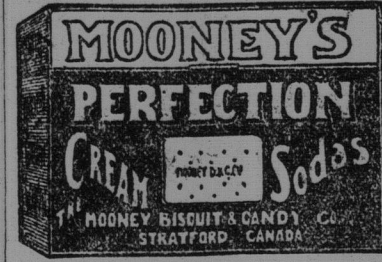

STORMED JAIL; LYNCHED THREE

Salisbury, North Carolina.

CHARLESTON, N. C., Aug. 7.—A mob of 3,000 men last night forcibly entered Rowan county jail at Salisbury, removed three out of six negroes charged with the murder of the Lyster family on July 13, and lynched them.

The negroes were quietly marched northward toward Spices, but a mob made at Henderson ball grounds, in the vicinity of Edgartown. There the negroes were given time to confess the crime. They refused to either deny or confess and were so thoroughly frightened that they almost lost the power of speech. John Gillette wept piteously and begged for his life.

LLOYDMINSTER

It seems that the other day a steamer-load of English immigrants landed at St. John and went west, to settle in the granite wilderness far from the abode of any other white men. This was the Barr colony, accompanied by the Rev. G. E. Lloyd, well known in this city, and now the Abolitionist in the new west. The party went into the wilderness and a settlement afterwards named Lloydminster was established. From time to time conflicting reports came outward, and there were for a time a doubt whether the experiment of founding this colony would prove a success. There is therefore a special interest for St. John people in the following article from the Winnipeg Free Press of last Friday:

"John Thompson, of London, was a guest at the Clarendon Wednesday evening, he said: 'I have just returned from a trip to Lloydminster, where I purchased a farm of 160 acres for my youngest son, with a house and some buildings on it. I have the most perfect faith in this western country, and I now own some town lots in Lloydminster. The lake, three miles away from the town, will, one day or another, be of much value as a supply of pure soft water to Lloydminster. The vegetables were splendid. A more contented people it is impossible to find. I am off now, first of all to Sandhurst, Ont., where I have an older son living. Then across the Atlantic, home to England. I shall tell them what I tell you—this is the most hopeful land that I ever saw.' 'With this, the active old gentleman jumped to his feet. 'You may sell them one more thing, if you like. There is a very good country hotel at Lloydminster, of course, not up to a city hotel, but clean, comfortable and the food is good.'"

TRADE CONDITIONS

A New York letter sets forth the following glowing sentences the industrial and commercial situation in the United States at the present time:— 'What little hesitation has been noticeable in trade circles incidental to fear of crop failure, has disappeared, and activity is remarked on every hand. One of the best indications of the situation is railroad traffic, which is greater than the available supply of cars, necessitating orders for new equipment. Earnings, moreover, show up splendidly, although comparing with very satisfactory results for the previous year, weekly gains for gross averaging from 10 to 15 per cent. Bank clearings, another infallible sign of prosperity, are still expanding, being 12 per cent. higher for the week. 'Building operations are on an unprecedented scale, in conjunction with railroad construction and renewal, keeping the steel mills well supplied with orders. Despite the record-breaking immigration, a scarcity of labor is put in different parts of the country, the railroads being the worst affected in this respect.' Similar conditions are shown to exist in Canada, though, of course, in a smaller field. These facts are far more significant than fluctuations of the stock market, which are not always governed by actual commercial conditions.

