PARISH NOTES

The second Fellowship Tea was held on Dec. 1st, Mr. Wyatt being the host. About 125 men were present, and were heartily welcomed and waited upon by the regular church members.

On Dec. 19th a pound concert was given by the A.Y.P.A., and next day many baskets were carried to poor families in the neighborhood, and some much needed men's clothing distributed.

The pound service held in the Church by the Sunday School children on the Sunday after Christmas, resulted in over 60 large packages for the old people of the Church Home.

The Rector has received from Mr. T. S. Lough, who is in South America, a letter containing a cheque for \$10, to be used in flowers for the altar this month in memory of Dr. and Mrs. Lough.

The W.A. sent their Christmas bale to Apsley this year, and on Dec. 15th the usual work was laid aside, and all the members made fancy bags to hold candies, nuts and raisins. The box contained in all 71 gifts. The usual two weeks' holiday was taken at Christmas. Meetings began again on Jan. 6th.

SUNDAY SCHOOL FESTIVAL

The festival was held on Monday, Dec. 30th, and began with a tea for the Infant Class at p.m., and finished up with ice cream and cake for everybody at 9.30. In between came the prize giving, carol singing and recitations by scholars. The professional part of the entertainment was given by a ventruoquist, who was at different times a talking doll, a conjuror and a wizard. The chief prize was won by Ethel Dorrington, who is head of the school. Every one wants to thank Mr. and Mrs. Tuck, of McCaul St., for their most generous donation of ice cream.

CHRISTMAS CHEER

The policy of St. George's Young Men's Association last night was that of the open door. An invitation had been issued to men who were hungry to come and enjoy a good square meal and more than two hundred accepted it. There was plenty to eat, though the supply of provisions succumbed to the vigorous onslaughts made upon it, and had to be replenished before two-thirds of the guests had been satisfied. The chair was occupied by Rev. C. B. Kenrick. Mr. Edmund Capps was in charge of the musical programme, and Mr. Donald Macdonald superintended the young men who had been detailed to act as waiters. The rector, Rev. Canon Cayley, was also present, and gave a witty and spirited address full of wise advice and encouragement. The churchwardens, Messrs. George Biggar and Louis McMurray, also attended and helped in the good work. Mr. William Mott was the efficient accompanist, and Mr. R. C. Bourne helped things along with his flute. Among the varied elements represented in the assemblage there was no lack of talent, but as many of the men had come very early, some having been waiting at the door since 5.30 o'clock, the programme was a short one, and the National Anthem, followed by cheers for the hosts, brought the proceedings to a close at 10 o'clock.—Toronto Star.
