



Senator Power said that on the whole the results of the census were satisfactory, but a detailed enumeration disclosed facts that were not so sat-

Results were also disappointing in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Ontario, where any gains were made by the cities; in the country there was a falling off. In the fertile country of Huron the population has declined by 9000 in ten years.




