Shares represent ownership of a business. Mortgage securities, bonds and debentures are certifi-cates of indebtedness and represent money loaned to a company and secured by a mortgage on a com-pany's assets. Possession of a bond does not, therefore, so long as the borrowing company fulfils its obligations, carry with it any ownership rights. Bonds and such securities are repayable at their face value, and represent the investment of approximately that amount of capital. Common shares, on the other hand, representing as they do the net worth of a business, naturally vary in value as the company's assets and earning power increase or decrease according to the success of its operations.

Until recently the various incor-poration laws of the Dominion government and the Canadian provinces required that common shares when issued should have a stated par value, and this was usually set at \$100. In a great many cases, as a result of the reinvestment of earnings in the undertaking, the intrinsic value of the shares has increased very greatly in excess of the shares are shared to be shared to b their par value, and the amount of investment which they actually renominal or par value. BALLANTYNE DEFENDS OUTLAY ON THE NAVY

Replying to Criticisms of William Duff, M.P., Minister Declares It is Duty of Canadians to Assume Share of the Cost of Sea Defence-Warm Eulogy of Work of Navy

The speaker replied to the criticisms voiced by William Duff, Liberal M.P. for Lunenburg, N.S., in a speech at Saskatoon on Wednesday night regarding Canada's naval policy. Mr. Duff's views, in Hon. Mr. Duff wanted to close the naval college and the docks both at Halifax and Esquimalt, and thought that the minister of naval affairs should ask the mother country to shoulder the burden of Canada's defense because she had an enormous war debt of two billions of dollars, not, of course, taking into consideration that Great Britain had one which dwarfed that of Canada.

Mr. Duff's opinion that Canada, if she were not to look after her own defence, should seek protection under the wing of the Monroe Doctrine would not appeal to Canadians. declared Hon. Mr. Ballantyne, who said Canada did not desire to shirk how Canada did not desire to shirk her naval obligations, and that it was the bounden duty of Canadians to assume a share in the maintenance of

sume a share in the maintenance of the defense of our own shores.

Not a Party Issue.

Hon. Mr. Ballantyne did not want to get mixed up in a controversy, but such a national problem should not have been treated as a party question.

In reviewing the history of the Canadian navy, he said that both the Niobe and Rainbow were obsolete, and it was inadvisable to allow expenditures year after year of \$450,000 and \$225,000, for ships that were unable to go to sea or be used as training ships. No more biame was to be attached to one party than to the other for such a condition of affairs.

His object in issuing demobilization orders was to put youth and efficiency into the service. Many of the appointments were political, and as a result 782 men were let out of the service, and the Niobe, Rainbow and two subbarines were sold. Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 28.-J. L. Benton, managing director of the Philadelphia Textile Manufacturers' Association, in a statement today, declared the manufacturers had determined to "free themselves from radical unionism," as well as of a large

number of inefficient workers.
"Between 110,000 and 125,000 employes of textile mills in Philadelphia will be out of work this winter unless they watch their step," said Mr. Benton. "The weeding out has already begun, Approximately 40,000 have already been dropped. Whether the remainder will follow depends to a considerable extent upon the workers

"The textile manufacturers are not opposed to unions. They believe labor organizations have done and will do good. But they are opposed to radi-cal leaders and are going to the mat here and now with them."


