interesting interview, Mr. Jessup touched on the situation prevailing at present in the Near East and also told of the work which the Y.M.C.A. was doing to bring the more rational viewpoint into prominence in these countries. Mr. Jessup has been stationed in Egypt for the last twelve years. He visited St. John two and one-half years ago and since that time has travelled almost around the world, having visited Egypt, the Near East, India, China, the Malay States, Korea and Japan. Mr. Jessup visited the chief cities in each of these countries,

noting the work which the Y.M.C.A. was carrying on in each. He met the leading nationals in each, many of whom are not of Christian beliefs but all of whom proved most sympathetic toward the missionary cause, particularly to mission schools, medcal missions and the Y.M.C.A. Mr. Jessup attributed their sympathy for the latter to the character of the work, specializing in training the student body in Christian ways; because of this it appeals to the official One of the things that strikes a



Whenever the United States tariff has been made more restrictive as against imports from Canada, the effect has been such as The Journal of Commerce describes. To such an attitude may be ascribed, in part at least, the confederation of Canadian Provinces, the British preference and the increased attention paid to the British market. Our trade is diverted into new channels.-Toronto Globe.




