A Bering Sea Decision. St. Petersburg, March 19.—The commission appointed to define the term "territorial waters," as used in the Bering Sea case, has decided that the term applies to all waters within thirty leagues of the coast line. Even here there is little expectation that this decision will be accepted by any foreign power, except perhaps the United States.

Horrible Holocaust.

MADRID, March 16.—At 3 o'clock this morning fire broke out in a pastry cook's shop in St. Sebastian. A keg of spirits exploded and spread the fire to the adjoining houses which were densely tenanted. All the occupants were sleeping, and the flames were around them before they could be warned. Two families on the top floor of a four-stery house were suffected in their beds. Fifteen persons jumped from the windows. Ten of them were killed and three received mortal injuries. Twenty-one persons are known to have perished, and several others whose fate is unknown, are believed to have perished in the ruins.

Act to-day stormed a hall in which Catholies were holding a private meeting. When the rioters had broken in the doors had broken in the doors several Catholies tried to bar their progress into the meeting. The rioters threw them down and forced their way to the platform, where the priests had raised an aitar and placed a crucifix. They spat on the crucifix, broke it into fragments and tossed the pinces into the congregation. The priests hoping to allay the cattlement began to intone anthems. Their calmness only aggravated the ugliness of the mob. The priests were attacked,

knocked down, carried to the doors and thrown into the street. While some of the rioters drove out the men, women and children of the congregation, others smashed the furniture in the hall. Many women and several men were severely injured. The police did not arrive in sufficient force to control the mob until after the hall had been emptied of the Catholics and all the furniture been destroyed.

Germany's Political Crisis. BERLIN, March 19 .- Before the final vote on the army bill, the committee left the Government face to face with a definitely hostile majority. Chancellor Von Caprivi had conferences with the chiefs of the parties represented on the committee. The negotiations left the Government and the negotiations left the Government and the committee more hostile than ever toward each other. The report of the committee will be submitted to the Reichstag after Easter. Every indication now points to the Reichstag supporting the committee. It is now expected that the Reichstag will be dissolved at the end of April. The closing speeches in the committee had a pronounced election character. Herr Richter declared the rejection of Herr Bennigsen's compromise was proof that there was

pronunced election character. Herr Richter deelared the rejection of Herr Rennigsen's compromise was proof that there was no possibility to deal with a Government behind which was an imperious will. All the parties, he said, might now combine in defense of constitutionalism against absolutism.

Herr Von Bennigsen denounced the stand made by Chancellor Von Caprivi, as precluding all hope of an arrangement, and assuring the certainty of shipwreck to the bill. The obstinacy of the Government would precipitate a general election. Were the Ministers aware, he asked, of what dissolution implied? It would bring about the wildest scenes of political confusion, and would cause disorders hitherto unknown to the German electors. Herr Bennigsen warred the Government that they had no chance to raily the country to their side. They could rely upon no party their side. They could rely upon no party except the Conservatives, and not even the Conservatives unless they made terms with

Conservatives unless they made terms with the agrarian faction.

Owing to the political crisis, Chancellor Von Caprivi will not accompany Emperor William on his visit to Rome, where his majesty will take part in the celebration of King Humbert's silver wedding.

### British News Budget.

Bold and Illegitimate Appeals to Popular Passion.

Ulster's Plan of Campaign is to Resist the Tax Collector.

LONDON, March 20 .- It is now fully apparent that the country is to be plunged at once into a most desperate political once into a most desperate political struggle, with all the worst features of a national election, but without the natural climax of a decisive ballot. The ballot is to be transferred next month from Parliament to the people. The methods to which the Tory party has committed itself is not short of insurrectionary. Popular elamonand threats of violence are expected to accomplish what cannot be done by obstruction and argument at Westminster. It is the first time during the present reign that the minority party in Great Britain, with no question before the people, has made a bold and illegitimate appeal to popular passion. This new departure in British politics will furnish a spectacle which the world may watch with the confident expectation of plenty of lively features. The surrender of the Government this week to Tory obstruction is undoubtedly a severe blow to the home rule cause, but perhaps it was inevitable. Mr. Gladstone's slight illness, which at the time threatened more severe consequences, was the immediate cause of the change of programme. He is now in full fighting trim again, and the Government is prepared to meet the opposition on its own ground of popular agitation.

