ECLIPSES IN 1855.

This year there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon, as follows:—

I. A total eclipse of the Moon in the evening of May 1st, or early in the morning of May 2d. Visible. Magnitude 18.348 digits on the southern limb. Duration of eclipse, 3 hours 42 minutes. The *total* part begins 1h. 3m. after the commencement of the eclipse, and lasts 1h. 36m.

Eclipse begins, even. 1st, 9h. 50m.

Middle of Eclipse, even. 1st, 11h. 20m.

End of Eclipse, morn. 2d, 1h. 43m.

II. A partial eclipse of the Sun, May 15th, invisible.

III. A total eclipse of the Moon early in the morning of the 25th. Visible. Magnitude of eclipse 17.568 digits on the northern limb. Duration 2 hours 24 minutes. The *total* part begins 1h. 1. after the beginning of the eclipse, and lasts 1h. 29m.

Eclipse begins 1h. 31m.

Middle of Eclipse, 2h. 20m.

End of Eclipse, 5h. 59m.

IV. A partial eclipse of the Sun Nov. 9th. Invisible.

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

Spring always brings work enough with it to give full employ to the farmer for several weeks. The farming tools often need repairing or putting in order, before beginning Spring's work, and should be attended to in season. It is good economy to tend the oxen, cows, calves and lambs, well: to put up bars and fences, before the cattle get the habit of making too free with the fields. If you would sow grain early, your own judgment will tell

you, it must not be on wet ground;—such land, if in good heart, will answer to plough late, and sow with wheat or oats. *Manure* is the best *gold mine* for a farmer;—better than that of California.

Plough gardens early, and sow onion and parsnip seeds as soon as the ground is dry and warm enough. Plant potatoes on warm, dry land; and if you would have them early, plant the seed-ends, instead of whole potatoes. Wheat sown early is generally more profitable than that sown late, if the worms and weevils let it alone. On rich land, about five pecks of seed wheat are sufficient for

an acre. On ground of moderate richness, a bushel and a half should be sown. Some sow more than that. Be the quantity more or less, the seed should be well washed before sowing it; and if lime or ashes be mixed with it, so much the better.

If farmers wish their wives to make a good store of butter and cheese, they will endeavour to let their cows have good feed. Remember that corn hoed well, and in good season, will be good, if the ground is in good order, and the season is favorable; but that which is poorly hoed, and late withal, will probably be poor stuff. If the caterpillars intrude upon your fruit trees, destroy them; — the sooner the better. Don't

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neglect your potatoes. Some say one hoeing is sufficient for them; but they may rest assured that, though potatoes sometimes do well with one hoeing, they would do better with two, besides being much easier to dig.

A Sad Disease.—A correspondent of the Western Christian Advocate complains of the prevalence, in his neighbourhood, of a disease which he calls 'the Sunday sickness.' It is neither fever, ague nor small pox, but is sympathetic with the moral condition of the patient. Now the farmers are busy enough. Some have already begun their haying, and others are preparing to begin. All is hop and skip, out doors and in. The women and girls are full of business, cooking, and keeping things in order; and the men and boys have as much as they can do to take care of the hay. No pleasanter or more profitable work on a farm than haying; —the work is rather hard,

to be sure, but it is healthful enough to balance the exercise. Grass not mown is now perhaps ripe enough to cart into the barn the same day it is cut; and there is no better fodder than hay got in this way. Don't drink too much cold water.

—Governor Wright, of Indiana, advocating the establishment of a common school system in that State, says; 'If we do not pay for education of the boy, we shall surely pay double for the ignorance of the man.'

A fellow being brought into Court as a witness in a case of a row, whose eye had been blackened, referred to it as a proof in the case. The Court said, facetiously, that the witness's evidence was conclusive, inasmuch as he was an *eye* witness of the whole.



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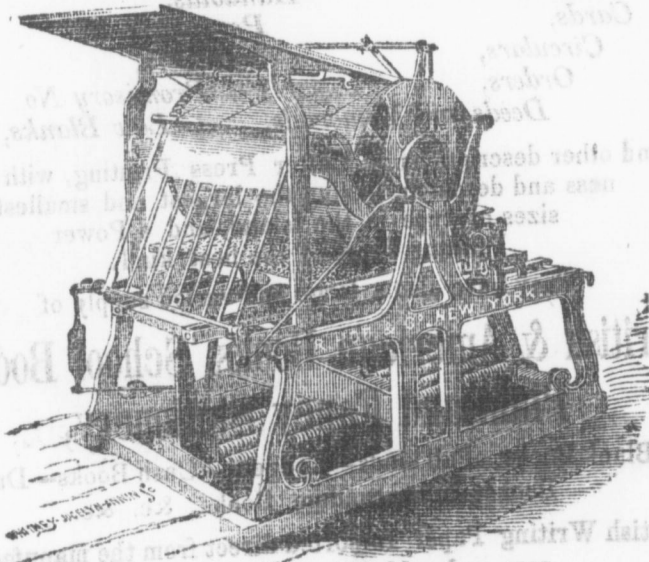
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
