The longest day of the year at Spitzbergen is three and one half months. At Wardburg, Norway, the longest day lasts from May 21 to July 22 without intermission. At Tornea, Finland, June 21st is twenty-two hours long and Christmas has less than three hours of daylight. At St. Petersburg the longest day is nineteen hours and the shortest is five hours. At Montreal the longest day is sixteen hours and at New York it is about fifteen hours.

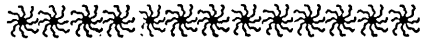

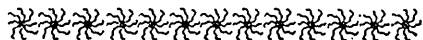
