### SUPER AIRSHIP TO BE ENGLAND'S ANSWER TO THE FRENCH SUCCESS

Proposal to Build Fifty Aerical Leviathans for every part of the British Empire. Services to North and South America, Japan and other countries would probably follow. For peace purposes these crafts would have luxurious cabins, baths, dining and smoking rooms, etc., for 200 pas-Peace and War.

London, June 3.— (United Press.)
Construction of a gigantic super-air ship, to be the first of a fleet of British aerial leviathans—primarily for commerce, but potential for war—is being considered by the Cabinet, upon a favorable sub-committee report.
Cabinet approval will mean speedy commencement of construction of a monster dirigible, beside which all preceding aircraft will seem dwarfed things.

The dramatically successful flight of the French aviator, Lieut. Pelletier D'Oisy, in passing the British round-the-world flyer, Commander McLaren, has spurred sentiment here for increased British air strength.

The dramatically successful flight of D'Oisy's dash possible, and with which the new French air-fleet will be equipped, has thrown fear into every air ministry in Europe, because no one else has an engine so capable.
Unless a new conference can be called to limit aerial construction, many European authorities apprehend a race between the great powers for air supremacy which will bring greater expenditures, greater tax burdens—and possibly eventuate in a greater war—than preceding competitions in naval or military forces.

A Race With France

Officially no government authority here says in so many words that England must enter an aircraft construction race with France. But actually that is the precise meaning of the present plans and the present situation. The government has already voted a programme of large increases in army airplanes—although not sufficient to overtake the French lead. If the superairship scheme, now being considered, is fulfilled, England will surpass any other country in lighter-than-air craft. The first giant airship will have a capacity of 5,000,000 cubic feet, an air displacement of 150 tons. a carrying Mr. Raynes was the son of the late being injured by a horse. It will be able to make a non-stop flight from London to Australia in five days and nights, or to maintain a speed of eighty miles an hour for 10,000 miles without stopping. At a reduced speed of forty-five miles an hour the giant airship can remain aloft 20 days and travel 20,000 miles.

The maximum non-stop cruising range with a light cargo will be 24,000 miles at forty miles an hour, with a maximum time in the air without lighting of twenty-five days and nights.

## OUTSIDERS EXPLAIN WHAT MOST

Wall Street and Stock Exchange Take the Lead-Zoo Fourth.

New York, June 3—(Associated Press)—The question, "What things peculiar to New York City most tease the curiosity of the person who never has been there?" has been answered in thousands of inquiries received from prospective visitors to the Democratic national convention.

The answer is: first, Wall street and the stock exchange; second, the Woolworth and Metropolitan skyscrapers; and third, Coney Island, the order representing the relative popularity.

Curiously, those who profess the greatest interest in the Stock Exchanges almost invariably add, "and the scene of the Wall street bomb explosion in front of J. P. Morgan's."

Others, seeking assurance that they will be able to view the famous skylline from the dizzy towers atop the Woolworth and Metropolitan structures, plaintively inquire "What has become of the Singer and the Flatiron buildings?" those architectural marvels of a generation ago that now squat in the shadows of rivals which scratch the sky much deeper.

Zoo Comes Fourth.

New York, June 3—Daniel Cill, sixteen years old, who fired the shot that killed Frank Rehill, a fellow messenger, employed by the American Trust Company, was defended by officials of the bank when he appeared in Homicide Court. The Catholic Protectory was represented by an agent who insisted that Gill was one of twelve boys who fied from that institution on December 28, 1928. They wanted the boy returned to the protectory.

The bank officials were opposed to this move. They said that not only was the killing of Rehill an accident but the conduct of Gill was such that he should not be sent back to the protectory. The District Attorney's office too, is convinced that the boy is conscientious and honest, and will plead for his release.

The pleas stayed the imprisonment of Gill until June 28, at least. when another hearing will be held. The boy was released under \$1,000 ball.

They frequently take up their fishing once more with the express purpose of remaining in their birthplace for good. "This all demonstrates," continued the speaker, "that Maritime Provinces to remain where they are. 

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
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
