London, June 4.—Considerable ac-tivity was displayed by the artillery on both sides along the British front in France today in several districts, including the neighborhood of Vimy and the Ypres sector. British raiding parties and airmen also were busy in numerous successful operations. The official statement, reporting these ac-tivities reads:
