Five seams and upwards, of varying thickness from 2½ to 13 feet, are known to exist within these areas, which comprehend (exclusive of a portion of the General Mining Association reserve) nearly all the coal yet discovered in this well known district. Of these, one, known as the 11 feet seam, has been opened, and several hundred tons raised by a slope sunk only 25 feet from the surface, and preserving a thickness of 10 feet for two-thirds of that distance. The slope has lately been carried down to the depth of 95 feet, exhibiting a marked improvement in the quality of the coal, described by Sir Wm.
