MR. HOWLAND AND THE MAYOR

In Speech in Ayres' Hall He Declares It Will Not Be a Ladylike Campaign.

ALSO TELLS A STORY OF A KNIFE ARGUES THAT MR. MACLEAN IS KILLING HIM BECAUSE HE OPPOSES THE MAYOR.

Ayres' Hall, at the corner of Parliament and Winchester-streets, was comfortably filled with representatives of No. 2 Ward, last evening, on the occasion of a meeting in the interest of Mayor Howland's candidature. While the remarks of the speakers were listened to attentively, there was no great outward evidence of enthusiasm. Mayor Howland was present, and was somewhat bitter and abusive in his remarks. In this regard, the Mayor regrets that Mr. Howland has opened the Mayor's campaign with personal abuse, and argues that, because Mr. Maclean opposes him, he is killing him. Mr. Maclean, in some way, appears to believe that he has no right to be opposed, or that no one should have a platform opposed to his. The Mayor's argument, in a nutshell, is, "The man who opposes me is killing me."

ORANGEVILLE'S MAYOR SUDDENLY SUCCOMBS

Taken Sick in His Office Yesterday and Expired in Spite of Aid.

Orangeville, Dec. 26.—Mr. William Still, Mayor of Orangeville, died suddenly at his office here this afternoon. The deceased had not been feeling well during the fore part of the day, but remained at his place of business notwithstanding. Between 3 and 4 o'clock he was taken seriously ill, and his son summoned a physician. The doctor and son later left the office, leaving Mr. Still with a friend. The sick man was assisted with an acute neuralgia, which gradually fell forward on a lounge. His friend, being alarmed, placed him in a comfortable position, and immediately despatched a messenger for the physician. When the doctor arrived, he found the man dead, and in a few minutes had expired. His death is attributed to heart failure or the bursting of an inner blood vessel. Coroner Henry Will hold an inquest to-day-night.

FOUR AT A DROWNING

Bridgewater, N.S. Dec. 26.—A very sad drowning accident shocked the entire county here yesterday. Four boys were skating on the La Nave, above Cook's Mills, fell into the water and were drowned. The boys' names were: Perry and Merrill Rhoads, aged 14 and 15 years respectively, sons of Mrs. Stephen Rhoads; Harry Hubley, aged 12 years, son of Mrs. J. H. Hubley; and Cyrus Hubley, and George Batham, aged 10 years, sons of James Batham. The boys were last seen at 11:30 this morning, and as they did not appear at dinner a search was made, and their caps were found floating in the water. The bodies were recovered at 2:30 o'clock. Coroner March at once held an inquest, the result of which was a verdict of accidental drowning.

KILLED BY A TREE

New Hamburg, Dec. 26.—Jacob Bennett, aged 28 years, second son of John Bennett of Jackson, met with a fatal accident on Monday afternoon while helping to fell trees in Jacob B. Roth's bush half a mile east of New Hamburg. He was struck by a tree in contact with another tree, and unfortunately struck Bennett on the right side of the head, and he fell over the edge of the bush, which he had just cut down. He was found dead at 2:30 o'clock. Coroner March at once held an inquest, the result of which was a verdict of accidental drowning.

TREE PINNED HIM DOWN

St. John, N.B., Dec. 26.—This morning Anna Turney of Woodstock was killed while falling a tree. He was found dead with a huge tree lying across his head.

HOUSE RAIDER KILLED

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Dec. 26.—Four men forced an entrance into Mrs. Maclean's house at night, and were seen to leave. The men were armed, and when Captain John Warren came down stairs he was set upon by the men. Warren had a revolver in his hand, and he shot Dennis Brown dead. The three companions then left the house. No arrests have as yet been made.

LOOKED FOR ANOTHER GOT BROOKLYN THIEF

Montreal Detectives Arrested Albert Jerome Ayres Before They Knew He Was Wanted.
HE HAD BEEN SPENDING FREELY Was a Messenger in a Bank, and Jumped Out With \$2000 in Gold.
Montreal, Dec. 26.—Albert Jerome Ayres, 19 years of age, was arrested at 6 a.m. today, while in bed in a house on St. Justin-street. Ayres is wanted in Brooklyn for the theft of \$2000 in gold on Tuesday, Dec. 17. He was a messenger in the Hamilton-avenue branch with whom he was engaged to deliver at the head office. It never reached the office, and the most diligent search failed to get any clue to what had become of the young man. The case was at once put in the hands of Capt. Reynolds. The police force and the American Surety Company, with whom Ayres was insured for \$5000 against theft, also took the matter up. A hot chase for the missing messenger and the money continued.

ARCH. CAMPBELL ON PROHIBITION PROVINCE CANNOT LEGISLATE IT

At a Joint Political Meeting at Maple He and Mr. Wallace Cross Forensic Swords in the West York Bye-Election Campaign.

