Sir George E. Foster's Letter to President of the United Veterans.

Ottawa, April 6—A letter sent by Sir George E. Foster to President Sir Harry Flynn, of the United Veterans, was made public last night by the latter. It is as follows:—"Mr. J. Harry Flynn, New Russell, Ont. Dear Mr. Flynn:—"The reasons why the government felt it was out of place that you should be received, either as a member or as a spokesman of the delegation of returned soldiers which was held in Montreal, are probably quite well known to you. You have publicly employed such language to characterize your opinion of the government and its members that it did not seem likely to admit you to a conference with them. "If you really believe what you have repeated so often of them, one can scarcely see why you seek to meet them, and if you did not, there is all the greater reason why the government should decline to meet you. PRINCE'S HORSES ON WAY TO CANADA

Germans Had Sent Troops Into Ruhr Without Permission

Matter of Interest Is Attitude of Other Allies—Germans Make Last Hour Effort to Prevent Occupation—French Troops Now in Control in Frankfurt and Other Cities.

(Associated Press.) Mayence, April 6—French troops entered Frankfurt by five o'clock this morning, finding only a small German force, left there to afford protection for the people. The occupation of the city was a mere military march and was not attended by any fighting. Darmstadt was entered afterwards by French forces. The German government agreement with the Allies, which provided that the city should be handed over to the French, was not violated. Gen. De Goutte has issued a proclamation to the cities and towns within the area to be affected by the presence of French troops. State of Siege

The proclamation makes the following provisions for public order:—"The cities of Darmstadt, Offenbach, Hochstadt, Koenigsberg and Liebig, as well as all towns and districts within the circles of Gross Gerau, Lang Schwabach and Wiesbaden, with the exception of Biebrich, are declared under a state of siege. German authorities and public services will continue to function under the provisions of the proclamation. Military officials, and strikes will not be tolerated. People are temporarily forbidden to circulate in the various communities from 9 o'clock at night until five in the morning. More than five persons must not collect in streets or in private or public meetings without authorization. Newspapers are temporarily suspended and permission must be given to use the telephone and telegraph. Postal communication is temporarily established, wireless installations must be dismantled, and the use of carrier pigeons is forbidden. All arms and grenades must be deposited in city halls within six hours after the posting of the proclamation but hereafter at 4:45 o'clock this morning, which was anticipated since last night, found the streets of Frankfurt deserted, as is

Tanks With Them. It was about 9 o'clock this morning when French troops with tanks entered Frankfurt. They were followed by a battalion of sharpshooters and a company of engineers, and these troops occupied strategic points and the railroad station. Half a dozen tanks were posted near the station and the barracks and another force was stationed near police headquarters and the post office. These troops held the important entrances to the city until nine o'clock when a battalion of chasseurs derailed at the station. The French troops also took over the barracks near the post office, the presidency of police, the post, telegraph and telephone office and the principal gates of the town. There was no trouble. Other Cities. Paris, April 6—French soldiers today occupied the German city of Frankfurt-on-Main and Darmstadt, sixteen miles south. Forces commanded by General De Goutte, which have been holding the Mayence bridgehead, were ordered forward by Marshal Foch following the efforts on the part of the French government yesterday to induce the Berlin government to withdraw its forces from the neutral zone along the eastern bank of the Rhine, where they had been ordered to disperse communitate units that for the last fortnight have conducted a retreat in the Ruhr valley. Chief interest in the situation as traced by newspapers here is whether the Allies will support France, and to what extent. This query was put to Premier Millerand by the Echo de Paris last night, the premier answering:—"England was victorious, and so was France. I am confident everything will work out perfectly." Asked who would pay the expense incident to occupation, Millerand replied:—"Why, Germany, obviously, since it was she that, by her acts, obliged us to resort to coercion." Premier Millerand today formally notified Dr. Von Bayer, the German chargé d'affaires, of the action of the French government in ordering the advance of French troops into the neutral zone. It had been complete evacuation of the neutral zone by the German troops in consequence of which Frankfurt is the most important. German Report. Berlin, April 6—The progress of the German troops into the Ruhr region was chronicled in an official statement issued yesterday which reads:—"The advance of police forces in the industrial region is proceeding according to plan. Regular troops are present north of Dortmund, Westphalia, which has not yet been occupied. The clearing action is also progressing east of Dortmund, which the first detachment has just entered, and where it advanced against stronger detachments of Red Guards on the Leunen-Kamen mine. In the Hoerle district, the Wickle railway station has been stormed by Red Guards as were also the Admiral and Gluckauf mines. Considerable plundering occurred in Dortmund. At Essen the Krupp provision department was robbed. The Reds lost 300 killed in fighting with government troops near Pölsheim, southwest of Hamm, Westphalia, according to a despatch from Hamm to the Loket Anzeiger today. Work the butter with a spoon (a large wooden one is best), mixing color in thoroughly, and in a minute you will find it the color of June grass butter. Do not heat the butter before mixing; but if it is left in a warm room for a while before mixing it will color more easily.  
 Nearly all butter made in the winter time is colored in this way when it is made.

