Novo Scotia Fishing Interests. (Halifax Herald.) Our fishermen, like those of other countries, are crying out about the low price of fish. The price is, perhaps, the lowest on record. But the catch this season has been a record. Hon. Thomas Johnson, one of the largest fish operators of Liverpool, told me the other day that he thought the catch would be between 15 and 20 per cent greater than last year. This year Liverpool will handle 100,000 quintals of cod, against 80,000 quintals last year, which was the largest in the history of that town. The price paid for first fish this year was \$2.70 per quintal, against \$2.75 to \$3; and for second trip, \$2, against \$2.75 last year. He thinks the experience of Liverpool is a fair indication of the whole coast. That little town fits out some sixty bankers, and exports seven-eighths of its produce to the West Indies. It is the rapid growth and marvelous prosperity of such towns as Liverpool, Yarmouth, Lunenburg and Lunenburg, which have ruined the fish trade of Halifax since 1883.

Instead of meeting the ghost alone, and encountering the full weight of his supernatural terrors, we meet him in pleasant company, where his force is so dispersed that no one gets more than a proper, moderate and enjoyable share.

The Edmund's Law. Under which a large number of Mormons have been imprisoned for six months and fined \$500 each, has exasperated the "Saints" almost to the point of rebellion. Late last week U. S. Deputy Marshal Collins, having been attacked by a couple of Mormon desperadoes, killed one of them in self-defense. Through fear of the Mormon mob, he surrendered to the U. S. troops under General Crook. The Mormons attempted to capture and lynch him, but were prevented by the Federal authorities, asked the President for more troops, there being only a single regiment stationed at Salt Lake. Reinforcements have been sent from Omaha, and more are held in readiness at San Francisco. The Mormon chiefs, knowing the insanity of rebelling against the General Government, are disclaiming any intention on the part of the people to rebel or cause trouble. It is evident the Government will stand no nonsense in Utah.

English papers assert that the Liberal party have decided upon a scheme of Home Rule for Ireland. It is said the scheme provides for the creation of an Irish Parliament at Dublin, the acts of which the Crown will reserve the right to veto only upon the advice of the Irish Ministry. Irish members will continue to sit in the Imperial Parliament and take part in Imperial legislation.
