PROFITS IN PAINTINGS.

Value of Famous Canvases Will Almost Stagger Milionaires. If the figures given out by Hopace Townsend, the well-known art critic, in his article on "Art as an Asset," in the Century, can be credited, investors will do well to put their money in modern paintings. Paintings, according to Mr. Townsend, who supports his contention with an who supports his contention with as imposing array of figures, are speculative risks of the highest grade, in as much as they give pleasure as long as they are in the investor's possession, and, if they are well chosen, will sell in a few years for

many times their purchase prices.

He quotes from Henry Ford's celebrated remark, "I would not give beents for all the art in the world,"

He quotes from Henry Ford's celebrated remark, "I would not give 5 cents for all the art in the world," not because the remark reveals an ignorant prejudice on the part of Mr. Ford, but because "it is not likely that he yoiced the unspoken thoughts of many millions of his fellow-countrymen. The man in the street is won't to regard the artist as a sort of fifth wheel to the economic coach." But this point of view, Mr. Townsend thinks, can be easily altered. "One may point out that here in New York are many youngmen who, if they had taken to 'business,' would be accounted fortunate if they were earning three or four thousand dollars a year, but who as illustrators, are easily making three or four times as much.






