

Hamilton is beautifully situated on Hamilton Bay at the head of Lake Ontario. Rising behind

form the staple of her export trade. The school system is very complete, and comprises 18 Public and Separate Schools, a Collegiate Institute and a number of private educational establishments. There are 54 churches of all denominations and two large Convents. News is furnished by three papers, The Times, Spectator, and Herald, the two former issue weekly editions. To philatelists Hamilton is the "city of stamp collectors," having more active collectors than any other city in Canada.

Toronto Notes.

At a recent meeting of the Toronto Board of Trade a resolution was passed favoring the proposed reduction of postage on letters from 3 cents to 2 cents per oz. and the levying of postage on newspapers. The Montreal Board of Trade a short time after took the same action. I think this is a very expedient action on the part of these Boards and likely to go a long way in securing these proposed changes in postal rates as it gives the Government the opinion of the business men on this matter. Some object to the proposed levying of postage on newspapers on the grounds that the farmer will have to pay for this in increased subscription price and as this postage is to be changed on newspapers in order to make up the loss incurred by reducing the letter rate some object to the whole bill as they say the farmer will in reality have to help pay the business man's postage. However there are always some kickers and the majority of those that object are those on the Conservative party who vote against the bill really because a party on the opposite proposed it. However, I, myself am independent and would like to see the bill go through because it will be a great benefit to the country in general.

Rapid Delivery of City Letters.

OTTAWA, May 17th.—The gov-ernment has decided to utilize bicycles in the special rapid deliv-ery or letters in larger cities. The system will be brought into force by July 1st. The rate will probably be ten cents per letter. The stamp is now in preparation. A proposal to reduce the rate on drop letters in cities from two to one cent is under considera-tion. Statistics will be gathered as to the probable effect of the reduction before any step is taken.

The Present Issue to be Changed.



Owing to the many faults in the engraving of the present issue of stamps the Government has decided to change the maple leaves in the lower corners to numerals. The reason for this is, French Canadians, not being able to read English, find it very difficult to ascertain the value of the stamp. The post-office officials of foreign countries also are in the dark in regard to the value of stamps. In some cases they charged postage as though it had never been paid but the placing of the figures in each corner will remove this difficulty at once.

Now that the change is to take place it would be a good idea for collectors and dealers to lay in stock of at least the 1-2, 6, 8 and 10 cent values as these are likely to become valuable in a short time.
