TWELVE MEN ARE BURNED TO DEATH

Fire in Boarding House at Niagara

LIST MAY GROW

Former Bartender Shoots Hotel Man's Daughter When Ordered from the Place—Manitoba Elections May Be Held on July 11

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 15.—(Special)—Twelve foreigners, all workmen on the Canadian power development, were burned to death early this morning, while eight others were seriously injured, and some of them may die. The fire was in the boarding house at the Falls View.

Woodstock, Ont., June 1.—(Special)—An angry riot broke out in front of the Buckingham Hotel while intoxicated, Frank N. Scott, formerly employed as bartender last evening fired three shots at Mrs. McBride, daughter of H. Willis, proprietor of the hotel. Only one bullet took effect, lodging in the woman's left arm. Scott was overpowered by Grand Trunk Detective Tidale and lodged in jail.

Dressed Beef Cheaper

Chicago, June 15.—The first change made in dressed beef prices in three weeks by wholesalers, went into effect today and it resulted in a drop of half a cent a pound. It affected only the cheaper cuts of dressed beef, bringing No. 3 rounds to 12 cents, No. 1 chunks to 13 cents, as compared with 9 and 12 cents before the decline was enforced.

FLYING IN EFFORT TO WIN \$5,000

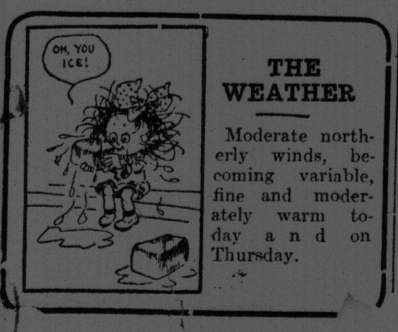

THE TREATY-MAKING POWER OF THE DOMINIONS

(Manchester Guardian)

A White Paper issued by the Colonial office sets aside by side two views of the regions of the colonies in regard to the negotiation of commercial treaties with a foreign power. Both are the views of Liberal ministers, but one marks a considerable advance on the other. In 1895 Lord Ripon, then colonial secretary, laid down the rule that a colony could only approach a foreign power with which it desired to conclude a commercial treaty through a British representative, and that "to give the colonies the power of negotiating treaties for themselves without reference to Her Majesty's government would be to give them an international status as separate and foreign states, and would be equivalent to breaking up the Empire into a number of independent states." Twelve years later, when Canada was anxious to revise her commercial relations with France, Sir Edward Grey substantially modified this doctrine. He left the negotiations on the British side entirely to the Canadian representatives, in conjunction with the French foreign office they drew up a draft convention and communicated it to the British ambassador in Paris; and after it had been approved by the foreign office in London, signed it jointly with the Canadian negotiators. Sir Edward Grey justifies the change of procedure as principally a matter of convenience, but of course it is more than that; for Canada, instead of merely making suggestions through a British ambassador, virtually negotiates as an equal with a foreign power. What, then, becomes of the consequences fore shadowed by Lord Ripon? They do not follow, however the British ambassador is a joint signatory of the treaty and his government takes responsibility for it just as much as though the whole negotiations had been carried on by him. It is a necessary inference, therefore, that the British government would refuse to sign a treaty which contained any provisions of which it disapproved for to regard the sanction of the imperial government as a purely formal matter would be to make it responsible for the consequences, whatever they might be, of agreements which had not received its considered approval. That, of course, is why the greater freedom given in 1907 to Canada was limited by Sir Edward Grey to "commercial negotiations of this nature." Political questions, such as affecting the New Hebrides, stand in a wholly different category, and are in the hands of the imperial government. The imperial government, therefore, must decide them, while weighing carefully and giving all possible effect to the colonial point of view.

I think all favors, all kindnesses, all helps in life ought to be treated that way. Very, very often one cannot hope to repay one's benefactors. But I don't think that inability relieves one from the moral obligation to keep the credit and debit sides of one's kindness account with a balance on the right side by "passing it on."

If you do this, I firmly believe that in the great clearing of kindness the original benefactor will somehow receive his own again.

That wouldn't be any more wonderful than your receiving the money in New York on a check from a bank in San Francisco and the New York bank being safely reimbursed, would it? And, just think, man is managing that business, as God the other.

