He has spent three months in the Dominion and has visited every province. This morning he conferred with Premier Baxter and F. Maclure Sclanders, commissioner of the Saint John Board of Trade.

Mr. Smith was reticent about immigration matters as affecting .ew Brunswick. He said that he had cancelled all his speaking engagements and refused further interviews as his remarks might be wrongly construed particularly in view of the coming Federal election.

"I will say this," he added, "that there is no use to bring people to Canada unless they succeed and my opinion is that the question of wider markets is the one vital question in Canada at the present time."