**SIX TO FACE MURDER TRIAL**  
 Criminal Session of Court in Quebec Opened Today — I. C. R. Mail Robbery Case Also.  
 (Canadian Press)  
 Quebec, April 6.—The criminal term of the court of kings bench opened here today with His Honor Judge L. P. Pelletier presiding. There are six cases of murder to be tried including Gagnon and his wife from St. Philomena de Lotbiniere, charged with the killing of their daughter, aged twelve years. They will be tried separately; the King vs. Romeo Reouillard and his father, for the murder of Lucien Morrisette at Bienville in January. FRANCE GIVES WARNING.

The occupation of Frankfurt by French troops is a sequence of the failure of Germany to fulfill the clauses of the peace treaty calling for disarmament. Had those clauses been carried out there would have been no attempts at revolution in Germany, nor would the trouble in the Ruhr district have become critical.

With a French army of occupation in Frankfurt the Germans have cause for reflection. They will probably be wise enough to adopt a more conciliatory policy.

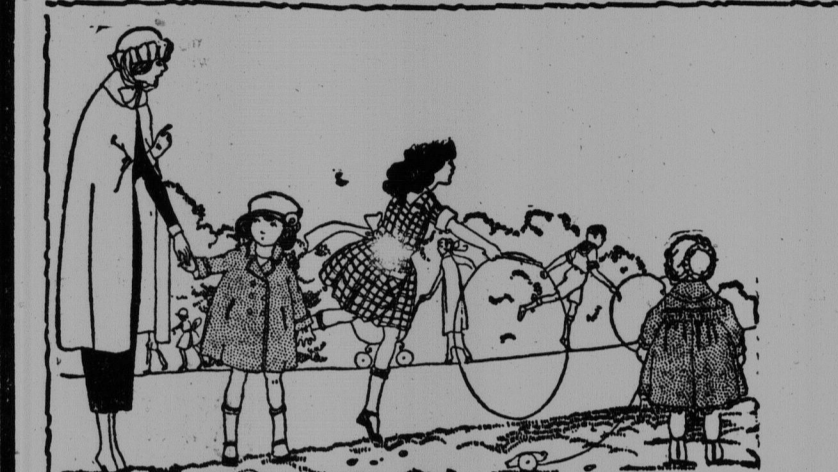

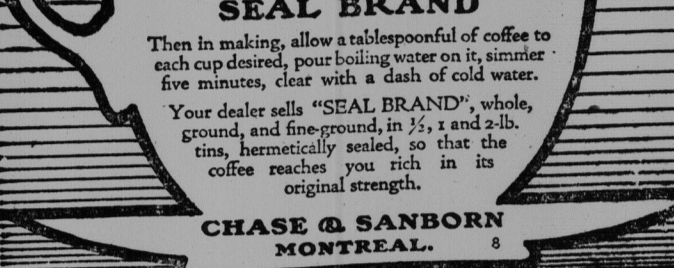
"Once the committee reaches an agreement," he added, "there will be no time lost on the part of the miners in putting it into operation. If the tri-district convention approves it."

\$40,000 DAMAGES FOR FRACTURED LEG

Valuation of a Woman Is Now Fixed at \$40,000.

FRENCH WOMAN HONORED BY FOCH

Madam Renon Won Military Cross in 1871—Now Receives Legion of Honor.

Paris, April 6.—One of the most interesting French war heroines is Madame Renon, on whom Marshal Foch has just conferred the Legion of Honor. Madame Renon was a canteen keeper with the French forces in the war against Prussia in 1871. She was seriously wounded at Montretout, and for her bravery she received the French Military Cross, one of the most coveted decorations in the French army.

Madame Renon was seventy-one years old when, in 1914, she joined the French army as a nurse. First she tended and cared for the wounded, then helped to revivify the civilian population in the devastated territories. 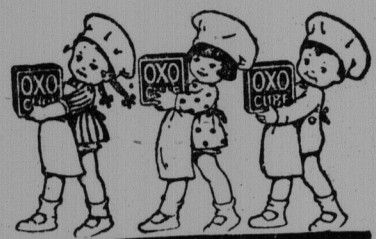
Twenty-One Claims Filed at Alaskan, Sask.—Thought to Be Mother Vein of Saskatchewan Gold Fields.

