PERILS OF THE SEA.

Sinking of the Savonia-All Hands Saved.

Fatal Accident on Board the Sardinian -No News of the Erin.

London, Jan. 25.—The German steamer Savonia, which left New York Jan. 3 for Hamburg, was abandoned in a sinking condition Jan. 13. All hands were saved. The Savonia carried a cargo of \$60,000 worth of corn and \$100,000 weeth of cotton. The vessel was valued at \$150,000. The crew consisted of 30 men. The vessel was owned by R. M. Sloman & Co., Hamburg. She was of 1,553 net tonnage, and was 304 feet long.

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 25.—The steamship Sardinian, just arrived here, had a terrible experience in the Atlantic storms. On experience in the Atlantic storms. Carriday of last week one of her funnels we smashed by a heavy sea, and Fourth Enneer Lillman and two firemen were burn neer Lillman and two firemen were burned to death and four others badly injured. The Sardinian lost four boats and the saloon was flooded; the fires were extinguished and the steamship was forced to lay to for 48 hours. The first and second officers, the quartermatter and sock officers, the quartermaster and cook were also severely injured.

Experience of the Lydian Monarch.

Halifax, Jan. 25.—The Lydian Monarch, from London, bound to New York, put in here yesterday morning for coal. She experienced fearful weather, but sustained only trivial damage. She has a number of passengers, including twenty first-class. The mail steamer Oregon, which arrived this morning from Liverpool, reports: Left Liverpool on the 9th, encountering heavy gales all the way. A heavy sea struck the steamer shortly after leaving Moville, smashing the bridge. Captain Williams being on it at the time, he fell to the deck and sustained injuries the extent of which are not known at the present time. The fourth officer and several of the seamen were also injured by being thrown against the vessel's side. Heavy ice was encountered off the coast of Newfoundland, the steamer having to go back about 140 miles.



unaltered.

It is a very common thing for young housekeepers to scorch their linen when learning to iron. Do not be discouraged. Wax your irons thoroughly and keep them in a dry place. This will prevent their sticking. If you find a scorched place expose it to the hottest rays of the sun. It will be obliterated in a short time.

Pour into a well-buttered shallow pan, and bake three-quarters of an hour. Cut into squares and put on the platter around the roast beef.

CURRANT DUMPLINGS.

Four cupfuls of flour, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, two cupfuls of finely chopped beef suet, half a pound of currants, about a cupful of water or milk, and a little sait. Sift sait, baking powder and flour together, mir with them the suet, and add the currants, which should be nicely washed, picked and dried; mix the whole to a limp paste with the water or milk; divide into eight or nine dumplings, which are to be tied in little floured cloths, and boiled for an hour and a quarter. Serve with a cut lemon, cold butter and sugar.

Two pounds of beef, the round, flank or any cheap part, one onion, two slices of carrot, two of turnip, two potatoes, three tablespoonfuls of flour, sait, pepper and a little more than a quart of boiling water. Cut all the fat from the meat and put it in a stew pan. Fry gently for ten or fifteen minutes. In the meantime cut the meat in small pieces, and season well with sait and pepper, and then sprinkle over it two tablespoonfuls of flour. Cut the veget tables in very small pieces, and put in the pot with the fat. Fry them five minutes, stirring well to prevent burning. Now put in the meat, and move it about in the pot until it begins to brown; then add the boiling water. Cover; let it boil up once, skim, and set back where it will just bubble for two and a half hours. Add the potatoes, cut in thin slices, and one table-spoonful of flour, which mix smooth with half a cupful of cold water. Taste the

DARK STEAMED PUDDING.

Three cupfuls flour, one cupful finely chopped beef suet, one cupful molasses, one cupful milk, two eggs, two large teaspoonfuls baking powder, a little salt, a heaping reaspoonful mixed spice (ginger), cinnamon and nutmer make a pleasant flavor.) Sift the salt, spice and baking powder with the flour, mix in the suet, wet with the milk and molasses, and add the eggs last. Beat very thoroughly and steam in a well-buttered bowl three hours. Make half the measure for a small family. Turn out of the mould and serve with any preferred sauce. A plain and cheap sauce for this and various puddings is made with two cupfuls of water, a half cupful of sugar, a small piece of butter, a large teaspoonful of corn starch wet in a little water, and a flavering lemon, or a spoonful of caramel.

A Harmless Preventive for "the Grip," Prescribed by a Russian Physician. So much has been said about the influenza epidemic, la grippe, that it is, perhaps, as well to mention a preservative or two against the malady. According to M. de Cyon, M. D., who has practiced many years as a medical man at St. Petersburg, where he has left behind him a spiendid reputation, and who is now established at Paris, the best means of preventing an attack of the "Russian influenza" is to use an inhalation of boracic acid, and to gargle with a solution of borac, The use of these simple remedies is the more to be recommended as they are entirely harmless.