AS TO COALITION

Onlooker, in merry mood, in the New Freeman, pictures Hon. Mr. Tweedie and Mr. Hazen gaining popularity at the rising wave of provincial individualism and saying to each other, in effect: 'Either of us alone is as helpless as Carmie of old. This swelling tide will overwhelm the province. Let us unite our

forces and sweep it back into the depths.' There is nothing wrong with Onlooker's argument that the best men of both parties would make a very strong combination; although either party would doubtless contend that it is now stronger in governmental capacity than if it joined hands with members of the other party, unless the latter came around to the way of thinking, in which case there would still be the same old parties, with a slight difference in personnel. It seems to the Times that if certain reforms are needed, the thing to do is to convince the people that one party will institute them, and trust the people to give that party its mandate. If neither of the present parties can do what Onlooker contends should be done, a coalition would hardly be more successful. Moreover, if the people were profoundly convinced that great reforms are needed they would give Mr. Hazen a little more help. The people would very properly resent any attempt on the part of any coalition to make them do something they were not convinced should be done. Any appeal, therefore, it seems to us, should be to the people. When they state their wants the politicians will be found quick to respond.

The lynching of three negroes in North Carolina last night is another illustration of the fact that the people have no respect for the ordinary methods of administering justice in that state. Other states from time to time give similar evidence of a lack of faith.

The experience of those two New York gentlemen who proceeded 225 miles by balloon, moving up and down, as it placed them, and waking up slumbering yachtsmen before daylight to ask for information, will doubtless give an impetus to this method of spending a holiday.

Another important step has been taken in connection with the introduction of manual training in St. John. The school board have decided to equip a separate building, which they own, and which is well suited to the purpose.

The Russian people give further proof that they are not at all temperamentally like the French. Therefore the Russian revolution proceeds very slowly.

Occasionally a man from the west returns and remarks that the climate is good enough for him. We may therefore take courage.

CONDEMNNS DUAL LANGUAGE SCHEME

Saturday Review Uses Quebec as Illustration of Disadvantages of Bi-Lingualism.

In an editorial in Saturday's issue the London Saturday Review, dealing with the Transvaal constitution and referring to the dual language, says, 'With the exception of French Canada before us, could anything be more fatuous than to allow provincial passions to compete in parliament and law courts with the English language. 'The one corner of the Dominion of Canada which remains poor is Quebec, and that is mainly due to bilingualism. 'There was a hope that the new Transvaal parliament might have really influenced public opinion in South Africa and become a centre of eloquence and talent, but how can a deliberative assembly be other than contemptible when orators on one side of the House do not understand what orators on the other side are saying.'

A HANDSOME RECORD

(Montreal Herald.) Even with no election in sight, it is worth while to note how tremendous has been the development of Canadian trade in the past ten years. We all know, of course, that times have been good, and that there has been work for all, that we have made additions to our list of millions, and that even with the poor, their lines have fallen in pleasant places. But probably there are not very many who realize, even with all that, how vast the expansion has been. Going and coming, our trade with the outside world in 1896 was \$2,800,000,000. Say two hundred and forty millions for the three hundred and sixty-five days of the year, or two-thirds of a million for every day. That was imports and exports together. It took quite a little effort when one comes to think of it to bring it up to a million a day, but that stage, representing an advance of one-half was reached in 1900, when the total trade was \$381,517,238. A million dollars a day! Not bad for a little people of five millions or so. Could we hold it? Hold it, yes! And better. During the fiscal year 1906 we did a daily trade of a million and a half a day, and a little better, with the outside world, the total trade for the year being \$592,830,360. From two-thirds of a million a day to a million and a half a day. That is not bad for business. It represents a lot of work, a lot of profit, a lot of comfort, a lot of happiness, a lot of progress, a lot of confidence. Pretty soon we shall be talking about trade and industry for months together, and those who think we can live ourselves to great heights by tugging on our bootstraps will be making most of the noise. Just let us for the present, make up our mind that the great results accomplished during these ten years spells work, intelligent work, work in the fields, in the shops, on the railways, in the departments of government, work everywhere and work always. It sent the careful and indiscriminate placing of barriers that brings results like these. It is work, and a fair field for all who have the products of their labor to sell.