I know a man whose brother many years ago advanced the money to send him to college. He planned to pay it back, but before he finished his course, his brother died. Instead of bewailing himself that he could never pay that kindness back, he "passed it on." That is as soon as he got on his feet financially, he gave the sum of money his own education had cost to another ambitious young man who lacked the funds to enter the college he craved, and when that boy would have repaid the money, he was told to keep it until he found another ambitious young man who stood in need of it.

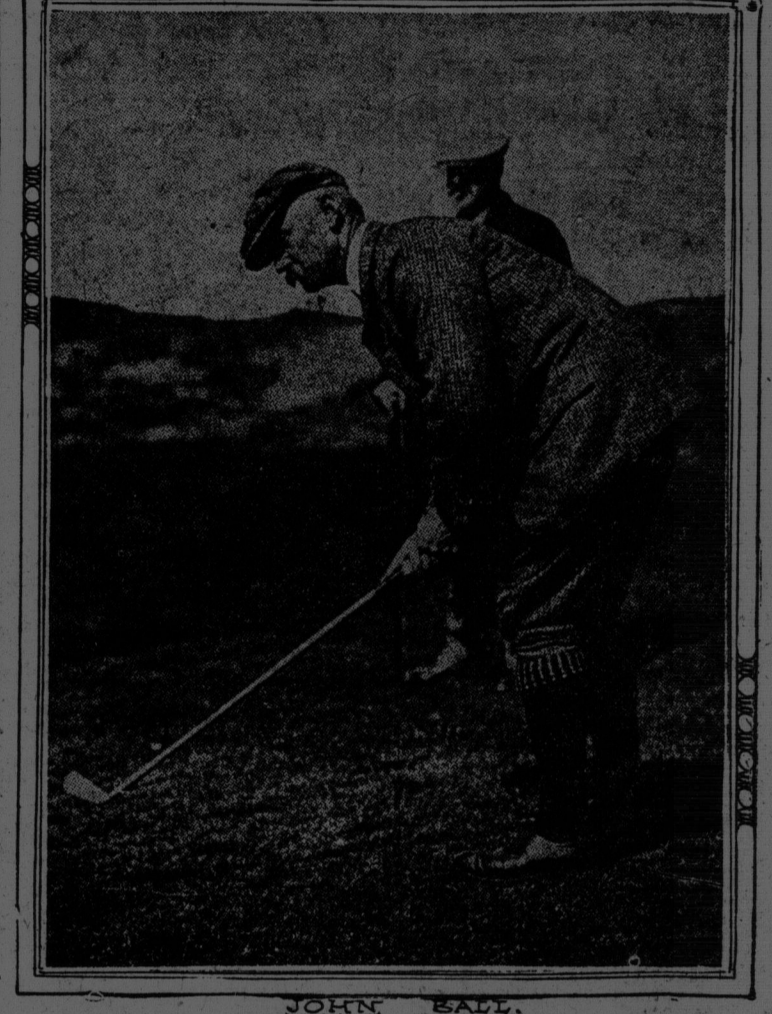

ADMIRAL DOUGLAS A Canadian Who Has Done Much for the British Empire

(Montreal Gazette.)
The career of Admiral Douglas, like those of other distinguished Canadians, Sir Percy Grouard, for instance, may well be a notable incentive to the youth of Canada to seek the opportunity for doing great service to the Empire, and gaining high honor for themselves. Born in Quebec he entered the navy at the age of 14, and passing through all grades in succession, he became commander-in-chief in the East Indies, 1888-92; Lord of Admiralty, 1890-92; commander-in-chief on the North American station, 1902-04, and commander-in-chief at Portsmouth, 1904-7. In this last position it was his duty as the representative of the navy to show the courtesies of the fleet to foreign princes and kings, including the Emperor of Germany. The typical British sailor was a Canadian.

NEW DONALDSON LINER ON THE WAY OUT

The new steamship Niagara, which the Donaldson line has had built for its Montreal-Glasgow service, sailed from Glasgow on Saturday under the command of James A. Beatty, left more than 100 stow-away passengers for Canada. The vessel's speed is estimated to be over 30 knots, so that she should arrive at Montreal on Sunday next.
