

ENORMOUS COSTS.

The British Diplomatic Service abroad is not notified of the presence of political servet service agents. The headquarters at Downing street controls the reports of both its accredited repretentatives and its secret agents. The sum which in the Budget is ascribed to "Secret Service" is larger than that of any other country for analogous purposes, but still it does not suffice to meet the enormous costs of the British secret service. The Government, therefore, devotes to this purpose other amounts for which no public return is made.

As an instance of this widespread organization the writer states that Downing street is constantly informed of every negotiation made by the Krupp gun works with regard to the delivery of cannon. It is of particular importance to Downing street to know which countries are negotiating with Krupp's and what material and guns are being delivered. On the other hand, Downing street is always kept informed by its spies whenever a Krupp reduced in April 21st, 1906.



NO LONGER CARRY LIQUOR

Received Here.

Instructions have been received from the postmaster general by the inspector for New Brunswick that hereafter for New Brunswick that hereafter mail carriers throughout the province will not be permitted to carry any liquor. This regulation applies for the present only to new contracts or to renewals, for in all contracts to be made a clause will be inserted giving effect to the order. Contractors now doing duty will not be immediately affected. As contracts are made, as a rule, for four years, it will thus be seen that by the end of four years every mail by the end of four years every mail contract will be brought under the anti-liquor carrying regulation. anti-liquor carrying regulation.

There have never been any serious complaints against mail drivers in this province on the part of temperance people, though on several occasions objections have been received chiefly from Scott Act counties. The new regulation is however as much of a concession towards the growing temperance sentiment as it is a measure for the improvement of the postal service.
