SAYS SUICIDE NO POSSIBLE

Dr. Thorne Witness in The Kings County Mystery Case EVIDENCE TODAY

Four Witnesses Tell of Circumstances Surrounding Wm. Ryder's Death - The Inquest Will Likely Not Be Concluded Till Next Week

(Special to Times) Newton, Kings County, N. B., Oct. 28.—The inquest into the death of William Ryder was resumed in the public hall here this morning, Coroner Wallace presiding.

Dr. Thorne described the wounds in the body and their position. He said that the bullet entered the front of the head nearest the breast-bone and also the one next to it. He could not see any marks around the wound under the arm.

N. W. Manning Newton, W. Manning was the next witness. He said that he found the body on Friday morning about 11 o'clock.

SKELETON OF GIANT SAURIAN FOUND ON P. E. ISLAND

Then Some One Carried it Away and Finder is Out

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Oct. 28.—(Special)—What looks like the remains of a gigantic saurian of the crocodile family was discovered on the beach at Grand Traverse by the foreman of the men engaged in constructing the breakwater there.

During a heavy storm large quantities of sand were shifted, and the bones, which were carried away by the waves, were discovered. This is no recent story but a genuine find which has many points of scientific value.

DO NOT CREDIT REPORT OF CHINESE REBELS' DEFEAT

Shanghai Receives Word of Imperial Victory At Hankow

MATTERS DESPERATE Important Centres Near Shanghai Threatened—Wealthy Manchus Send Families and Property Away for Safety—Business Demoralized and Money Market in Bad State

(Canadian Press) Shanghai, Oct. 28.—Wireless despatches from Hankow reporting victory for the imperial troops there yesterday caused a flutter in Shanghai today.

Whatever the situation around Hankow, matters have grown more desperate for the government cause in the vicinity of Shanghai and along the lower part of the Yang Tze River.

Other Cities Threatened West of Shanghai, the wealthy city of Su Chow is threatened with Chin Kaing. Three important cities—Kanking, Yang Chow and Wu Ho—are believed to be in danger.