The Ulster agitation is really serious The home rule opponents there have practi cally unlimited funds at their disposal. Lord Iveagh, one of the great Guinnes. brewery firm, is said to have subscribed brewery firm, is said to have subscribed \$250,000, and promises to make it more if required. The talk about big purchases of arms is humbug, as the importing of arms into freland is pronibited. But there is no doubt that among the Orange rifle clubs there are lots of old-fashioned weapons. These are being ostentatiously furbished up for the campaign. The Orangemen have no real intention of taking the field. That is a mere platform expression. They do think, though, that if home rule comes into operation they can offer successful resistance to the collecting If home rule comes into operation they can offer successful resistance to the collecting of taxes, because if the police and the military are called out to enforce payment they will refuse to act. Still the entire force would not mutiny, for if it did it would virtually be establishing a military despotism, and there is no people in Europe who would be less ready to tolerate such a form of government than the English.

Austria's Unhappy Empress. Emperor Francis Joseph has returned from Switzerland to Vienna alone, having failed entirely to persuade the Empress to accompany him. She will continue her restless traveling up and down Europe probably for the rest of her life, and it is doubtful whether she will ever again set foot in Vienna except to pay an occasional hurried visit to the vault wherein rest the remains of her suicide son. The Empress suffers terribly from insomnia. During her stay in Switzerland she walked at least 30 miles every day in the hope of tiring herself into sleep, but in vain. She of tains upon an average only three hours' broken sleep nightly, and it is feared that she will become utterly worn out. Fortunately she has resolutely resisted the temptation to take opiates, and if she continues firm in this wise and courageous course the physicians are not without hope that in a few months she will be restored to health.

Crispi's Dissolute Son.

Political and financial scandals in Italy ontinue to develop features as dramatic as those of France. The betrayal of Crispi by his son is this week's incident. The ex-Premier discovered that many of his private political papers had disappeared. He learned that many private letters from Garibaldi and Mazzini and decuments of State were in the hands of his political enemies. It was proved that his dissolute young son had stolen the papers and sold them right and left. The young man has been sent to the House of Correction on his father's application.

The Cambridge Crew Improving. The performance of Cambridge in rowing over the Thames course in 19 minutes 5 seconds has raised the hopes of the light seconds has raised the nopes of the light blue and made, the people think that there will be a close race. Cambridge has im-proved much this week. They lasted the course, however, and finished with a grand burst, beating a strong scratch eight in the last mile. Oxford has done some smart rowing, also, and it is evident that every man in the boat does his work. Their progress through rough water with the boat half full of water was good. There were some young men at the dinner, but he was the most youthful of them all in his manner. He talked on every conceivable subject with lively interest, and did not leave to go home until after 11 o'clock.

German "Noblemen" in Trouble. German army officers have swooped down upon London in the past week and the streets in the West End have taken on somewhat the appearance of pictures of Unter den Linden. Tall, military young follows, with fresh complexions and enormous yellow mustaches waxed to a fine point can be picked out everywhere. They are here with a view to hushing up They are here with a view to hushing up what threatens to be the most serious army scandal Germany has ever had. Some of them are fugitives hiding from the law; others have come here to help their comrades in disgrace and to attempt to smooth matters over and to pave the way for return. In all 74 officers are implicated. They represent the noblest families, the richest and the oldest in all Germany. There is hardly an honored name that has There is hardly an honored name that has not some connection with the scandal. The not some connection with the scandal. The specific acts charged are gambling, not paying debts, all sorts of wild orgies and general conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman. The explanation for all this wrongdoing is the old one of idleness. Peace has endured too long, so these young fellows, with high spirits, plenty of money and nothing to do, naturally fell into evil ways. The official investigation will begin early in April.

Cholera Reappearing.

"Through the eye to the mind" has never been more fully exemplified than in the lessons now being given in this cooking class. The perfection with which Mrs. Ewing given exhibitions of her art makes one naturally in love with the kitchen department, and each would be an excellent object lesson even were the whole done in pantomime. The absolute cleanliness, the freedom from any but the most savory odors and the perfect product of the oven, stewpan and broiler, when presented to the class, seem to relieve the process of cooking from the air of drudgery hitherto considered inseperable from it, and make cooking more like a morning pastime than a daily disagreeable duty.

