

London, July 21—The British line north of Basentin and Longueval has been pushed forward to Foreaux Wood. This the war office announced today. The British drove the Germans from the wood, but subsequently lost part of this position. The statement follows: "The battle continues without intermission between the Leipsic redoubt on the west and the Delville wood on the east. North of the Bazentin-Longeuval line the British advance has been pushed to Foureaux wood from which we drove the enemy. "During the night the enemy counter attacked, after an intense bombard-ment with gas shells and succeeded in effecting entry into the northern part of the wood, but failed to dislodge us from the southern half. Elsewhere there is no change." There were nine committees, and each brought to the study of its particular subject a keen in-telligence, a broad knowledge of public affairs, and a desire to find a solution of the grave problems that will confront the people of Canada after the war. ### SIMULTANEOUS ATTACKS ON ALL FRONTS MAY FORCE ENEMY TO SHORTEN THINLY HELD LINES

London, July 20-While a strong but unsuccessful German counter offensive is still being fought out n the British front, the Teutonic armies find themselves again the object of a simultaneous attack on both eastern and western fronts. The recent successful advance having brought the British into line with the French at Hardecourt, the French offensive, which has been for some time in preparation, has been

renewed energetically on both sides of the Somme, on a front of about five miles, thus far successfully. Official despatches from the British and French headquarters tonight show a further advance by both armies. The British pushed forward their line about 1,000 yards north of the Bazentin-Longueval sector, and are still fighting fiercely with the Germans in the outskirts of Longueval and in the Delville Wood.

The French, having renewed their offensive, captured a considerable stretch of German trenches in the neighborhood of Estrees, and in engagements on both sides of the river have taken nearly 3,000 additional prisoners.


At the same time, according to Rome reports, the violent Russian offensive has been resumed in the Carpathians, at Kovel, Vladimir-Volynski and in the Riga sector. Unofflical despatches from Petrograd say that the second stage of the battle for the possession of Kovel is continuing with extreme violence. General Brussiloff has brought up crushing forces from the Stokhod to the Lipa to attack the Austro-Germans, and anxiety as to their ability to withstand a continuance of the pressure is beginning to be reflected in the Berlin comments on the situation.

Military critics here discuss the new situation which has arisen, pointing out that Germany is now compelled to act on the defensive, and they speculate as to how soon Germany may find herself obliged to make retirements in an attempt to shorten her extensive, but supposedly thinly held lines, especially

that the Deutschland will leave Balti-more and make her attempt to cross the ocean. Her cargo is a vital necessity to Germany, and every day's delay will injure the cause of the Central Powers. Therefore, the effort will be made with-out delay. The odds that the Deutsch-land will make a clean get-away are greatly in favor of the submarine. From Baltimore it has about 175 miles to go before it reaches the spot where a prowl-ing British destroyer would be allowed to attack. Until the three-mile limit is reached the Deutschland can proceed on the surface of the water if that is de-sirable, or it can make the whole trip submerged if the captain chooses. Once the three-mile limit is reached between Cape Henry and Cape Charles, the Deutschland will have to submerge if there are hostile ships in the neighbor-hood.


