British Grenadier Guards Refuse to Parade.

A Number of the Older Heads Placed Under Arrest—Causes of the Trouble.

London, April 21.—For some years past there has been a feeling of growing discontent in some portions of the British army. This feeling, it was supposed, came to a head about a year ago, when the Second Battalion of the Grenadier Guards, quartered near Buckingham Palace, practically broke out into open mutiny and was exiled to Bermuda. It was supposed then that the authorities would take steps to remedy the evils complained of. This does not seems to have been the case, for this morning there is renewed and great excitement in military circles caused by a mutinous demonstration in almost every particular similar to that which caused the Second Battalion of Grenadier Guards who are in revolt. The Third Battalion of the Grenadier Guards quartered at Chelsea barrach. revolt. The Third Battalion of the Grenadier Guards quartered at Chelsea barracks, were ordered to parade in full marching order at 8 o'clock this morning. The men, who have been in a sullen frame of mind for some time, refused to obey this order. The officers of the battalion thereupon held a hurried consultation, and the leading non-commissioned officers were communicated with. The latter attempted to reason with the mutineers and to persuade them to parade, and after a long period of waiting four companies straggled slowly and with every mark of outward discontent out upon the parade ground. The remaining companies, however, refused to leave their rooms in the barracks. After the officials of the War Office had been informed of the occurrence the oldest members of the more discontented portion of the battalion were placed under arrest and an investigation into the cause of the mutiny was commenced. The mutineers ofter as an explanation that the order for the companies to parade in full marching order is an unprecedented step for their commanding officer to take upon a day when the battalion is called upon to mount guard at the palace on the same day. The men also declare they have been long subjected to a series of excessive and annoying drills, for which there was no excuse or reason. They assert these alleged excessive drills were not ordered with the view of perfecting the battalion in military maneuvers or the manual of arms, but solely for the convenience of their officers, who are thus enabled to leave London to enjoy themselves, while the privates and non-commissioned officers remain in London and are subjected to long and tedious drills under command of the fow less lucky or poorer officers.







Sensational Suiceide.

New York, April 21.—A young couple registered at the Grand Union Hotel on Sunday morning as P. Behraud and wife, and were assigned to room D, 8, on the third floor. Reciprocity Botween Spain and the Sensational Suicide.

MADRID, April 21.—The proposed reciprocity convention between Spain and the United States contains the following provisionions: In return for the privilege of free entry into the United States of Antilles sugars, molarses, coffee and hides and a reduction of the duty on tea, the United States will obtain exemption from duties on most of her raw and manufactured products and a reduction of the tariff on cereals and flour. American flour is placed upon a nearly equal footing with Spanish flour. Under the new convention American wheat, beans, lard, flour, petroleum, manufactured products and machinery will enter practically free of duty. Among other Spanish exports, olive oil will be replaced by American lard, and beans, now exported to Cuba in large quantities, will cease to be sent. The advantages resulting to Cuba will be great, but it is impossible to estimate the injury to Spanish interests. Reciprocity Between Spain and the States.