Mrs. Ewing began, as before, by the Socratic method of teaching, which was fully reciprocated by the class, and the conversation was animated and practical, as usual. "If you do not wish to put the steak on the table just when cooked, would you cover it?" was a question that elicited a copious illustration that no one could possibly forget, and meaning that if covered so that it will not steam it will be all right. Beef tea, that extract usually so wretchedly made but so relighable when properly prepared, was the first on the programme. The round of beef should be freed from fat, out into slices, with cold water just enough to cover, and allowed to boil two or three minutes. Imprisonment of the Apostle PaulInteresting Notes.

The fifth of the series of interesting letters written by Rev. Joseph Philp in Southern Europe was read to his congregation at the Centennial Church last night. It was dated Brindisi, Feb. 16, 1893, and portions of it are as follows:

"I intended to write to you from Rome, but my time was so fully taken up that I was unable to do so. There were many things in Rome that interested me very much. It is a beautiful city, growing with great rapidity aver since it became the capital of free, united Italy. I esteemed it a very great privilege to walk and write in the city of the Cæsars, the capital of the great Roman empire of prophecy and of history. It was my privilege to look upon ruins of walls and temples and squeducts that were built centuries before our Saviour walked this earth. It was more interesting still to stand in the great Colosseum, where many Christians fought with wild beasts and died for the cause of Christ. Then I visited the Catacombs, where many hid themselves from the hand of the persecutor and left their ashes in quiet and hope to rest awaiting the trump of God. But the most interesting spot of all I visited in Rome was the Mamertine Prison. I went to it twice that twice I might go over the place where Paul was kept in chains. It was a low, dark, damp cell, not more than twelve feet square. As I stood in it with bowed head (for it was not high enough for me to stand erect in), I did not wonder that Paul shivered and longed for the cloak he had left at Troas, that he might shelter himself from the cold. I thought of him as old and erippled and rheumatic, rejoicing in God, and saying: I am now ready to be offered up. I have fought a good fight and have finished the course; I have kept the faith.' I thanked God for his life, his spirit and his work, and that I was permitted to enjoy the same salvation and preach the same gospel, but not in bonds.

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



MR. GIBSON'S ACCUSATION. In another column of to-day's issue, Mr Richard Gibson, of Delaware, the wellknown stock breeder, makes a serious charge against the authorities at Ottawa. He asserts that the Government is directly responsible for the scheduling of Canadian cattle in Great Britain, and the Farmers Advocate, to which he has addressed his communication, agrees with him. It says

"With Mr. Gibson we concur that the blame of having Canadian cattle scheduled by England may be laid at the door of the Dominion Government." The question which Mr. Gibson raises should be probed to the bottom. If, as he

asserts, shortsighted, criminal neglect on the part of the authorities at Ottawa was the cause of our cattle being scheduled in England, to the serious loss of the farmers and their customers, no condemnation can be too strong. The facts so far made publie confirm Mr. Gibson's charge. Many months since the London Standard con tained the statement that the quarantine regulations between Canada and the United States were being broken on the Northwest borders. The British Government found symptoms of what was alleged to be pleuro-pneumonia among Canadian cattle landed in Scotland. The facts are against the assumption that the cattle suffered from that deadly disease. Neverthethe chief Conservative paper in England insisted that it was probably the case that pleuro-pneumonia existed in Canada because of the lax regulations in the Northwest. Canadian cattle were scheduled. The quarantine regulations on the Northwest border remained partially non-effective, as Mr. Gibson points out. And, what is of great significance, no amendment was ordered till Mr. McMillan, M. P. for Huron, last month put a notice on the order paper of the House of Comnons calling attention to the fact. Then a hurried consultation was held by the Government, and the order in council enforcing quarantine was rushed through. In view of these facts Mr. Gibson's stric-



DR. RAINSFORD'S SALOON.

A Big Temperance Discussion Pre

Cipitated.

New York, March 17.—The extremely lively discussion in St. Chrysostom's Chapel on Tuesday night, over the celebrated church saloon proposition of Dr. W. S. Rainsford, of St. George's Episcopal Church, was continued yesterday in religious circles, and in the case of some ministers sleeping over the question had not modified their views. Dr. John A. B. Wilson, pastor of the Eighteenth Street Methodist Church, who attacked Dr. Rainsford so bitterly at the meeting, sent him ord so bitterly at the meeting, sent him

Methodist Church, who attacked Dr. Rainsford so bitterly at the meeting, sent him a letter early yesterday morning challenging him to a joint discussion of the question within the next ten days, at any convenient place. Dr. Rainsford replied, promptly declining the proposition.

