MANSLAUGHTER. NEW YORK, June 28.--The inquiry conducted by Coroner Berry and a jury into the General Slocum disaster was concluded today after nearly four hours deliberation a verdict was rendered, in which the directors of the Kalkreuth Steamboat Company, the captain of the Slocum, the commodore of the company's fleet, and others were held criminally responsible. Warrants for their arrest were issued. The mate of the Slocum, according to the jury, acted in a cowardly manner, and the misconduct of Steamboat Inspector Lundberg, it was recommended, should be brought to the attention of the federal authorities. The charge in each case was manslaughter in the second degree. Berry was fixed by the coroner in amounts varying from \$1,000 to \$5,000.

ALLEGED PICKPOCKETS MAY GO FREE.

Prosecution Can Bring No Positive Evidence Against Men on Trial in Fredericton.

(Special to the Star.) FREDERICTON, June 29.-At the continuation, yesterday afternoon, of the preliminary examination of John Williams, James Grant and James Howland, charged with robbing the person of Mayor Baxter of Portland, Me., and Baron de Hallowyn, secretary to the French consul general at Montreal, Dr. Ami of Ottawa, and Count deBury, of St. John, gave evidence as to the presence of the prisoners on the train at eleven o'clock, but in the absence of Mayor Baxter, of Portland, and other witnesses the case was adjourned to await the trial of the prisoners.
