TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Annual Meeting of the Society was held on Monday, May 6th, in the Hall of the Young Women's Christian Association, Elm Street, Prof. Goldwin Smith in the chair.

Rev. Dr. Parsons opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of annual meeting of 1892-93 were read by the Secretary, and confirmed.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Allen Baines, read the financial report, which was adopted, on motion of Rev. Charles Inglis and Malcolm Gibbs, Esq.

The report of the Industrial Room Committee was presented by the Convener, Mrs. Richardson, and adopted on motion of Rev. Dr. Parsons.

The Secretary's report was presented by Mrs. John A. Paterson, and adopted, on motion of J. K. Macdonald, Esq., and Dr. Allen Baines.

The report of the Fourteen Divisions were also presented by Mrs. Paterson.

The election of officers, superintendents, and advisory committee, brought the meeting to a close.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

In submitting the report of the twentieth year of the Society, we are in a state of uncertainty whether or not to present it in the form of a valedictory.

The Civic Council are on economic measures bent, particularly singling out the charity organizations of the city, hitherto receiving grants, as the first step to a great end. There are three existing charities in the city for out-door relief of the poor, and the scheme on foot is to give only one grant, and that one to the largest of the three—the House of Industry.

We think the idea is a good one if it can be carried into effect, adding to the present work of the House of Industry the machinery that has made the Relief Society so successful in its efforts to help not only the hungry but those who are weighed down by a burden of debt, contracted when out of work, or during some time of trouble in the family. This we consider of far more consequence than merely satisfying the hungry. No one will refuse a meal to a man, woman or child who is starving, but most people will refuse to give money when asked by a

stranger, for the very good reasons, that one dreads to be imposed upon, and time cannot be taken up in enquiring into such cases. This is a special work done by the Society—it has facilities for discovering the truth of such applications, and gives all the assistance in its power if the facts are found creditable to the applicants. Then, again, helping people who have been unfortunate to make a fresh start in life—for example: the woman who applied early in the season for a loan to enable her to open a dining-room; she was convinced that she could make a success of this venture if she only had the means to make a beginning. The case was fully investigated, and the money loaned. In January part of the loan was returned, and the woman is now making a decent living by her own exertions instead of living on charity. Occasionally, too, the Society will combine with one or other of the National Societies, and pay the passage of persons who have relatives in the Old Country who will look after them; and occasionally fares are paid for persons who have been promised work out of the city. The Society has another specialty in the "labor test" for women. The report of this Committee has been heard. An average of sixty women per week getting work from the Central Rooms, and receiving payment in money. The majority of the fourteen divisions also give out work, and pay for it in provisions; therefore we contend that this Society is much more than an out-door relief organization.

The expenses in the distribution of the funds are as small as can possibly be managed with. They are as follows: Each of the fourteen divisions has its depository, in which is kept the provisions for the poor. In most cases \$3 per month is the amount for rent, in some cases \$4, but in no case higher than \$4; these rooms are, as a rule, rented from persons in poor circumstances. The rent of the Board-room, \$10 per year; the printing of the Annual Reports and cards for offices; the order and collecting books, with advertising, complete the expenses of the distribution. This year the total amounts received are, \$3,400, and the expenses \$300; so that it costs 9 per cent. to manage the work of the Society.

There is a word peculiarly dear to the civic heart when speaking of reforms in the charities—that word is "overlapping"; it is supposed to be conclusive—to clinch every argument. It is intended, no doubt, to submerge all our opinions on the subject, but we cannot help these same opinions from turning up serenely and daring to look this terrible crime in the face. What is it? What does it mean? Simply this, when you examine it closely, a family, say, of father, mother and six young children having come to the last of their provisions, and having no money to buy more (the father being out of work), go to one of the depositories of the Society and are given a small quantity of provisions. When this is finished they go to the House of Industry and get some bread, and may be a quart of soup; they may also get a quarter ton of coal from the Society, and another small measure from the House of Industry. This is overlapping; the Relief Society cannot give them enough to live on, neither can the House of Industry, but between the two they get as much in one