Dr. Rainsford said to a reporter yesterday: "I have no time to debate with Prohibitionists. I think that I am borne out by facts when I say that prohibition does not appeal strongly nowadays to the thinking men of the country. The arguments of the Prohibitionists are not good ones and their reasoning is illogical. I believe that they do some good, but they certainly have not accomplished very much. The cause of temperance has its worst foes in its advocates. So many of them are ignorant, and so many are intemperate in argument that their cause is not a favorite with the community at large."

Dr. Wilson, of the Eighteenth street Methodist Church, said:

"I had them on the hip last night and I had with me a stenographer who took down all the remarks in full. Dr. Rainsford was in the midst of his admiring friends, who were evidently determined to see him through. Although they had published that the lecture would be followed by a few discussions, yet they seemed to grow quite furious as the bubbles of his cheap sophistry were pricked. They didn't enjoy having their champion skinned before their very eyes. The gentleman evidently doesn't investigate or know what he is talking about. When Mr. Gustafsen took up the cause of the Gothenburg system and showed that it was wholly misrepresented by Dr. Rainsford, and that it was doing just the opposite of what he had claimed, it was made plain that Dr. Rainsford did not know what he was talking about, and his attempts to extricate himself from his false position were utterly puerile and humiliating.

Why, the man's nose and face were red as fire, and showed he was a drinker."

The squire, who was only 31 years of age, was a rich from master with an income of \$750,000 a year. He ran away with Dolly Tester, ex-ballet dancer, and wife of the Marquis of Allesbury, a few years ago, and paid the Marquis £100,000 to settle the matter. His name has been coupled with those of Bess E. Belwood, the stage beauty, Agnes Hewitt, and Mrs. Langtry. Abingdon's training establishment for race horses at Moulton paddocks, Newmarket, was the finest thing of its kind in England. In horse-racing he had a Liverpool cup winner four times in Father Confessor, took the same cup three times with Lady Rosenberg and won the great Derby once in 1885 with Royal Hampton. The father of the 'Squire was the well-known Baird of Gartsherrie, who at the time of the failure of the Western Bank of Scotland wrote his check to pay the demand of the depositors for \$10,000,000. It is believed by many that the death of the 'Squire may have some effect upon the Mitchell-Corbett match. The executors of his estate may insist upon the withdrawal of the \$10,000 stake money which the 'Squire put up. In that case the match will likely fall

HOW BLESSINGS BRIGHTEN?

That "blessings brighten as they take their flight" is one of those ornamental proverbe which people keep for use on occasions when they think the circumstances indorse it, but in which they do not seem to have the vital faith of calm, antecedent reliance. When a blessing has brightened in taking its flight they point to the fact as a triumphant vindication of the proverb. But they are never anxious or even ready to put their blessings to flight for the sake of seeing them brighten. This is not quite just to the proverb or the blessings. It is a little like "ringing in" an old prophecy, as certain persons have the habit of doing; after the event has occurred; though they are very careful not to refer to any prophecy they have made which has been fulfilled. There are a good many persons in everybody's acquaintance—persons who remind you very carefully when they see you with your unbrella up that they predicted rain, but who are mum as church mice about a similar prediction which has not brought out the umbrella.

The saying really is entitled to better treatment and a higher degree of confidence. Our hindsight has so often approved it that we ought to begin trusting our foresight in the matter. It is a good time to begin when the proverb has received so notable an indorsement as it has in the case of the Hon. Jerry Rusk, late of the Agricultural Department.

The secretary has for some years been recognized as a blessing—in a mild way. During his administration of the agricultural branch of our free and progressive government he has blessed the farmers with alternate seeds and good advice, crop figures and rain predictions. If he has not stamped himself indelibly on the national policy in any great particular he has been industrious and efficient in his sphere and has endeared himself unspeakably to every tiller of the soil from Eastport to Puget Sound and from the great lakes to the Gulf of Mexico. But blessing as he was in the department he has brightened immeasurably in taking his flight to the shades of private life. If there is any doubt on this point it can be solved by reading his article in the current North American Review on "American Farming a Hundred Years Hence."

