

Your Committee have much pleasure in submitting to you their annual report of the affairs of the Church, with which we have been identified, during the year.

The business meetings have been few; but satisfactory.

Our financial position is healthy, although the Treasurer's balance is not as large as your committee would like to see it; however, all expenses have been covered, including stipend, and in fact all accounts. They would have liked, however, to have been able to re-paint the manse, repair the fence and other necessaries in addition to what has been done on the interior of the manse; but have not felt themselves in a position to do this; however, they hope to be able to report all these things as done before our next annual meeting.