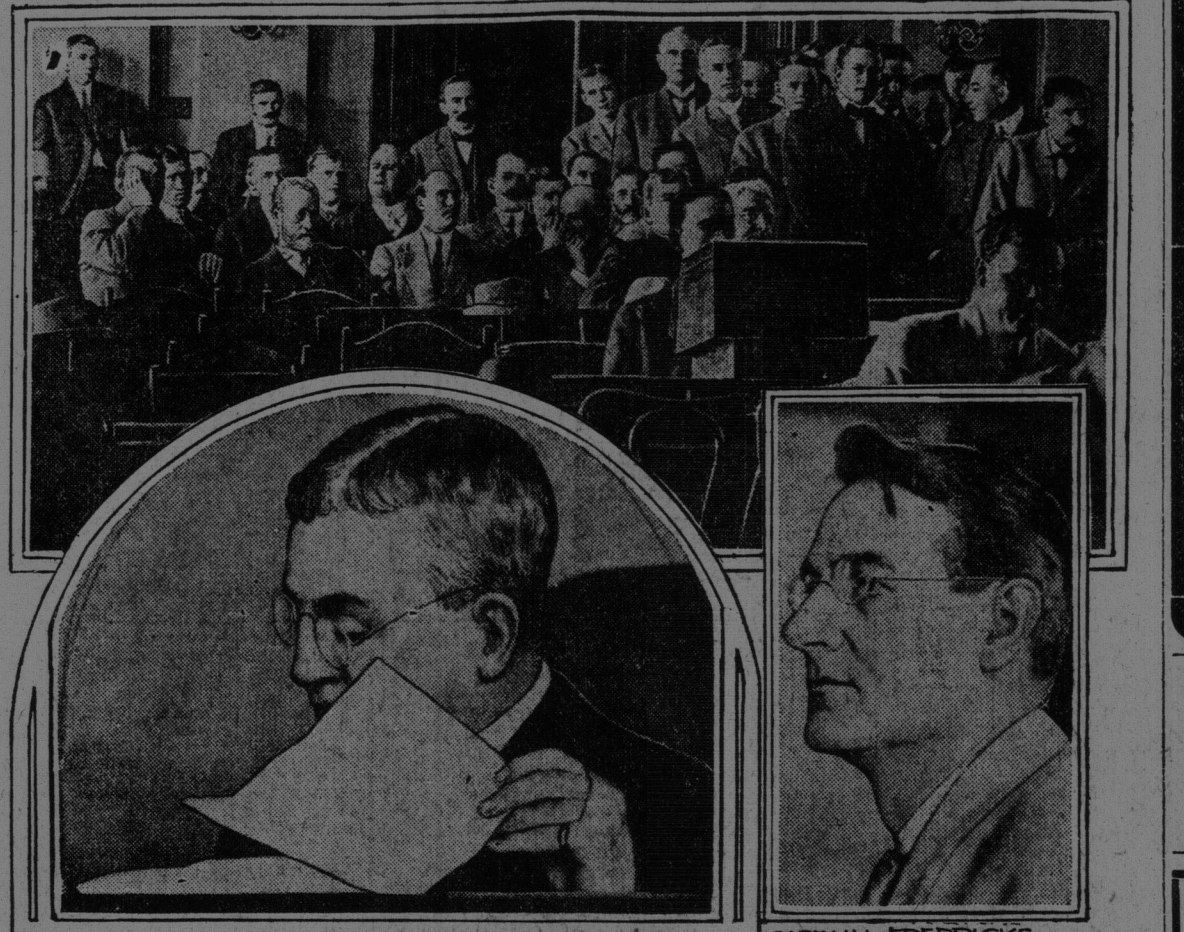

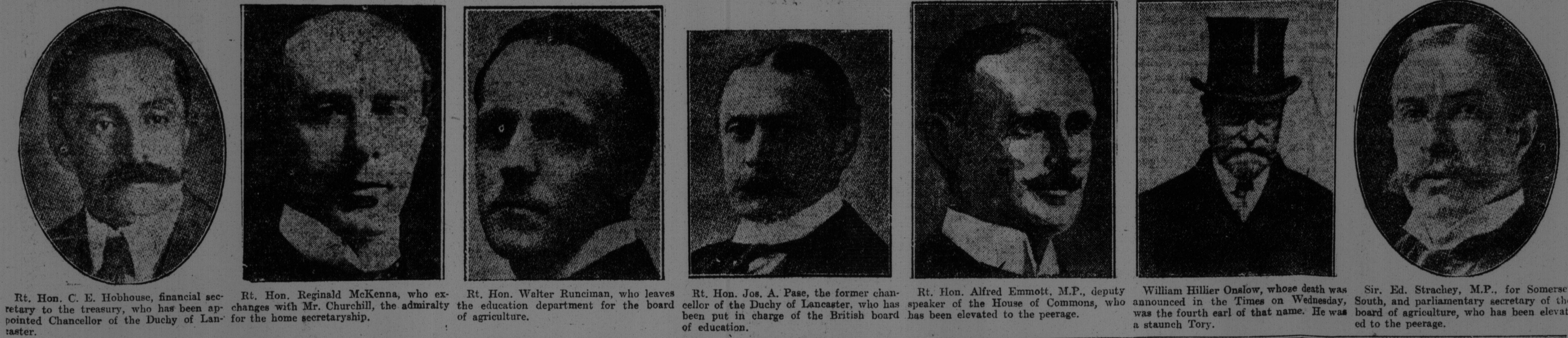

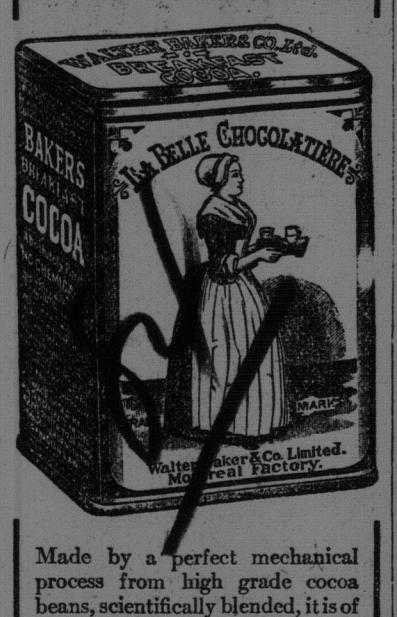

CHRISTIANS IN THE ARMY OF THE TURKS

Formerly None But Mussulmans Could Enter Military Service; Now Both Christians and Jews are in Ranks

(Times Special Correspondence)

Constantinople, Oct. 16.—For a long time there was much talk of putting an end to the exclusion of Christians from the Turkish army, and of sincerely applying the fundamental principle of the constitution that all Ottoman citizens shall be equal in their duties, as in their rights...

The government, however, courageously took the decision early in the present year to abandon all hesitation, and to call to the colors all the non-Mussulmans, both Christian and Jew. And the new ideas has been carried out, an important event has been added to Turkish history...