week as it would take to keep a family of similar size in respectable circumstances for a day or two. We do not take imposters into consideration, they are in the minority, and are speedily discovered, although rarely exterminated. So this great sword, overlapping, ready to fall on our heads at any unguarded moment, is found, when carefully examined, to be, in the majority of cases, a very harmless little toy. During the past winter over 1,100 heads of families have been helped ; of these 260 were laborers, 34 carpenters, 27 painters, 111 widows, 62 old couples, 95 applying on account of illness, 15 deserted wives, 10 women with husbands away seeking work, 7 with blind husbands, 3 with husbands in jail, 5 with husbands in the asylum for the insane, and 9 with husbands in hospitals ; the remaining 500 are book-keepers, moulders, caretakers, gardeners, engineers, sailors, canvassers, paper-hangers, bakers, photographers, printers, cab-drivers, electricians, bookbinders, waiters, lithographers, tobacconists, ragpickers, porters, shoemakers, expressmen, etc., and applied because they could not get employment ; 113 of the 1,100 were helped last year, 47 for the last three years (of these 10 are old people and 12 widows), and 40 were found to be impostors.

INDUSTRIAL ROOM REPORT.

The work of the Industrial Room has this year been very satisfactory.

We have one hundred and ninety-five names on our list, with an average attendance of sixty. Some came every Thursday morning and found the money received a great help in providing for their families during the winter.

In addition to the seven hundred and ninety-seven garments made for own Industrial Room, sewing has been done by the women for some of the charitable institutions of the city—in all some six hundred articles have been made for the Home for Incurables, Infant's Home, Sick Children's Hospital, and Alexandra Home. This sewing was done for the groceries the women received, thus making them not paupers but paid workers, which many of them appreciated.

As in other years, work was given out in the Depositories to those receiving help. Some Superintendents disposed of the garments made, others returned what they had, before the sale ; from the 13th Division two hundred and nine articles were sent in.

We closed our workroom on the 28th February, our finances making this necessary. This year the class of work was better than in former years, consequently the prices paid were higher, so that until we had our sale our bank account could not be much increased.

As is usual, each woman was given some garments for herself and her children, a recognition of her willingness to do something in return for what was received rather than "take all and look for more." Though, really when some of them do seemingly their best, the result is a trial to the workers who superintend the sewing. However, in some cases there is a decided improvement from week to week,

The annual sale was held at Mrs. Richardson's, who gave her home for two days, a kindness which the Committee appreciate, and gratefully acknowledge. This resulted in an increase of our receipts over last year, so we feel encouraged to begin next year's work. The sale every Saturday from 2 to 6 p.m., will be continued during the summer, and the ladies hope to dispose of the greater part of the garments remaining.

REPORT OF DIVISIONS.

FIRST DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Jackson. 73 families helped, including 160 children under 18 years of age; English applicants in the majority. 44 orders for fuel given, and \$7 for rent. Principal causes of distress want of work. Work test satisfactory; 66 garments made by the women for help received.

SECOND DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Summerfeldt. 166 families assisted; majority English. 220 bushels of coke distributed, and 72 orders for coal and wood given; \$13 paid for rent. Work test very satisfactory; 120 garments made by the applicants.

THIRD DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. McCuaig. 88 families helped, including 225 children; majority English. 130 orders for fuel given, and \$15 paid for rent. Chief causes of distress, want of work and sickness.

FOURTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Brett. 50 families helped, including 10 widows, only 7 of the number applied last year; 14 fuel orders given, and \$10.50 paid for rent. Chief causes of destitution were inability to get work, sickness, and old age; one person found to be an imposter. Sewing was given out whenever practicable.

FIFTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Morrison. 124 families helped, with 239 children under 13. 36 English, 40 Irish, 31 Canadian, 1 German, 1 French, 5 American, etc. Causes of distress, want of work, sickness and old age. Orders for fuel.

SIXTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Evans. 260 families assisted, including 480 children. English and Irish in the majority. 295 orders for fuel given, and \$12.50 paid for rent. Chief causes of distress, want of work, sickness, inability to do work of any one kind.

SEVENTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Pemberton Page. 29 families helped. English and Irish in the majority. 35 orders for fuel given, and \$10 paid for rent. Sickness and scarcity of work were in most cases the causes of poverty.

EIGHTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Owen. 86 families helped, with 166 children. Irish and English in the majority. 80 orders for fuel given, and \$4 paid for rent. Cause of poverty, scarcity of work.

NINTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Davies. 119 families helped, including 250 children. 133 fuel orders given, and \$15 paid for rent. Want of work, sickness, and old age causes of distress.

ELEVENTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Shaw. 86 families helped, including 257 children. English and Canadian in the majority. 120 fuel orders given, no rent paid. Causes of poverty, lack of work, illness, and in some cases intemperance.

TWELFTH DIVISION.—Superintendents, Mrs. Currelley and Mrs. Scanlon. 33 families helped, with 71 children under 13. English in the majority. 27 fuel orders given, no rent paid. Causes of poverty, want of work, sickness, and in one or two cases intemperance.

THIRTEENTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Valiant. 36 families helped, with 125 children. English and Irish in the majority. 37 fuel orders given, no rent paid. Work test most successful, in several cases the work done was equal to relief given. 200 garments made. Chief causes of poverty, sickness, old age, and lack of employment.

FOURTEENTH DIVISION.—Superintendent, Mrs. Bricknell. 57 families helped, with over 100 children under 13. 58 fuel orders given. Causes of distress, old age and hard times.

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
TORONTO RELIEF SOCIETY.

ARTICLE I.—This Society shall be called the "TORONTO RELIEF SOCIETY," and it shall be in connection with the "YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION."

ARTICLE II.—The objects of this Society shall be to obtain and dispense assistance for the really needy; it shall investigate all cases of distress reported to it; it shall endeavor, by consultation and co-operation with other Societies, to prevent imposture; it shall seek to discourage a pauper spirit by helping people to help themselves, and it shall aim at the moral and spiritual improvement of those assisted.

ARTICLE III.—For the furtherance of above objects, the city shall be divided into Divisions, each of which shall be under the care of a Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent. Each Division shall be divided into not more than twelve districts, each of which shall be under the care of a Presiding Lady. There shall be also a Secretary for each Division. These shall constitute the Committee of the Division.

ARTICLE IV.—As it is one of the objects of this Society to discourage a pauper spirit by helping people to help themselves, there shall be an Industrial Department, its object being to provide work (in so far as possible) for women who are receiving aid from the Society. This branch of the work shall be placed under the care of a Committee (to be known as "The Industrial Room Committee") composed of a Convener, Secretary, Treasurer, the Superintendents and a representative from each Division.

ARTICLE V.—All members of the Board and workers in the Industrial Room, and all persons contributing \$1.00 to the funds of the Society, shall be considered members.

ARTICLE VI.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of Managers, composed of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and an Assistant Treasurer, if necessary, (who shall be members of the "Young Women's Christian Association,") the Superintendents and Secretaries of Divisions, the Presiding Ladies of Districts and the Convener, Secretary and Treasurer of the Industrial Room Committee. Of these Managers, the General Officers, the Superintendents of Divisions and the Convener of the Industrial Room Committee shall be elected, by ballot, at a public meeting to be called annually for the transaction of business in the beginning of May. (The Board shall have power to fill any of these offices not filled at the said annual business meeting, or any vacancies occurring in their number during the year.) Each Superintendent shall nominate her Assistant Superintendent and Presiding Ladies for appointment by the Board. The Secretaries of Divisions and the Representatives shall be chosen by the Division to which they belong. An Advisory Committee of gentlemen shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE VII.—There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the General Officers, the Superintendents of Divisions and the Convener of the Industrial Room Committee. One Presiding Lady shall vote from each Division at the Executive Meetings, in the absence of the Superintendent. This Committee shall have power

to transact such business as may require attention in the intervals between the stated meetings of the Board of Management. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII.—As this Society is in connection with the Young Women's Christian Association, the annual report shall be read at the annual public meeting of that Association.