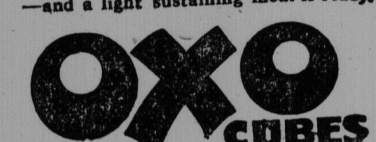

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for week ended April 1, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto makes the following comment: Prices continue to provide considerable speculation in the steel and iron markets. 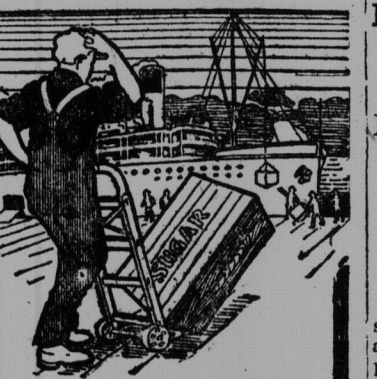

### FINDING WAY BACK TO ENGLAND

Huns and Other Deported Undesirables Drifting Back—No Glad Hand There for Them.

London, March 19—(A. P. Correspondent.)—Large numbers of German and other undesirable who were deported from England in the war have managed to make their way back to London but have encountered warm reception when their identity has been discovered. They managed to cross from the continent by working their way as sailors on tramp steamers to northern English and Scottish ports.

These Germans who have come back to England to take up business again find it a hard row to hoe, says the Evening Standard. One German businessman gave it up and returned to his fatherland after being refused admission to five London hotels. He found rooms in a Bloomsbury boarding house but two days later the other boarders discovered him, and notified the manager they could not live under the same roof with a German and he was turned out.

A German butcher in a London suburb was prevented by his neighbors from reopening his old store the other day, although he had lived in England for forty years, and there are many similar cases.

Neither captain nor crew of the steamer Spica, which was captured by the British off the coast of the Azores in August, 1914, were allowed ashore at Melthill and, in deference to local opinion, the vessel did not display the German flag.

On the other hand, a revival of "Tannhauser" at Covent Garden Opera recently drew a crowded and appreciative audience of society people. The cast, however, was wholly English.

You may camouflage it for a time, but sooner or later it is bound to break through.

There's been a question lately as to why the major portion of the frontage of Queen Square has been allowed to go unpaved for 20 years. Who is the guilty party?

The culprit has at last been discovered.

"General Assessment" did it, and "general assessment" will do it again, if the abutters' law does not come into effect.

What a pity that such beautiful surroundings should be the application of a false and selfish principle be allowed to drift into slum conditions!

### AT IMPERIAL THEATRE

Have you noticed what a nice paved street there is opposite the Imperial Theatre? The abutters paid half the cost of it, and they got their money's worth. Tom, Dick and Harry paid the other half, and they, perhaps, got value for their money, too. But would it be fair now to ask Tom, Dick and Harry to put their hands into their pockets to pay back to the abutters what they have paid for value received? Yet that is what some of the city commissioners propose to do if general assessment is continued.

### A CONUNDRUM

"Pa," said Willie, "is a zebra a white animal with dark stripes or a dark animal with white stripes?"

"Well, Willie," replied pa, "if you'll tell me how the thirty or forty miles of permanently unpaved streets of St. John are to be provided with permanent pavements under general assessment, I'll answer your conundrum."

Willie is still thinking it out.

### WHY—HALIFAX?

HALIFAX has more paved streets than St. John. Why? Because in Halifax they don't load the whole cost on the general taxpayer—the abutters pay half and no kick coming.

### TIME AND MONEY

How much increase in tax rate can you stand? Twenty cents? Then for that amount of increase in rate you can get as much paving in five years, under the new paving law, as you would get in ten years under the present system. Or, put it another way—you get twice as much paving done in a given time with no greater increase in the general Tax Rate.

### ONE OF THE MOURNERS

Wife—Why do you wear that costume? It looks like half-mourning.

Husband—Well, that is just what it is. It is enough to make a man mourn for his city when it is being pumped full of the idea that good streets can be obtained under a plan of general assessment.

### LIFE TOO SHORT TO WAIT

We want paved streets, but we will never get many of them under the present system. Life is too short. Paving will wear out faster than it can be paid for and renewed under general assessment. The average taxpayer owning no property could not afford it and would not stand for the rate that would be necessary. The only way to get good streets and plenty of them is for the owner of abutting property to pay a fair share of the cost for the extra benefit he receives.