CHEERFUL OUTLOOK (Montreal Witness) There was a great falling off in the number of insolventcies in Canada during the month of July. Commercial defaults only numbered sixty-four, contrasted with one hundred and three in July of 1905. These figures only present one favorable side of the situation, as the amount of liabilities is even more comparatively favorable. Dun's Review shows that in the month in question the amount of liabilities was only \$26,621 compared with \$777,238 last year, and as high as \$1,049,940 in July of 1904. In the commercial failures for July the amount of liability per head of insolvents averaged \$4,619, compared with \$7,540 last year, and \$13,241 in July, 1904—considerable decrease indeed. The figures are eloquent of a wonderful improvement in the manner in which trade obligations are being met.

MONCTON NEWS

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 6.—On application of J. C. Sherren to Judge Landry today, an order for stay of proceedings was issued in the case of the King vs. P. Gallagher, sentenced Thursday last by Police Magistrate Kay to one month in jail with hard labor for theft and violation. The writ is returnable at the Michaelmas supreme court. The main ground taken is that the accused was previously convicted of theft of the same character in the Maine metropolis.

THE ROBINSON FAMILY Former Governor A. R. McLean and Mrs. McLean, of Riverside, and Hon. C. W. Robinson and Mrs. Robinson, of Moncton, who have been attending the Robinson family reunion at Portland (Me.), came in yesterday from Boston.

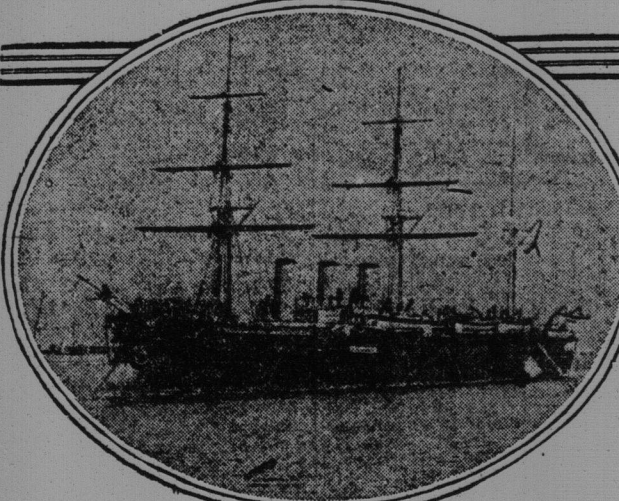

**MEDICAL MEN FROM ST. JOHN**

**Will be Represented at Great Meeting in Toronto This Month.**

At a meeting of the St. John branch of the British Medical Association last night, arrangements were completed for the transportation of the delegates from this city to the meeting in Toronto on Saturday the 18th. One private car has been engaged, but as this will not hold all that are desirous of going, another car will be necessary as many from other points throughout the maritime provinces have expressed a desire to go from here. The larger portion of the party, however, will be the St. John members. The last time that the British Association met in Canada was about nine years ago in Montreal. Some of those going will be accompanied by their wives and all are looking forward to a pleasant trip.

The seventy-fourth annual meeting of the British Medical Association will be held at Toronto, August 21-25, under the presidency of Richard Andrews Reeve, B. A., M. D., LL. D., dean of University of Toronto Faculty of Medicine. This will be the second time that the association has met in Greater Britain, and the visit is arousing much interest throughout the Dominion.

Thirteen scientific sections have been arranged, and will meet daily in the university buildings at 9:30 a. m. viz.: Anatomy, dermatology, laryngology and otology, medicine, obstetrics and gynaecology, ophthalmology, pediatrics, psychology, state medicine, surgery and therapeutics. The programmes arranged throughout promise full and interesting discussions, owing to the large attendance of men of eminence from various parts of the British Empire, Europe and America.

On Tuesday, at 2:30 p. m., an address of welcome will be accorded to members and the ceremony of introducing the distinguished guests and delegates will be performed. This will be immediately followed by the presidential address by Professor Reeve. At 4:30 p. m., in the union and garden party by the president and Mrs. Reeve. At 8:30 an address in obstetrics will be delivered by Dr. W. A. Griffith, London, England, while at 9:30 His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor will receive the members of the association.