Is Man, Left Legged?

Is Man Left Legged?

In a paper read before the British association Dr. W. K. Sibley asserts that man is naturally left legged, adducing the following arguments in support of his opinion: Standing working with the right hand there is a tendency to balance on the left leg. Race paths are nearly always made for running incircles to the right, and the majority of movements (such assigning running, stc.) are more readily performed to the right. In walking it is natural to bear to the right, crowds as well as individuals do this. Troops start off with the left foot; the left foot is placed in the stirrup in mounting. From measurements made by Dr. Garson of the skeletons of the two legs, in 54.3 per cent, the left leg was the longer, and in 35.8 the right, says The Medical Record. From measurements of 200 pairs of feet it was found that in 44 per cent, the left and in 21.5 the right was longer, while in 34.5 they were equal.



A second edition soon appeared (April, 1787), and such was the enthusiasm that 2,800 copies were subscribed for in a few days by 1,500 individuals. Burns had given melodious form to a popular longing; middle class and rural Scotland had found a voice. To understand what followed it is necessary to briefly review the poet's life. Robert Burns was born at Alloway, near Ayr, Jan. 25, 1759, his father being a poor farmer, but a man of sterling worth and intelligence, eager to give his son as good an education as he could afford. It was purely English, except that he studied French for two weeks and took a short course in land surveying; but it was extremely thorough and practical in English. At the early age of eleven he was an acute critic in questions of grammar, and his earliest letters attest his proficiency. As son as boyish strength was sufficient he was put to hard farm work.

The most generous estimate does not credit the Burns family library with more than a dozen miscellaneous books, among which were Pope's and Allan Ramsay's works, The Spectator, a volume of English songs and some rather tedious histories. With these were some theological works one would think calculated to frighten a boy, but Robert read every one of them and apparently understood them. It was not till he was 23 years

calculated to frighten a boy, but Robert read every one of them and apparently understood them. It was not till he was 23 years old that he had access to anything that might be called a general library, but "A poet was born and no Medusa could strike him dumb."

Poetry was in the air about him as well as struggling in his heart; love came and supplied the lacking element. At the age of 16 he composed the first poetry that he allowed any one else to read—a plaintive expression of a toiling farm boy's feelings towards a maiden—of which he afterwards wrote: "I was not —of which he afterwards wrote: "I was not so presumptuous as to imagine that I could make verses like printed ones composed by men who had Latin and Greek; but my girl sang a song which was said to be composed by a small country laird's son on one of his father's maids with whom he was in love, and I saw no reason why I might not rhyme as well as he; for, excepting that he could smear sheep and cast peats, his father living in the mooriands, he had no more scholar-craft than mysail." -of which he afterwards wrote: "I was not

From this time forward the lad enjoyed quite a local reputation, but his father was broken in health, Robert was the youngest of seven children, and life for him seemed to grow harder every year. Nevertheless he embraced every opportunity to store his mind with information, and was particularly eager to hear of the old Scottish heroes, but delighted most of all in the old women's stories of witches and warlocks, haunted gleus and crags, and mysterious appearances around the old churchyards. A little later he produced some lengthy pieces in the local dialect which attracted wide attention and caused his society to be greatly sought by some per-BURNS' BIRTHPLACE.

sons of means and culture—a result which was highly beneficial in developing his conversational powers, but induced habits of conviviality and consequent trouble.

In 1781-83 he was in the depths of despondency. He took a small farm'in conjunction with his brother, and lost the little he had invested. He cast about for methods of improving his fortunes, but failed in all. He was in love and could not marry. The parents of his loved one sternly forbade the union; the lovers met often, however, and the results were evil. Completely cast down, he resolved to leave his native land for Jamaica. resolved to leave his native land for Jamaica

resolved to leave his native land for Jamaica, and some of his sweetest, saddest poems were written while that intention remained. To procure the means of paying his passage he published the first edition of his poems—that of 1786, previously referred to—and its success changed the whole current of his life. He was on the point of embarking when he was invited to Edinburgh to attend to the issue of a second edition. In the capital he was "the lion of the hour." He associated with all who were emittent in letters, and with all who were emittent in letters, and with many eminent in rank, wealth and fashion, his conversation exciting as much admiration as his poetry. Unspoiled by flattery, he retained his independence of mind and love of rural life. It must be borne in mind also that this first edition of Burns did not contain those bitter reflections on the polemic elergy or those semi-political reflections which later made him so many enemies. HUNT FOR A MAN EATER.