ARTICLE IX.—A special meeting of the Society may be called, by advertisement in the daily papers, at such time and place as shall be agreed upon by the Executive Committee, notice of the object of such meeting to be given. A special meeting of the Managers may be called by the President at the request of three of the Superintendents of Divisions, each member of the Board of Management to be notified of the object of such meeting.

ARTICLE X.—Notice of any proposed addition to, or amendment of, the Constitution or By-laws, or the By-laws of the Industrial Room Committee, must be given in writing at the meeting of the Board in April. These proposed additions, or amendments, must pass the Board by a two-thirds majority of those present at the monthly meeting in May, and must then be brought before the Society for ratification at the ensuing Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.—The Board of Managers shall hold its stated meetings on the first Monday of the month, at 2.30 p.m., or at such time and place as it shall appoint. Seven members shall constitute a quorum. Weekly meetings shall be held in the Divisions, at such time and place as shall be agreed upon.

ARTICLE II.—The President shall have general supervision of the work, and be *ex-officio* a member of all committees. She shall preside at all meetings of the Society and Board of Managers, and shall perform such other duties as are incident to the office.

ARTICLE III.—In the absence of the President and two Vice-Presidents, the Superintendent of a Division shall be appointed to preside, and shall perform all the duties of the office.

ARTICLE IV.—The Treasurer shall receive and keep in some chartered bank, all the moneys collected, and shall disburse them as the Board of Management shall direct. She shall report the state of the treasury at each monthly meeting. Her accounts shall be examined by an auditor appointed by the Board of Managers. She shall, at the proper time, each year, provide the Superintendents with the collecting books required, and with the necessary number of reports and cards. The books shall have "Toronto Relief Society" printed on the cover, and be numbered according to Division and District, with the boundaries of the District clearly defined in each book; these shall be endorsed by the President, and the Superintendent of the Division. The Treasurer shall keep a list of these books, and the boundaries of Districts, and shall receipt each book as it is returned to her.

ARTICLE V.—The Secretary shall send notice of all meetings to the General Officers and Superintendents of Divisions, keep the minutes of the same, and prepare the Annual Report of the Board of Managers. She shall also keep an alphabetical book in which each case, with such details as are considered necessary, shall be recorded.

ARTICLE VI.—DUTIES OF A SUPERINTENDENT :

SEC. 1. She shall divide the Division into Districts, and if possible obtain one Presiding Lady for each District.

SEC. 2.—She shall secure a room for the Depository, and see that it is properly supplied with such things as are necessary for the relief of the needy.

SEC. 3.—She shall attend each week at the Depository when it is open, and superintend the relief there given.

SEC. 4.—She shall, whenever practicable, require each applicant to undertake some work from the Industrial Room.

SEC. 5.—She shall run only monthly bills, these she shall check over, certify to their correctness by her signature, and hand them to the Treasurer before the ensuing monthly meeting. All payments for rent must be paid directly to the landlord, and these and all other receipts must be returned to the Treasurer without delay. She shall not overdraw her appropriation without the sanction of the Board.

SEC. 6.—She shall receive reports of their Districts from her Presiding Ladies, and make a synopsis of these, with a list of those found undeserving, for the monthly meeting of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 7.—She shall arrange for a sufficient number of collectors in the Division, and see that the collecting is done *systematically and promptly*.

ARTICLE VII.—DUTIES OF A SECRETARY OF A DIVISION :

SEC. 1.—She shall attend at the Depository weekly, see that the books of registration there are properly kept, and take notes of any orders sent in by Presiding Ladies since last meeting. She shall also keep a list of the names and addresses of those out of work, and of the kind of work they can do.

