

SUPPLEMENTAL ENDOWMENT FUND.

TORONTO, September, 1885.

The friends and supporters of our Church University throughout the province will be pleased to learn that as the result of the movement begun some three years ago in its behalf, rather more than half of the \$200,000, asked for by the Corporation for the development of the University, has been secured. Canadian churchmen have given \$60,000, and the recent appeal to ehurchmen in England has realized \$50,000 more. Included in this latter amount is a grant of \$15,000 from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. This is made, after the custom of the Society, on the condition that some \$20,000 more than is already available from Canadian and English subscriptions be raised to meet it, and the whole, or part, will lapse and be written off, unless the conditions are complied with within the next four years. This fact, coupled with the urgent necessity that still exists for the better equipment of the University, has led the Corporation to decide upon the immediate re-opening of the Canadian canvass.

With the strong feeling which now exists in favour of Religious Education, and the manifest influence that it must have upon the public and social morality of the country, it is of the first importance that the Church should have a great Christian University thoroughly equipped in every department. With the funds already provided the Corporation have happily been enabled to make a great step in advance. A beautiful College Chapel has been erected and consecrated, and the privilege thus afforded to the students of daily service in a building so eminently fitted to aid devotional feeling is already making itself distinctly felt for good. Two additional Professors have been appointed, one in Divinity and one in Mental and Moral Philosophy. Provision has been made for completing the endowment of the Chair in Physical Science, and a Fellowship has been founded in the Natural Sciences. In connection with these additions to the Professoriate, the course of study has been strengthened and developed in every department and now embraces, in a thorough and comprehensive way, the various subjects of a liberal University course in keeping with the greatly extended requirements of the present day. In making these changes, however, great care has been taken to avoid the evils necessarily incident to a system of either all options or no options. During the first year the undergraduates are required to take a fixed course of study. During the second they are allowed

a limited number of options. This guarantees a broad and liberal culture, and avoids the entire neglect or imperfect knowledge of certain important subjects which is the inevitable result of a system of mere options. Upon the broad foundations thus laid, a student may, in the third year, build according to his special tastes by a choice of subjects. In this way individuality of character is developed, and independent thought fostered and encouraged, without generating a race of narrow and uncultured specialists.

The advance which has thus been made in so many directions is full of encouragement. and must eventually tell upon the Church and country. But much remains to be done. Professors are urgently needed in History, English and English Literature, and Natural Science (departments which are now supplied by Lecturers only), at 1 the complete endowment of the Chair in Modern Languages is imperatively demanded. The enlargement of the present building or the erection of another to accommodate some twenty students is an important feature in the extension of the University. The rapid growth of the country, and the large number of young men seeking the privileges of higher education are forcing this upon the Corporation with annually increasing persistency, and active steps must very soon be taken in this direction. The recent establishment of a comprehensive Honour course in the Physical and Natural Sciences has rendered absolutely necessary the erection of a more commodious Laboratory and a still further outlay in Scientific Apparatus, notwithstanding the considerable progress which has been made in this department during the last few years. The remaining \$90,000 asked for by the Corporation will be none too much to enable them to meet these several wants, and, in so doing, claim the balance of the grant from the Christian Knowledge Society.

To encourage liberality, they are prepared, during the continuance of the canvass, to grant the following privileges to subscribers to the Supplemental Endowment Fund, to come into operation, in all cases, as soon as the subscriptions are paid in full.

(1) Donors of \$1,000, or Graduates collecting the same sum, found a Scholarship bearing the name of the Donor or any other he may give to it, and thus acquire the right of nominating annually, during the life-time of the said Donor or Graduate, one student to one year's course in Arts or Divinity, free of Tuition Fees.

(2) Any Parish in which the sum of \$1,000 is subscribed, and the several subscribers shall have relinquished their individual rights of nominating (if any), founds a perpetual Scholarship, bearing the name of the Parish or any other, and thus acquires the right of nominating for ever one Student to a complete course in Arts or Divinity, or both, free of Tuition Fees.

(3) Subscribers of \$250, \$500, \$750, or Graduates collecting the same sum, may nominate at any time during life, one, two, or three Students respectively to a three years' course in Arts or Divinity, free of Tuition Fees.

Subscriptions may be paid in to the credit of the Trinity College Supplemental Endowment Fund, at the Dominion Bank, Toronto; or they may be sent to the Hon. G. W. Allan, Moss Park, Toronto, Treasurer of the Fund; to the Provost, Trinity College, or to the Rev. Reginald H. Starr, B.D., 80 Avenue Road, Toronto. Subscriptions may be spread over any period not exceeding five years from the 1st of July last, at the discretion of the Subscriber. 1 110
