

To the fishermen of the Maritime Provinces, who surrendered to us their rights, and who have the American fishermen to compete with them, we have given \$1,000,000. We are spending freely for our harbours and for public buildings all over the Dominion, yet still from present indications there will be next year a surplus of \$3,000,000 to redeem \$40,000,000 of 5 and 6 per cent bonds. We will place for a 4 per cent, leaving us a saving of \$400,000 a year, which will be equal to a reduction of the debt of \$28,000,000. (Applause.) That large sum will be saved by the improved credit of the country, which gives us cheaper money. This is not necessary for me to say so, after we shall have \$2,000,000 a surplus, there is 25,000,000 already provided, the sum which we have named as Ottawa, and the Pacific railway, which is opening our vast North West—(applause)—making it the home of teeming millions, and adding to the wealth of this part of the Dominion. Why, my friends, when I say \$5,500,000 of a surplus during the present year, I do not take into account the surplus of the year 1881 of last year that is the proceeds of Dominion lands. I took it out this year, because we intend to make that a separate account. We have \$1,400,000 larger portion of which has been paid, received from Dominion lands, and we will have \$2,000,000 before the close of the year—making altogether

The flavor of common molasses is much improved by boiling and skimming before using.

Clean brass kettles before using with salt and vinegar, to avoid being poisoned by the verdigris.

Gum tragacanth dissolved in water makes a good cheap paste which will keep when it is sealed up.

Damp tea leaves scattered over the carpet before sweeping, improve the colors and give them a fresh clean look.

A strip of thick paper laid over the edge of each stair under the carpet will preserve a stair carpet from wearing through one-third longer than otherwise.

A palatable drink for a fever patient is made by peeling and slicing some good tart apples, and mixing some white sugar over them.

To destroy insects, take carbolic acid diluted with water, say one part of acid to ten parts of water, and with a syringe throw the liquid into all the cracks and holes where they nest, and they will soon vanish.

When you want a dust pan, have it made to order, with the handle turning down instead of up, so as to rest on the floor, and tip the dust pan at a proper angle for reaching the dust.

It is a great convenience, as you do not have to stoop and hold it while you are sweeping.

Collect some soil from a chimney or a stove where wood is used as fuel, put it in to an old pitcher and use it to water your plants every few days.

The effect upon plants is wonderful in producing a rapid growth of thick shoots and a great number of thick, richly tinted leaves.

A little bowl of soap jelly can be made by mixing two tablespoonfuls of soap in one part of water, sugar enough to sweeten sufficiently, the juice and a little of the grated peel of one lemon.

Let it stand for half an hour, so the jelly will soften; then boil until it is clear. It will need careful attention and constant stirring to keep it from burning.

Caught in the Ice.

QUEBEC, May 24. Six sailing ships arrived yesterday. The "George Gilroy" of Greenock, was 20 days in ice; the captain reports that the icebergs were the largest he has ever seen.

The crew could be seen on the shore walking up and down with their hats and coats spread on the ground as if to dry, but owing to the large quantity of ice in the neighborhood, it was found impossible to approach the shore.

He passed about fifty sailing vessels and three steamers.

Is the duty added to the price? asks the Hamilton Spectator. And it replies to this question:—"In order to test that question, a gentleman living in Boston imported a pair of English blankets. The English price was \$25, and duties and custom-house fees amounted to \$4.90, or more than 100 per cent. bringing the total, without charging anything for freight or handling, to \$29.85.

If the duty were added to the price, that would be the selling price of like blankets of home manufacture. But like blankets of home manufacture were selling at \$5.20, or 75 cents above the English price, as low as the English blankets could possibly be sold in this country.

The like demonstration has been made in Canada, where the duty on blankets has largely increased and the price has largely decreased though in the mean time the price of wool has advanced.

The most absurd and most readily disproved of all free trade delusions is that which affirms that the duty is added to the price.

CLARA E. PORTER. The Opposition seek to distract the minds of wool-growers in Canada by pointing out that some grades of wool are admitted free of duty. What are the facts? We import more wool than ever. In 1877-8 we imported 6,280,084 pounds; in 1880-1, 8,040,287 pounds.

If that were all, as the Opposition pretend, there would be some show in their attacks upon the tariff in regard to wool. But it is, in fact, only half the story. We turn to the other side, and from the export returns it will be found that, while in 1877-8 we exported 2,443,889 pounds, in 1880-1 we only exported 1,404,223 pounds.

That simply means that because of the manufacture of woollen goods developed under the tariff a home market was found for 1,040,770 pounds of home-grown wool that would otherwise have been sent out of the country. There was in addition an appreciable rise in the value of the exports, averaging in 1881 804 cents per pound, against 284 cents in 1878. The less sent out, the more the price received for what was sent.
