





The jury promptly it and that the defendant was guilty of negligence, and that the negligence caused the accident, and they assessed the damages at \$1500; but the longer they stayed out, the more they became unable to answer the question as to whether or not the deceased voluntarily assumed the risk, and they never have to this day answered the question. The defendants called no witnesses, and at the close of the plaintin's case moved for a non-suit, on the ground that the evidence showed that the deceased had voluntarily assumed the risk. The learned judge reserved judgment on their motion, and left the case to the jury, with the above mentioned result. After the verdict, the plaintiff moved for judgment upon the findings. To-day the learned judge gives his opinion on both motions, after having given them his most careful consideration. He dismisses the motion for non-suit, behis most careful consideration. He dismisses the motion for non-suit, because knowledge of the danger does not necessarily imply an agreement to take the risks of it, but he is unable to take the risks of it, but he is unable to order judgment to be entered for the plaintiff, because of the failure of the jury to answer the question, as to whether or not the deceased did voluntarily assume the risk. There was practically no dispute whatever at the trial as to the facts bearing upon the wantered question; all that remains Under these peculiar circumstances the learned judge says the case must be governed by the celebrated cases of Stevens v. Market ruled very strong all day, reactions being very transifory, and it closed about the best price of the day. A Liverpool cable also said Argentine shipments were delayed more, and scarcely any offerings in any position owing to bad weather and fears of condition. The domestic news is not so buoyant. Receipts for the week have been liberal, Minneapolis and Duluth receiving 3052 cars, against 2396 cars last week, and primary receipts at all markets were 2,679,000 bushels, and 2,318,000 bushels in same period of time. Visible supply consequently is expected to show but little change. Bradstreet's statement of shipments was somewhat disappointing, but it had no effect on wheat.

Departmental Creameries.

'Mr. Foster informed Sir Richard Cartwright that 800 cheese were in store at Prince Edward Island, 124 at Kingston and 60 at Montreal, the island cheese being required to meet the requirements of local trade. The product of the factories in Prince Edward Island had been sold to Hodgson Bros. for the past three years because they had bid the highest price of any Canadian firm. Last year's make had been sold to this firm on terms which are to be kept private until the cheese are disposed of by them. The amount realized will be quite sufficient to pay the Government advances, charges, etc., and would leave a considerable amount for distribution among the patrons of the different factories.

The question of remission of duty on agricultural implements was again brought up by Mr. Davin, who said that the statement had been made that the McCormack Company had invoiced binders for sale in Canada at \$80 each. No doubt some of these were included in 685 binders sent to the Northwest Territories last year, which were invoiced at \$95. This, therefore, was a case in which the producer had paid a duty of \$15. At present the markets of the Territories were practically nonpolized by the Massey-Harris Company. While that firm treated the farmers with every consideration as a general rule, and were selling as cheaply there as in Dakota, it was unpleasant for any portion of Canada to be in the hands of a monopoly. If there were competition, farmers might be able to get cheaper binders, or on better terms. He had pressed the matter on the Government, but as Mr. Foster had brought down his Budget Speech and there were no tariff changes, he hoped the Finance Minister would take the matter into consideration next year. As the House had negatived a miction of this kind the other day, he would withdraw his motion.

The Grading of Wheat.

Mr Davin moved that a committee consisting of Messrs. McDonald (Assinbola). Boyd, Martin, Sproule, McMullen and the mover be appointed to enquire into the present system of grading wheat in Manitoba and the Northwest, an despecially as to-fraud, whereby it is alleged farmers are cheated of what they are justly entitled to for their wheat. The committee to have power to send for persons and papers, and report from time to time. He said farmers were being defrauded by purchasers of grain, who refused to grade it in accordance with the standard and thus paid lower prices.

Controller Prior said the department had received no complaints of fraud.

Controller Prior said the department had received no complaints of fraud but promised to make an investigation. Mr. Martin thought the wheat standards should be fixed and not changed from year to year, and that smutty wheat should not be allowed to be mixed with No. 1 wheat, but graded separately.

Mr. Wood, Controller of Customs, formerly Collector of Inland Revenue, pointed out that on the question at issue, farmers, buyers and millers had very divergent views. He said the result of fixing standard No. 1 too low. No. 1 wheat averaged 64 pounds to the bushel, when the standard was but 60 pounds. Dealers then graded No. 2 quality up to No. 1 by adding a certain quantity of No. 1 to it. This was the chief cause of grievance. That, however, was impossible this year, as No. 1 standard had been fixed at 64 hounds to the bushel, the average weight of the year's crop. He held that smutty wheat, when cleamed, made just as good flour as it ever could have made. He assured the House that the department had carefully thought the whole matter out, and felt confident that his successor in office (Col. Prior) would continue to sive the matter his best attention.

Mr. Foster objected to the appointment of a committee, He held that a Parliamentary committee, on account