On Wednesday, at 2:30 p. m., an address in medicine will be delivered by Sir James Barr, M. D. of Liverpool; and in the afternoon various garden parties have been arranged. In the evening at 8:30 an address in surgery will be delivered by Sir Victor Horsley, F. R. S., of London, Eng., and will be followed by a reception at 9:30 p. m.

On Thursday afternoon garden parties have also been arranged, while at 7:30 p. m. the president will preside at the annual dinner, when a most distinguished gathering is assured.

On Friday afternoon extensive entertainments are promised to members and their friends, while in the evening will be held a grand soiree.

On Saturday several excursions are arranged to Niagara Power Company's plant, through the courtesy of Sir Henry M. Pellat; to Muskoka; and to Lambton, through the courtesy of the president, Mr. Austin.

Mr. Allan was also at the artillery camp at Petawawa, as one of the members of Carleton artillery company, and he received honorable mention for his work at gun sighting.

**THIS MAN KNOWS THE IRONY OF FATE**

**With Medal for Life Saving He is Dying in Poverty.**

(New York American)  
Dying of heart disease on the top floor of a tenement at No. 423 West Thirty-first street, with no money to buy food or medicine, lies L. M. Biller, a man whom Congress once decorated with a medal for heroism in saving lives.

His wife has striven bravely but vainly to keep the wolf from the door, for besides her dying husband, there are also dependent upon her efforts a three-year-old daughter, Tossie, and a son, Carl, who is dying of consumption at Saranac Lake, in the Adirondacks.

Close beside the widow where the husband has been lying since December literally gasping for breath, the great delta and shovels working in the Pennsylvania Railroad tunnel excavation keep up such a constant roar and jangle day and night that it is impossible for the sick man to sleep. What little medicine he has had, his wife has obtained from the free dispensaries, but the family is so poor that even a doctor's visits have to be denied him.

**MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL**

**Tax Discount Rate Remains at Five Per Cent.—The Loch Lomond Dispute.**

At a meeting of the common council yesterday afternoon it was decided that the rate of discount for the prompt payment of taxes remain at five per cent., as at present. The reports of the various boards were adopted with but few amendments.

In the board of works report the session relating to the lease of the N. B. Southern Railway, and the King street slip, Carleton, and the King street slip, Carleton, were referred back for further consideration.

The mayor, Ald. Baxter and Bullock were authorized to attend the sixth convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities to be held in Halifax next week. Arrangements for the entertainment of members who would pass through the city and Upper Canada were left in their hands.

A letter from Hon. H. A. McKeown on behalf of Mrs. Sterling H. Barker, of the Ben Lomond House was read. It was stated that Mrs. Barker would not give up any property in connection with the city's negotiations to acquire a strip of land fronting the lake. She required the city to build a septic tank if drainage into the lake was to be discontinued and pay \$500 as damages.

After some discussion in which it was claimed that every means had been taken to treat Mrs. Barker as fairly as possible, the recorder was instructed, on motion, to apply for an injunction to restrain from severing into the source of the city's water supply.

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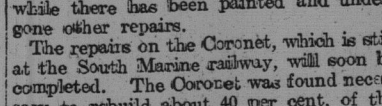

NEW OFFICERS

TUG ADMIRAL ON THE ROCKS

Was Taken Off but is Full of Water at her Wharf.

The tug Admiral, owned by Parker Glasier, of D. D. Glasier & Son, went on the rocks below Deep Cove this morning.

About six o'clock the fog was very dense, when Capt. Knox, of the Admiral, was towing a raft of logs past Cushing's mill. The tug was proceeding very slowly, as the captain and mate realized the danger they were in if they went rapidly.

The logs close to the shore, and being deceived by the current, the bow of the tug struck the rocks and in fifteen minutes the tug had filled.

