Captain Boyton had therefore to remain an involuntary passenger until the vessel approached the Irish coast on Tuesday evening, when the commander, feeling that he was negotiating with a

to his side and grasping his paddle was lowered into the water, amid the cheers of the passengers, at half past nine p. m. It was a wild, dark night, and he was close to Padgett Rock, near Cape Clear three miles from him, and Baltimore, toward which he intended to make, was in a direct line seven miles away. He lay on his back, paddling vigorously, and now the lights of the vessel were lost in the night. In a quarter of an hour more his light faded and he was alone.

him. He was drifting out against him. Down and down, against him. He was drifting out against him. To add to the awful loneliness of his situation, and to increase the peril, a violent gale commenced.

That night for many hours no mail boat crossed the Irish channel, and great destruction was done along the coast. And through these awful hours of darkness this man was tossing about at the mercy of the waves some fifteen miles from land. The wind was so violent that he had to give over paddling, and with one arm to shade his face (the only part of his body exposed) from the cutting blast. Once his paddle was wrenched away by a heavy sea, but it fortunately came into his hand again. For several seconds a wave would completely submerge

which seemed a hundred feet to the bottom. As a result of this tossing he became seasick; a thing, he says, which never happened to him before. His indomitable spirit, however, conquered everything, and about one o'clock the wind began to blow directly on shore. His paddle was plied vigorously, and at three o'clock on Wednesday morning he reached what was near breakers, and the rock-bound coast west of Skibbereen loomed up before him. His danger now was not less than it was during the gale; for as a wave would raise him almost on a level with the cliff tops he could discern nothing but a threatening wall of rock. He made his way along parallel to the coast, and fortunately lighted upon almost the only safe landing place for miles round. He

another and then followed in quick succession, and in an almost senseless state, he was hurled high and dry up on the beach. It was then four o'clock in the morning, and he had been nearly seven hours on water, traversing a distance of thirty miles. The apparatus had behaved admirably, and having divested himself of it he stood quite dry in his navy uniform, which he wore heavily. Thus having taken done he let off one of his signal rockets without effect. It showed him, however, a narrow path in the rocks. Up this he clambered and got on to a mountain top, which brought him to the coast-guard station. He was hospitably received there and discovered that the place he had landed at was Trefaska Bright, some east and south of Baltimore. During the morning he

years, the father having been arrested
from during the war for running an illicit
distillery, and as, though none of

them were known to do any work, they always had plenty of money. The manner of the discovery was thus: One Goodrich, a farmer, returning late from a Grange meeting, had to pass a graveyard, and just before reaching it was surprised to see a team coming toward him, and on drawing near discovered that there were four occupants. McNamee, the elder, sitting on one side of the seat, Joe, the younger boy, driving; the girl reclining in the back part of the wagon, and a fourth figure sitting between the young man and his father. The latter wore a black hat and clothes, and did not speak in response to the inquiry of Goodrich. This proved to be the dead body of a young man named Wilbur Hill, eighteen years of age, who had been buried that very day. A number of spades and picks were lying in the wagon, and the girl was dressed in men's clothes. Goodrich noticed this, and communicating his discovery to neighbors, the grave was opened and the body found to be gone. The matter was taken up by the father of the youth, and he found the body of his son at Ann Arbor. Intense excitement followed, and McNamee was at once arrested, and is now in jail at Niles. He begged for a double life of officers to protect him from violence. Dr. Wm. J. McNamee, who was in charge of the Dead House at Ann Arbor, died. Immediately after this discovery was made, two other bodies of persons recently dead were missed, and their friends having instituted search, the missing bodies were found in the repository at the Ann Arbor College. Further investigation revealed the horrible fact that there was scarcely an unrobbed grave in the cemetery.

Shocking Tragedy.

PLAINFIELD, CONN., Nov. 13.—The investigation into the circumstances attending the shooting of the two children of Joseph Brown, a boy only 11 years old, which has been in progress during the week, has revealed a most shocking instance of juvenile depravity. The jury of investigation meets again to-morrow. It appears the parents of the children were away from home for the day, and in the afternoon, while the children were playing in the kitchen, George brought a gun out of the bedroom, saying that he was going to kill some of them. The mother, who was in the previous morning with three balls and a heavy charge of buckshot. The boy found some caps, and placing one on the gun, he took deliberate aim and fired at his infant brother. The shot told with terrific effect. The muzzle was only two feet from its victim, and the charge went tearing through the child's throat, mangling and burning the flesh in a fearful manner. The little one gave out a cry and died. A little girl in whose arms lay the babe was also struck in the face and shoulders, a ball passing through her cheeks, cutting her tongue and knocking out two teeth, while several lodged in her face and neck.

As soon as the deed had been done she laid the dying babe on a lounge and bade George run to the village and bring his mother. The boy, who was directed, but instead of telling of the affair, remained with her till evening, when both parents and himself returned home. A light was struck and a moment sufficed to reveal the sad sight. Stretched upon the lounge lay the ghastly corpse of the babe, the terrible wound in its throat filled with clotted blood, while its clothes were completely saturated. Crouching in a corner was the wounded girl, who had prepared a rude bandage for herself, and for five hours she had borne indescribable pain from her wound. Her face was swollen so as to be scarcely recognizable. Crouching in a corner were puddles of blood, and in the wall was imbedded such of the charge as had not lodged in its victims. George acknowledged his guilt, and said he would not in fact, and did not mean to kill them when he fired.