SEC. 2.—She shall render to the Superintendent a monthly account of goods received and distributed, with remarks as to character of recipients, etc.

ARTICLE VIII.—DUTIES OF A PRESIDING LADY :

SEC. 1.—She shall thoroughly investigate all cases of distress in her District, and report them to the Superintendent. None but those visited shall receive systematic aid.

SEC. 2.—She shall collect, or provide a collector, in the District assigned to her, and render to the Superintendent the moneys collected, with a list, prepared for the printer, of dations and subscriptions. Contributions from "Friends" and amounts under 25c. being added together as "Friends" and "small sums." In collecting, each person subscribing 25c. or over, should be furnished with a report.

ARTICLE IX.—Appropriations shall be made by the Board of Management to each Division in proportion to the number reported as requiring relief.

ARTICLE X.—Care shall be taken to find out whether applicants for relief are receiving aid from any other sources, and no one receiving aid from this Society shall be permitted to beg from door to door.

ARTICLE XI.—As it shall be the object of this Society to dispense charity on the same basis throughout the city, *delicacies* shall not be given from the funds collected, except in cases of sickness, which must be specially reported; also the Society shall, as far as possible, avoid undertaking maintenance of applicants, seeking rather to obtain permanent assistance for those needing it, among the charitable institutions of the city.

BY-LAWS OF THE INDUSTRIAL ROOM COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE I.—The Convener shall call regular monthly meetings of the Committee during the winter months, the first meeting of the season to be held not later than the last week in October. She shall take the superintendence of all work done by the Committee. She shall present a monthly report to the Board.

ARTICLE II.—The Secretary shall send notices, in the name of the Convener, of all meetings of the Committee to each member, keep the minutes, and prepare the annual report for the Board. She shall also keep lists of the names and addresses of the women receiving work, and present a copy of such lists with her monthly report to the Board.

ARTICLE III.—The Treasurer shall receive and keep in some chartered Bank, all moneys connected with this branch of the work, and shall disburse them as the Committee (subject to the veto of the Board) shall direct. She shall report each month the state of the treasury to the Committee, and present a copy of this report at the monthly Board meeting. Her accounts shall be examined by an auditor appointed by the Committee.

ARTICLE IV.—During the winter the Committee shall meet for the transaction of business on a stated day in the last week of each month. Five members shall form a quorum. The Committee shall have power (subject to the approval of the Board), to make its own arrangements as to methods, or rules of work, and as to the disposal of the garments made, so long as the object of this branch of the work is kept steadily in view. The Board shall, however, have power to change, by a vote of the majority of those present, these methods or rules, should it seem best to do so, notice of such changes having been given one month previously both to the Committee and the Board.

ARTICLE V.—A special meeting of the Committee shall be called by the Convener, or by the Board, at the written request of three of its members.

ARTICLE VI.—The Committee may annually add to its membership such other ladies as it shall consider necessary for the work under its care, by submitting the names of such ladies to the Board for appointment. The ladies so appointed shall not be members of the Board, but shall have in every other way the same privileges as the other members of the Committee.

ARTICLE VII.—All moneys raised by, or donated to, this part of the Society's work, shall be under the control of the Board, and shall be used for the object set forth in these by-laws.

ARTICLE VIII.—The rooms shall be as nearly as possible in the central part of the city.

ARTICLE IX.—Work shall be supplied only to those who are really destitute, and each applicant for work must bring a voucher as to need from some member of the Board in the Division to which she belongs. The Committee may give work to women whose names are not on the books of the Society, on the recommendation of one of the Superintendents.

ARTICLE X.—A scale of prices for work shall be fixed by the Committee.

ARTICLE XI.—As each Depository Committee will insist, when practicable, on some work being done by all applicants for assistance, the Industrial Committee shall not refuse work to inferior workers.

ARTICLE XII.—The annual report of the Committee shall be published in the annual report of the Society, so that the public may know that this Society is, while relieving distress, also striving, by means of its Industrial Committee, to avoid pauperizing those who are the recipients of its aid.