### ENOUGH IS A FEAST

A lady writes that her most embarrassed moment was, when being one of four guests at dinner, she was urged by her hostess to have a little more of a certain dish, and replied unthinkingly: "No, thank you, I'll do well if I get rid of what I have here."

St. John will do well if it survives the idea that it is being fed upon, that general assessment in paving matters is what it wants.

### WHAT WILL THEY SAY?

What will posterity say of the men who through the adoption of a false principle, stayed the progress of St. John? What will be their verdict of their lack of vision and selfishness? Will they be proud of them?

### SPORTING DUCHESS FINE PICTURE AT UNIQUE THEATRE

**PEGASUS IS A REALITY.**  
Horse Show Entrant Is to Be Transported by Plane.

Los Angeles, Cal., April 6—Development of aviation as a science has made the flying horse a reality. No longer is Pegasus a fable, for, this year at the Ambassador Horse Show at Santa Barbara, which opens next week, one of the assured novelties will be an entrant arriving by plane. A plane was carried from London to Paris by air; an orange tree recently was transported across the Arona-California boundary, but it is something new, combined with Californian enthusiasm and imagination, to conceive of taking a real live temperamental, petted horse, putting him aboard an aeroplane, transporting him more than 10 miles, and setting him down to draw a prize. This, according to all preparations now made, will be done next Wednesday here, the opening day of the four-day show at American millionaires' winter playground.

Mercury is the name of the horse which will enjoy the distinction of being "pegasus-for-sure." For the trip, which is being looked after in its detail by Lieutenant-Colonel S. Burwell, former commander at Rockwell Field, special rubber overhoofs are being provided for the horse, which also will wear a "helmet" to protect the head and the neck.

The plane will be piloted by Lieutenant David Thompson, U. S. A., and the flight will be conducted by the Aero Club of America. Mercury, as an entrant, will be sponsored by Miss Janie McPherson, who will be the Ambassador hotel parlour, Santa Barbara, and the unique incident is to be made an invitation affair.

**GET WOMAN AS MOONSHINER.**  
Prohibition Agents Seize Three Still in Her Massachusetts Home.

Springfield, Mass., April 6—With the arrest of Mrs. Victoria Bialo of West Springfield by police and prohibition officers, the authorities believe they have taken the first woman moonshine whiskey manufacturer in the country. 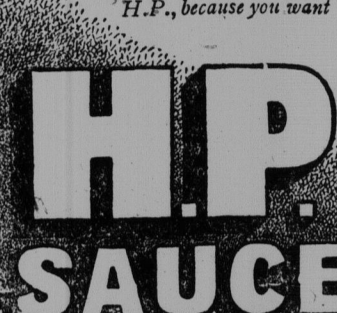

**BEFORE CHIEF JUSTICE**

In chambers this morning, before Sir Douglas Hazen, chief justice, argument was heard in the matter of Edson M. Wilson vs. Charles B. Wilson, an application by the plaintiff (applicant) for an extension of time to serve notice of appeal. The question arose as to whether an extension of time could be granted where a solicitor for the plaintiff was in fault, but His Honor held that, while ordinarily speaking this would not be granted, yet it appeared that it was not so much a question of fault as it was of inability on the part of the solicitor to get in touch with his client in order to receive instructions, and therefore he would grant the request for time extension.

This matter arises out of a dispute as to title and possession of land in Queens county under the Farm Settlement Board. It has previously been decided in favor of the defendant (respondent) here and at Fredericton and is now to be taken to Ottawa. G. H. V. Belyea, K.C. and K. A. Wilson are for the plaintiff, and Dr. W. B. Wallace, K.C., for the defendant.

**SHARON TO HANDLE COLBETH STRING**

Plan for Maritime and Maine Racing Circuit—Great Season in New York.

Fredericton, April 6—William Sharon, for several years trainer and driver for local horsemen, is to handle the racing stable of George M. Colbeth of Presque Isle, Maine, this season. He will soon take up his new duties. It is said he will also have Bill Sharon, 216 1-4, champion, four-year-old trotter of the maritime provinces, owned by Sam J. Boyle of Fredericton in his stable and Mr. Colbeth will have Baby Doll, 210 1-4, and some of his other aged horses now in the stable of William Fleming at Commination Park, Boston, sent to Presque Isle and campaigned by Driver Sharon down the maritime and Maine shortship circuit from July until September.

Albany, N. Y., April 6—Horse racing under the supervision of the state racing commission had in 1919 the most successful year in its history, according to the annual report of the commission. Purses and prizes amounted to \$1,835,000, or more than \$400,000 greater than in the previous year.

