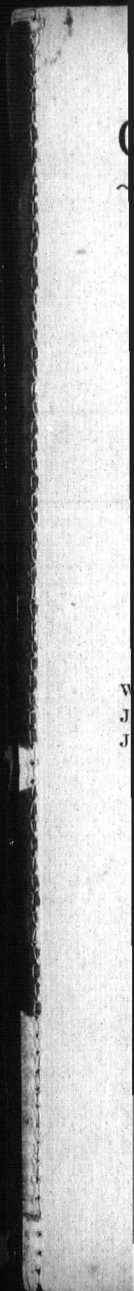
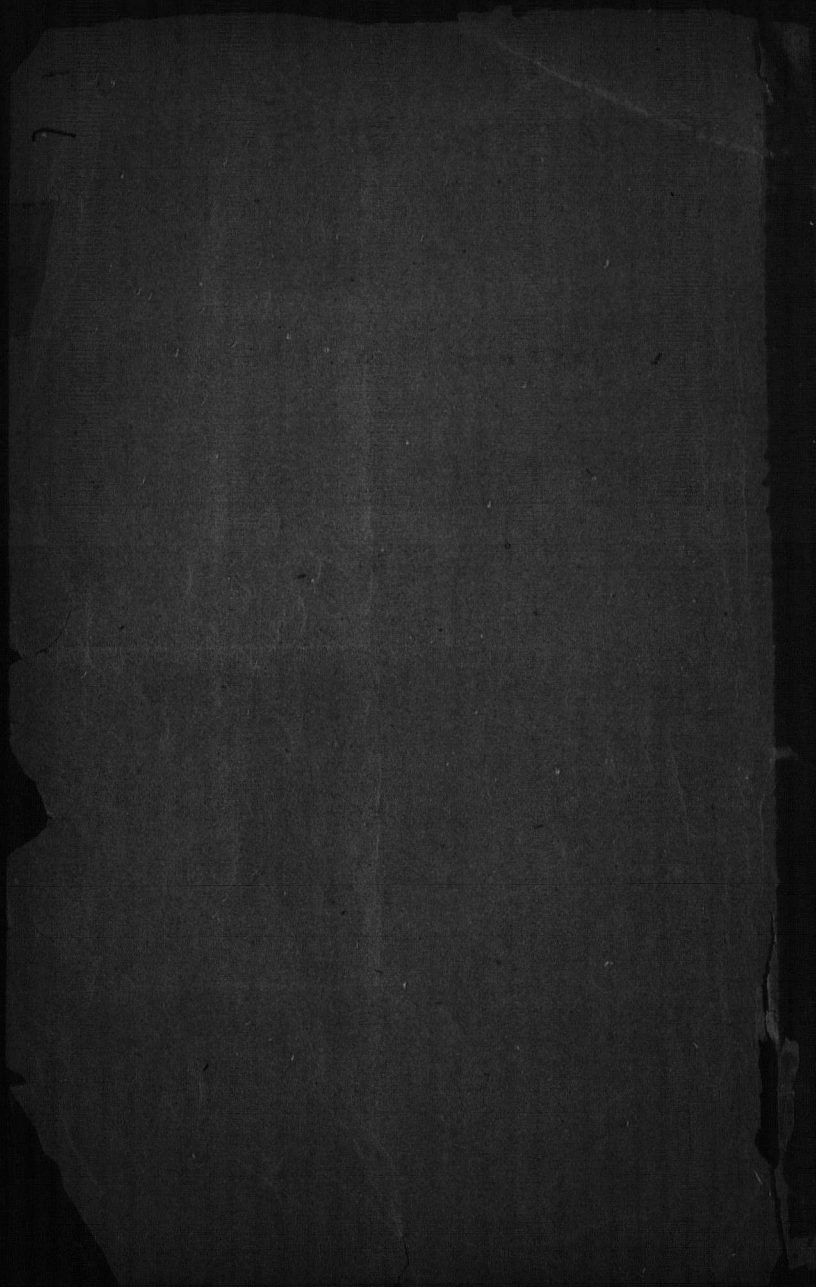

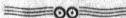

Managers' Report.

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF KNOX CHURCH, MILTON.

Your Committee have much pleasure in submitting to you their annual report of the affairs of the Church, with which we have been identified, during the year.

The business meetings have been few ; but satisfactory.

Our financial position is healthy, although the Treasurer's balance is not as large as your committee would like to see it ; however, all expenses have been covered, including stipend, and in fact all accounts. They would have liked, however, to have been able to re-paint the manse, repair the fence and other necessities in addition to what has been done on the interior of the manse ; but have not felt themselves in a position to do this ; however, they hope to be able to report all these things as done before our next annual meeting.

As will be noticed in the minutes of our last annual meeting, the managers were authorized to purchase the property on the north-west side of Main street from Mr. Knees. A meeting was held, at which this matter was discussed, and it was thought advisable to still further consider the business before making a purchase, as other sites were also offered and the matter is still under consideration awaiting the present owners' terms, &c. Your committee feels that it will be to the interest of the congregation to allow this question to stand over for the present ; at least until such time as they have full particulars from each of the holders of desirable sites.

Our report would not be complete without mention being made of the energetic work which has been done by the ladies, outstripping their usual good standing, as may be seen from their report, having a comfortable sum in the bank, besides having assisted the Treasurer in his necessary outlay.

We close our report with deep feelings of thankfulness to our Gracious Father, who sent us such an earnest and efficient pastor. The past year having bound us together more and more closely, and we feel ever grateful for the energetic working in every branch of the Church, and especially for the very profitable Sabbath services as conducted by our beloved pastor, and trust that our Church may long enjoy its present harmony and prosperity.
