NEW BRUNSWICK NEXT.

The last census of New Brunswick, taken in 1901, 9,857, or three per cent. In the previous decade the gain was a bare 30. It would be pleasant to think that the period now drawing to a close promised a better record. The Interior Department has reported hundreds of thousands of immigrants into Canada every recent year, and bonuses have been paid on more than the total population of this province. Yet there is no evidence that New Brunswick has a larger population than eight years

We have before us the enrolment in the public schools of this province for nearly twenty years. There were more children in the schools in the June term of 1895, and of every year since with three exceptions than in the June term of 1908. These three years were 1903, 1904 and 1907.