It would be an unjustifiable infringement of the Copyright Act to reproduce them in full; but the publishers of the excellent periodical referred to cannot possibly object to our summarizing of the results which Mr. Rusk infers from the changes now going on and sure to continue changes now going on and sure to continue in the conditions under which agriculture

In the first place there is to be, 100 years hence, occupation and possession by private comers of every foot of land in the country available for tillage, to supply the needs of the 300,000,000 or 400,000,000 people who will be then, as now, the wealthiest and least self-denying of any people in the world. "More bushels of wheat will be needed to supply our own people with bread than our present average yield of corn, which means three and a half times more than last year's crop, the largest but one of any wheat crop ever harvested in the United States. Irrigation will be practiced as a matter of course wherever water is obtainable; and millions of acres now unproductive will yield rich harvests. American farmers will supply American consumers with \$500,000,000 worth of sugar, whether cane, sorghum or beet; the demands of our home markets for meat and dairy products will be met by a system of care and feeding which will convert the new commonly accepted ratio of four acres to one cow into something like four cows to one acre. Science, aided by necessity, will have solved the problems of feeding so as to secure the maximum result for the minimum feed; waste products will be utilized in a hundred ways not now dreamed so as to secure the maximum result for the minimum feed; waste products will be utilized in a hundred ways not now dreamed of; and we can readily realize that beside the increased yield due to a better understanding of plant life and culture and to remedies for the prevention of injuries, whether by disease or insects, whereby agriculture to-day loses hundreds of millions of dollars yearly, the application of every aore of our wast territory to the particular uses for which it is best adapted will add immensely to our aggregate productiveness."

will add immensely to our aggregate productiveness."

Under these changed conditions the poor farmers are to become a thrifty peasantry owning their own homes; the average size of the farm will be less than it is now; there will be a greater concentration of population in the raral districts; the roads will be good, smooth and well kept, bordered with shade trees and available for travel on all seasons. Electric motors will be established; the telephone will be found in every farm house and a rural mail delivery will carry mails daily to every farm house and a rural mail every farm house and a rural mail every farm house and a rural mail every farm house and education with the corresponding classes in the cities; and business and professional men will look forward to the acquisition of wealth as a means of securing a home in the country where they can end their days in peace and comfert. And to crown the whole the Agricultural Department will, by that happy time, have become so liberally endowed that "the appropriations made for it by comparison with those devoted to the other purposes of government will be proportionate to its true position in relation to the other industries of the country."

Such is a brief outline of the promise which the late secretary of agriculture makes to the farmer, and in making it he has done the latter an inestimable service. What the farmer of this country needs more than anything else is encouragement; and this he can find in unstinted measure in the glowing prophecy of the Hon. Jerry. It is true that he does not point out specifically just what is to become of the mortgage, but he implies very clearly that the mortgage will have disappeared before this century rolls around—at all events the beatific vision he sees is utterly inconsistent with the mortgage.

CONTEMPT IN THE WEST INDIES.

New York Tribune.)

Eleven English judges, composing the lords of the judicial commmittee of her Majesty's Privy Council, including the Lord Chancellor, the Lord Chief Justice and the Master of the Rolls, have recently been occupied with a case at law which had its origin in the Bahama Islands, and which has drawn from the committee an interesting decision as to what may and may not constitute a contempt of court. In the British West Indies there is a standing quarrel between the Government and that portion of the population which possesses a permanent interest in the soil. The governing class imported from England and consisting largely of inferior persons who owe their appointments to politicians at home or to rich relatives as a return for campaign contributions, affect to constitute

allocal aristocracy and to hold themselves above the merchants and planters. The friction between the governing classes and the people of the islands manifests itself in all kinds of ways, social and political. It happens just now that there is much less of it in the Bahamas than anywhere else, for that colony is blessed with a libral-minded, progressive and patriotic Governor. Sir Ambrose Shea, who is distinctly a man of the people, and whose administration has been to their advantage in a most material sense. The official aristocrat in the Bahamas is a Mr. Yelverton, who, occupying the position of chief justice, is necessarily a person of prominence and power. Mr. Yelverton was under the impression that he carried his judicial functions around with him, and that they pervaded the atmosphere in his vicinity for an indefinite distance in all directions. For a man to deny that it was a fine day amounted, in Mr. Yelverton's opinion to an interference with the due administration of justice.

