





Vigorous Advice to Depositors Who Were Swindled by the Anderson Oakville Failure.

Transfer of Mortgage Not in Conformity With Statutory Provisions.

in view of the fact that the creditors vill, in the near future, be asked to deide what action to take against the Bank of Hamilton, the lonowing comnay not be out or place: There is no aw which says that mortgages of real tate shall be registered. what the tegistry Act does say is that such nortgages shall be perfectly good and alid, as between the immediate parties hereto (in this case the Bank of ma ton and Anderson & Co.), but tha such a mortgage becomes absolutely nuil, void and traudulent, as agains, any subsequent purchaser or mortgages of such real estate, provided such subsequent deed or mortgage is registered In other words, registration of a second mortgage gives it priority over and voids the first unregistered mortgage, only so far, however, as such subsequent creditors or purchasers are concerned. However, if both mortgoes are unregistered, they still retain their priority and validity as of their dates

Must Register Mortgage. Now the only way to make the fact public properly, that such a mortgage has been given, is by registering it, as he registration is notice to all person; dealing subsequently with such real estate of all previous transactions in onnection with the title thereto; and herefore, if the Bank of Hamilton were willing to take a mortgage of the roperty of Anderson & Co. and run the isk of it being void on account of its on-registration, it seems that this was a matter of business policy about which no one outside of the Bank of Hamil ted to take this risky security as colla-teral, which it is entitled to do under the Bank Act, that was their business and theirs alone.

No person shall undertake a journey, travel, cook victuals, shave or otherwise defile the Sabbath day by other untaward conduct.





Loot Represents \$23,500 and Was Enroute to Salt Lake City.

Detroit, March 20 .- The mystery of the \$23,500 dollars, the value of a gold brick, weighing 84 pounds 10 ounces, that was missed from the express car of the 11 o'clock Wabash train bound for the east shortly after midnight Wednesday, remains unsolved. The bar of gold with three smaller bars arrived on an earlier train from Salt Lake City, Utah, and was bound for the mint

in Philadelphia, going via Buffalo. When the bullion arrived at the Union Station here it was checked in by Al Miller, who has charge of the Pacific Comapny's office at the station at night, he relieving W. B. Bronson. who is on during the day. When the four bars of bullion we e checked in they were placed in the safe in the corner of the company's office. The 11 b'clock train, which was to bear them to Buralo, was an hour and a half late, and in the meantime it is not known where the bullion was left, as it had been taken from the safe preparatory to placing it on the train.

Arrested and Discharged, John Faber, one of the three employes of the company at night, was quite certain that the gold was loaded on the train, but a thoro seach failed to find the missing bar. Foreman Miller at once communicated with T. H. McCort, the local manager, and he communicated with detective headquarters. Detectives Shepherd and Parker were put upon the case at once, and afwere put upon the case at once, and af-ter three hours of indefatigable work they took Faber in charge and escortto the central station, where he