**CARS OF LIQUOR HERE FOR THE WEST INDIES**

Whether in anticipation of a lucrative tourist season or to alleviate drought among regular inhabitants heavy shipments of liquor are now being made to the West Indies. There are in St. John today fourteen carloads of liquor to be shipped aboard the S. S. Canadian.

Extra police have been detailed for service to guard the shipments. A. J. Tingley, district special agent in the police department of the C. N. R. at Moncton, is in the city supervising shipments.

**SENT UP FOR TRIAL**

Turn in North End Oats Case—Today's Police Court.

In the police court this morning a case against John Kelly, charged with receiving stolen goods knowing them to be such, was called up and he was sent up for trial. This case arose out of a preliminary examination in which Kenneth Morris and Cornelius Flynn were charged with stealing oats from the barn of G. Selig in Main street and taking some of them to the barn of the accused. Policemen Keirstead, Garnett and McFarland gave evidence. W. M. Ryan counsel for the defence, applied for bail, but this was refused.

Worthington Rowley was charged with creating a disturbance in the Park hotel. J. D. Seely, the proprietor, told of calling a policeman to have the man put out. The policeman gave evidence, and the accused was remanded.

Alphons Ehuson, charged with being drunk and also with having a loaded revolver in his possession, was fined \$108 or eight months in jail.

John Mitchell, charged with having liquor in his possession on board the steamship Scotia, during her last voyage across the Atlantic; Jules Cappare, Frantz Durasse and Joseph Bassene, charged with selling liquor on board the liner, all of whom were convicted before the magistrate recently and fined \$50, each, were allowed to go this morning on payment of the fines, and will go back to Antwerp on board the steamship Scandinavia when she sails.

Two men charged with drunkenness pleaded guilty and were remanded to jail.

**SOLDIER VOTE IN THE COMING CITY ELECTIONS**

The common clerk has received several inquiries during the last few days as to the standing of returned soldiers in the coming civic elections, and the following is the section of the act covering their eligibility to vote:

"Notwithstanding anything contained in any act of assembly every male person of the age of twenty-one years being a British subject and not otherwise legally incapacitated, shall be entitled to vote at any city, town or municipal election, held during the present year, or within one year after the first day of January succeeding the date of the declaration of peace, if he shall have served in the Canadian expeditionary forces, or in the British army, or on home service during the war and was, at the time of his enlistment, a bona fide resident and domiciled in the province of New Brunswick, and is, at the time of tendering his vote, a bona fide resident and domiciled in the city, town or municipality in which the vote is tendered, provided that no person discharged from service of misconduct shall be entitled to vote under and by virtue of this section, and further provided, that at the time of tendering his vote, if called upon to do so, if discharged, he shall produce his discharge papers.

The official date of the declaration of peace is given as Jan. 10, 1920.

**FERNHILL MATTERS**

At the annual meeting of the lotholders of Fernhill Cemetery Company yesterday afternoon, referred to yesterday, among the improvements recorded was the establishment of a small lot under perpetual care where one or two graves can be reserved by those not requiring a lot; the ordering of a new power lawn mower, the erection of a memorial by the L. O. D. E. on the home and military plot; the presentation of a drinking fountain in memory of Trooper J. S. Clayton by his family; and the preparation of a new section of lots at graded prices on Central avenue. The case of upkeep was shown to have increased considerably, the bill for labor alone amounting to \$11,182. A very satisfactory increase was shown in lots held under perpetual care.

The directors were complimented by the lotholders on the improvements accomplished in the grounds during the year, and the satisfactory condition of affairs. The question of caring for neglected lots was discussed and suggestions were advanced as to ways and means of providing care for those lots where the owners were dead or lost sight of, one suggestion being that a special collection might be taken in the churches once a year for that purpose.

**A WAR GAME**

A unique form of amusement will be given in military circles soon, when a war game will be staged at the armory in which two or more persons may take part. It is played on a huge map and battalions, cavalry, artillery and sentries are represented by figures for each unit. The armies in battle are called the "reds" and "blues." They are formed in battle order by the commanding officers, who will issue orders to their subordinate officers and the figures will be manoeuvred on the map. The game is governed by umpires, Brigadier General A. H. Macdonnell, C. M. G., D. S. O., G. O. C. of M. D. No. 7 is to be chief umpire. The commanding officers will be Lieut. Colonel A. J. Markham for the "reds" and Lieut. Colonel W. H. Harrison for the "blues." All officers, although not taking part, are asked to witness this game as it is instructive and will be especially so in this case as the manoeuvres are being handled by men who have seen actual service.

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
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
