Objects to Gifts of Water Powers

Protests Against - Granting Further Powers to the Ganal Co. - Branch Line Bill Also Open to Objection.

OTTAWA, Jan. 21.—The railway committee of the commons yesterday entered upon an interesting discussion as to the policy of the committee n respect to any further allenation of water powers on crown lands in connection with the granting of railway charters. The question came up in connection with the bill to charter the Nelson River Valley Railway. Hon. Mr. Emmerson, Messrs. 