Mr. A. J. Anderson, on behalf of Mr. Campbell, covered the lines of argument adopted by the candidates. MORAL SUASION.
Canadian Baptist, Dec. 26.—The prohibitionists of England, under the leadership of Mr. Henry, an American Baptist minister, are pressing what is called the Million Pledge Crusade, or the work of securing a million to sign the pledge to abstain from liquor drinking. It is only as the work of education and moral suasion proceeds that in America, we have become so engrossed with the desire to kill the traffic itself that temperance people are doing all too little to educate prohibition sentiment, and to rescue the drunkard and safeguard the young under present conditions. We may well question whether the prohibition sentiment is growing in strength or weakening. We must keep up our efforts along moral suasion lines if we are ever to secure, and, when secured, enforce, provincial or national prohibition.

GEN. DEWET SUCCESSFULLY RUSHING BRITISH CAMP

London, Dec. 26.—The following despatch has been received from Lord Kitchener, dated Johannesburg: General Dundas reports that the night of Dec. 24 Colonel Firman's camp at Zeonfontein, consisting of three companies of yeomanry and two guns, was successfully rushed by a strong commando under Dewet.

St. Catharines, Dec. 26.—Alfred Jackson, a 7-year-old boy, was yesterday shot down and mortally wounded by his uncle, a young man by the name of Fred Hayes. The fatal shot was fired due to the careless handling of a revolver. The boy who was shot has for some time past been living with his grandmother, Mrs. Hayes, at her home on the Hamilton stone road, a short distance west of this city. The boy's mother is dead and his father is in England.

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MR. W. F. MACLEAN AND THE MAYORALTY

Will Make His Main Deliberance to Citizens and Electors at Nomination.

HE IS IN THE FIGHT TO THE FINISH

Declares He Has No Issue Whatever With Mr. Howland—Sticks to His Prophecy.

Mr. W. F. Maclean was busy yesterday with his mayoralty campaign. He will make his main deliberance to the citizens and electors at the nomination meeting at the City Hall on Monday.

All day a stream of citizens from all portions of the town poured into The World office to assure him of their support. Many came to see if it was true as he had said in the past, as they had heard rumors to the contrary. Mr. Maclean assured all these that he is in the fight to the finish. He had no issue whatever with Mr. Howland, but was desirous of seeing what he himself could do on the lines of good government for the City of Toronto, and in the direction of the citizens obtaining their rights and fair treatment from the corporations which own the public franchises.

Mr. Maclean will make further addresses to the public after his nomination speech at evening meetings. He still sticks to his prophecy that he is going to win by thousands.

CITY SHOULD INSURE ITS FIREMEN.

The Dundas Banner says: Hamilton is taking up a subscription for the family of Fireman Smith, who lost his life this week, the truck on which he was riding having been run into by a street car. A subscription for a good workman is a noble thing, but it is a reflection on a progressive city like Hamilton that such a thing should be necessary. The lives of the firemen should be insured at the city's expense, so that every fireman is constantly called upon to place his life in jeopardy in trying to save the property of the citizens. There are several good life insurance companies in Hamilton, in which the lives not only of the firemen but of the policemen should be insured.

We think The Banner is right. Some years ago, when John Kenrick was chairman of the committee in charge of the fire department, he developed a plan for the insurance of the firemen. But at that time the firemen were looking for an increase in pay, and Kenrick's plan was sidetracked. The Council of 1902 ought to take the matter up again.—From The Hamilton Spectator.

GIVE HIM THE CHANCE.

Hamilton Times: There is no longer any doubt as to the Toronto mayoralty contest. Mr. Maclean is definitely in the field, with but one condition—his wants to remain a member of parliament. He proposes, if elected, to do "things." Just what he may mean by that announcement is not clear, but it is a definite statement that Mr. Maclean has done so much mapping out of work for others that it would be interesting to see him get down to work to show what he could do himself.

HE WILL BE HEARD FROM NEXT MONDAY.

Hamilton Herald: W. F. Maclean, M.P., will ask the people of Toronto to make him their Mayor, because by so doing they will endorse the principle of public ownership of great public franchises, for which principle he stands.

By this appeal, Mr. Maclean will not succeed in getting a fair expression of public opinion on the question of public ownership. To ask people to vote for him in order to endorse the abstract principle is not the right way to bring about reforms which he favors. It is too much like the principle of prohibition. It will result in nothing, and it will be a waste of time to formulate a definite plan for municipal ownership of all the public services which, in his opinion, it is practicable to transfer from private to public ownership, and appeal to the electors on that platform. The answer to his appeal could then be accepted as satisfactory evidence of the state of public opinion on the question.

Does Mr. Maclean favor the municipalization of the street railway, the gas and electric light services, and the establishment of a municipal electric power service?