From this, peculiarity it followed that Mr. Yelverton was not a popular individual in Nassau, and that there were many who took a kind of amiable satisfaction in indicating their opinion that he really did not amount to a providence. Like other more or less useful and intelligent persons, Mr. Yelverton had a tendency to write letters to the newspapers on various matters connected with the moral and physical wellbeing of the universe, and two of his recent contributions dealt with a controversy regarding fuel. An interested and anonymous correspondent replied to Mr. Yelverton's expressions, taking a view of the chief justice's character and attainments which was anything but flattering. Mr. Yelverton was much offended. He at once resolved himself into a court, sent for the editor of the paper which had printed the anonymous letter, required him to reveal the name of the author and to produce the manuscript to the court; and upon his refusal to do any of these things he was promptly committed to jail during the pleasure of the chief justice for contempt. At this point Sir Ambrose Shea, being of the opinion that Mr. Yelverton's views regarding fuel, voluntarily written to a newspaper, were not necessarily a judicial decision, and that it did not interfere with the operations of justice to oppose them, pardoned the editor and give Mr. newspaper, were not necessarily a judicial decision, and that it did not interfere with the operations of justice to oppose them, pardoned the editor and give Mr. Yelverton to understand that he had gone too far. The judge, however, went even further, and finally got as far as the English Privy Council. It has taken, indeed, the combined atrength and authority of eleven of England's greatest judges to convince Mr. Yelverton that his remarks, whatever the time or occasion of making them, are not essentially sacred. It may be assumed that he is at last convinced. The Privy Council has informed him that the editor did not commit contempt either in publishing the letter or in refusing his demands for the manuscript and for the name of the author; that he had no right to make any such demands or to punish the editor, and that the action of the Governor in exercising the pardoning power was both competent and proper. For the benefit of all courts, it may be useful to say that the lord chief justice remarked, in rendering his decision, that he could readily conceive a state of things in which a man might call him a fool in respect to the exercise of his judicial functions without committing any offense. As an indication of the fact that judges in countries where public opinion constitutes the highest court are beginning to have a truer appreciation of their relations to the people, this remark is significant and welcome.

THE OLD AND THE NEW. Henry George, writing from Washington, D. C., says:

Henry George, writing from Washington, D. C., says:

"The impression here among politicians is that Cleveland has gathered around himself a strong cabinet. Of course, there are loud carpers, but such there would be, no matter who might have been selected, for disappointed men must cry out. The spoils-machine men of the Hill stripe point to Gresham with utter disgust. But those who are shrewdest and see furtherest, declare that in this appointment Cleveland has shown the keenest political wisdom, for he thereby breaks down the last tradition of the war and shows that not old names, but new issues, are the real dividing lines between the parties.

"A very important thing, that these appointments show, is that Cleveland has no intention of backsiding on the tariff question. Pretty much all of these men are in their hearts, if not openly, absolute free traders in principle. They may not be clear as to the best way of raising revenue, after the tariff is abolished but they are utterly opposed to the protective principle, which any tariff whatever more or less involves. If the state of the Treasury in which the Republicans are leaving it does not embarrass him, it seems certain that Senator Caelisle will recommend a slashing cut in the tariff, not only making immense reductions all along the line, but putting a number of the more important so-called 'raw materials' on the free list. This will bring about a deficiency in the revenue, and discussion in two directions is likely to ensue—on the one hand as to new methods of obtaining revenue, and on the other hand as to reducing expenses. Owing to the present condition of polities, it seems unlikely that expenses will be much curtailed notwithstanding many crying evils. The strongest probability is that most of the discussion will turn on the question as to new sources of revenue.



He has in turn bullied, esjoled, threatened, and at last demanded that right, and it is only the fact of the discovery of pleuro (though very doubtful of it being the contagious form) in some of the shipments that has prevented him gaining his object. And if it will strengthen his hand to gain that much-to-be-desired result by following suit to the English lead, can you blame England for scheduling us? As the son of an English farmer, whose herd was twice decimated by the dreaded securge, I fully sympathize with the farmers of Great Britain, who have lost many millions of pounds worth of cattle from imported disease, and who only ask protection so far as to compel the slaughter of cattle at port of entry.