As soon as the accident occurred, the captain headed the boat for her wharf, but she filled so rapidly that when half way across the river the boats had to be resorted to. The whistle was blown, and the tug Captain responded and towed her to her wharf, where she is now lying.

Seats, covers, wood, etc., hoisted from the tug into the river and the boat set free. The stern of her, however, remained adrift, but the bow is well down.

Parker Glasier is at Frederickton and Fred Myles, agent of the firm of D. D. Glasier & Son, procured the services of the firm of Robert Roberts, who sent up three scoops to assist in raising the Admiral from her predicament. A fourth scoop was also procured.

It is expected that the tug will be taken down through the falls tomorrow morning, and that inside of a week she will be made ready for the river.

At noon she was lying almost submerged at her wharf and the scoops were at work endeavoring to get the water out of her.

WILL TALK WITH MR. EMMERSON

About the Granite Pavement Wanted on the Mill Street Mud Hole.

This afternoon Hon. Mr. Emmerson will meet the mayor, Ald. McColvick and others to talk over the improvements which the city has asked for, in connection with the I. C. R. property at Mill street.

The memorial recently sent to Mr. Emmerson sets forth that on the north side of the street there are several mud holes, the ground is soft and muddy from the traffic of heavy teams, and the mud and dirt are carried by the wheels of the vehicles onto the sidewalks, making it very objectionable. The same state of affairs exists at the Paradise Row entrance to the freight docks.

The city asks that the railway people lay a granite pavement from some fifty feet eastward from the east side of Mill street, and that the pavement be finished by each street. They ask also that two extra electric lines be laid, one on each side of the street as a preventive against accidents.

When Mr. Emmerson was asked by a Times man about these matters, said that they were being considered by the department, but at present he could not say what would be done. He had intended, he said, to have met the committee this morning, but considerable of his time had been taken up as a driver to Fairville, and the matter would have to be left until this afternoon.

IN THE ABODE OF JUSTICE

Five weary-looking subjects of King Alcohol gave an account of their misdeeds at this morning's session of the police court, and to each was meted out the reward of justice.

Honore Milliken was charged with being drunk on St. John street, and wanted to say that he "wasn't drunk." His case was alighted, and the policeman "van him in." He was hustled to catch the boat, and his game he played him false. He had been drinking nothing, he said, and could not afford to drink. He could not recollect having been seen on the ground on several previous occasions. He informed the court that he was living at Bay Shore and was allowed to go.

Chas. McEviney was fined \$4 or ten days, and John Magee was fined \$8 or two months for drunkenness.

It was all up with the big Swede when Chas. O'burg was run in last night by Policeman Ross. He had made too free with the cup of joy but was still able to do a sprint and take refuge in the tall weeds in the midst of which his shifty pate was discovered by the wary official.

He told the officer he was going on the harvest excursion in an effort to earn money to come to grief. O'burg had to have an interpreter in court and through him it was learned he had money for his ticket, but not much more. He was liberated on condition that he go west tonight. On learning the decision of the court O'burg's face was all smiles, and with an elaborate bow to his honor, he said: "Thank ya," and walked out of the court amid the laughter of the spectators.

EXCURSION OF THE HARVESTERS

The annual harvesters' excursions of the C. P. R. will commence tonight, and it is estimated that about 3,000 stalwart men will leave this evening for the golden west, there to assist in harvesting the immense wheat crops.

Seventy colonists' cars will be utilized by the C. P. R. for carrying the farm laborers, and private detectives will accompany each train to preserve order. There will be five trains in all.

The first train is expected to get away between 6:30 and 7:30 this evening, and will take the men from St. John and vicinity and those which arrive on the D. A. R. steamer this afternoon.

A special train, consisting of ten colonist cars, will leave Point de Chene about 8 o'clock on the arrival of the steamer from P. E. Island. It is expected that about 600 men will go from the island.

Two trains will carry the Nova Scotia contingent, and one will leave Cape Breton in the early morning. They will all pass through St. John during the night or tomorrow.
