

The Argus states that the steamer Jonian, Capt. Eastaway, arrived at Portland, Me., on Saturday last with only 14 passengers and a small amount of freight. Moderate weather was encountered most of the passage, it being in decided contrast to that experienced on her passage out from Montreal, she then having several of her boats smashed by tremendous seas. OCEAN PATROLS' NEEDS.

An earnest plea that Congress have more regard for the needs of the revenue cutter service, and that it provide more vegsels to render aid on the high seas, the Great Lakes and the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers, was made to Secretary McAdoo last week at Washington by Captain E. P. Bertholf, commandant of the service. In support of his argument that Congress should treat the service in a more liberal spirit, Captain Bertholf set forth in detail some of the things done in the past fiscal year in saving lives and property endangered by shipwreck and disaster.

By its efforts, he reported, 327 lives were saved, 2,755 persons on board vessels in distress were assisted, 264 were cared for on the cutters and vessels in distress were assisted, 264 were cared for on the cutters and vessels valued at \$10,607,710 were assisted in time of need. In the year, of ficers of the service boarded and examined papers of 25,079 ships and dealt with \$79 violations of the law. The cutters removed or destroyed 31 derelicts and recovered and returned to owners others valued at \$18,900.

All this was done for \$2,471,532, about \$3,000 less than Congress appropriated, although 25 cruising cutters and 18 harbor vessels were employed. Figured on a monetary basis, the service saved about \$4,30 for every dollar expended. The all-important work of saving lives, destroying men.

Captain Berthoif commends the proposed consolidation of the revenue cutter and life saving service into the coast guard, declaring that it would result in increased efficiency. He recommends the establishment of a supply depot in Alaska, preferably at Dutch Harbor, stating that it would mean an annual saving in coal expense alone of about \$18,000.

George Thomas Lanigan, humorist, poet and journalist, was born at St. Charles, P. Q., sixty-eight years ago today, He ranks among the greatest of Canadian-born humorists and poets. He was educated in Montreal High School, and began his journalistic career in the Canadian metropolis. He was associated with Robert Graham in the establishment in Montreal of the Free Lance, a journal of satire and humor. THE POSTAL SERVICE.

The first regular postal service between two American cities was estabilished 241 years ago today, Dec. 10, 1672, when the government of New York inaugurated a regular monthly post to Boston. Some thirty-three years before that a post-office had been opened in Boston at the house of Richard Fairbanks, "for all letters which are brought from beyond the seas, or are to be sent thither." In 1557 the Virginia Assembly provided for the "rapid transmission" of official communications from plantation to plantation on penalty of one hogshead of tobacco for each default. Four years after the establishment of the New York-Boston monthly mail, the colonial court of Massachusetts founded an official post-ofice in Boston, with John Heyward as postmaster. The first parliamentary act for the establishment of a postal system in the English-American colonies was passed in 1692, and a royal patent was granted to Thomas Heale, who was authorized to transport letters at such rates "as the planters should agree to sive." Neale began operations in Virginia, and the other colonies soon joined in the movement, although the system was very imperfect. The English postal system was extended to the






