COMPANY YIELDS TO DEMANDS OF UNION; WILL BE NO STRIKE

President Currie Agrees To Continue High Scale of Wages—Company Promises Continuation of Old Agreement.

There will be no street railway strike. President Currie in conference with union representatives last night agreed to continue the high scale of wages. W. J. Ashton, the union representative, announced.

Conductors and motormen will receive 30 cents and 44 cents an hour, which was the scale adopted when higher fares became effective.

The prospect of a strike arose when the higher fare bylaw was declared illegal by the courts. The company said that it would reduce the wages to the old scale of 23 cents to 33 cents an hour on November 1. The men were notified, and at a special meeting decided to strike if this was done.

They appointed a committee to meet the street railway. No decision was reached, and President Currie called a meeting of the board of directors on Monday and met the men at 8:30 p.m.

Mr. Ashton said the meeting was short and agreeable. No new agreement was drawn up, but the company said the old one would continue in force.

Will Meet Public Approval. President John Colbert of the employees' union informed The Advertiser, after the conference, that the men had suggested to the company that the interests of the public, and also of the company and its employees, would be best served by the adoption of suitable means to relieve the menace of a strike.

The union executive proposed that the most effective available means was to allow the higher rate of fares to continue in effect pending the development of negotiations by the city toward the purchase of the street railway or other adjustment of the troubled street railway situation.

We feel confident, President Colbert stated on behalf of the men, "that we may trust our interests to the people. We feel that if we are given opportunity to set before the people the situation as it affects the employees of the company nothing will be done by the people to burden the men."

FEDERAL SQUARE TO BE SKATING RINK IN MONTHS OF WINTER
Proposal To Be Made to City Council.

TO BE USED BY ADULTS
Leaving Victoria Park to the Youngsters.

An open-air skating rink may be built on the Federal Square property, this is a possibility that the members of the board of works will bring this matter to the attention of the city council immediately after the adjournment of a petition also is being prepared asking the city council to take this action.

It is likely that the council will view the matter favorably. Early this year a similar petition was made, but the winter was too far advanced for the rink to be established.

For Grown-Ups. For several years the large piece of ground opposite the city hall has remained idle. It has been levelled and made into a skating rink for the children. In the opinion of those who are preparing the petition, they plan to have this free rink used largely by the adult citizens, while the free rink at Victoria Park could be kept entirely for the children. This would give the little folk an opportunity to learn skating and to play games without being in danger from the faster and larger skaters.

Lights Near Cove. If this plan goes through, the old-time popularity of skating in London promises to be revived, as this will provide a central gathering place for the enthusiasts. The public utilities commission is planning to install lights near the Cove in South London to make this a skating rink. This will prove admirable for that section of the city, but is too far south for the majority of the citizens to enjoy its advantages.

The public utilities commission has not the power to deal with the Federal Square, as it is not classed with "parks." It therefore remains with No. 2 committee of the city council to look after the matter.

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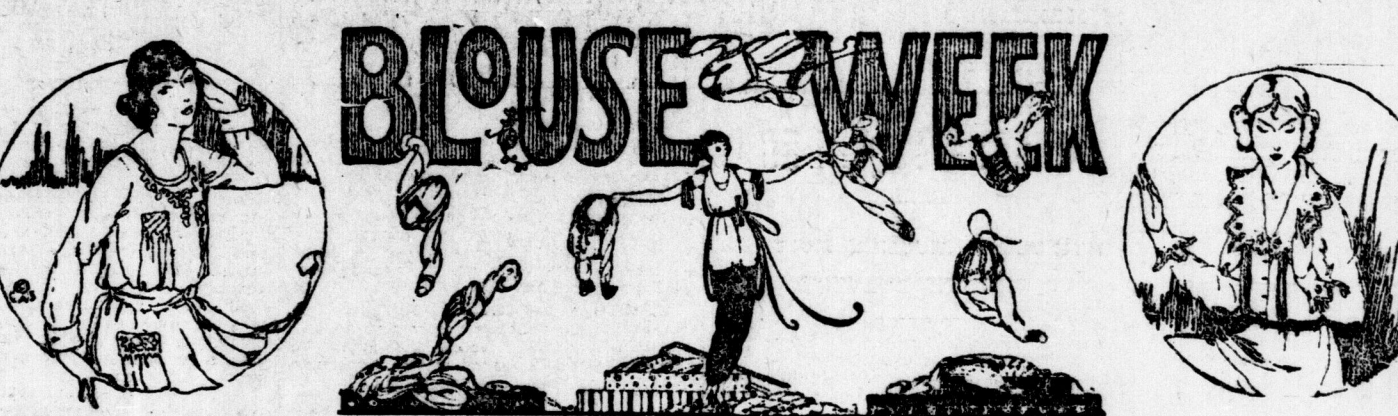

STRIKE AVERTED BY COMMITTEE ACTION?

Report Says This Resulted From Secret Meeting.

The street railway company's agreement to pay the higher scale of wages to its men, thus averting a strike, was a direct outcome of a secret meeting between President Charles Currie, Mayor Somerville and several aldermen in the Public Utilities building Monday afternoon, The Advertiser was informed today.

Citizens are wondering just what took place at the meeting, which would assure the company that it could afford to pay the higher wages. "Were any pledges made to the street railway?" they are inquiring.

President Currie arrived in the city Monday. It was understood that he would meet the union men at 4 o'clock. The time was suddenly changed to 8 o'clock.

The reason for this was apparent when Mr. Currie was discovered in a secret conference with some of the city fathers. Following this secret meeting he met the representatives of the street railway union and assured them that the company would continue the higher scale of wages.

ALL BUSINESS SUSPENDED FOR TWO MINUTES

City Honors Request of King George on Armistice Day.

CONSTABLE ON THE JOB Brought Motorists to Standstill at Corner When They Forgot.

There was a cessation of all business at every description this morning at 11 o'clock for two minutes, as London celebrated Armistice Day, according to the Empire-wide requis which King George V. that all business be stopped for two minutes at this time.

At 10 o'clock the silence of death itself hung over the city. Changing street cars pulled up with a jerk. Drivers of delivery trucks threw on the brakes and squeaked to a stop. There was a hush over the big department stores as sales were stopped midway, and over the city in general, the request was carried out to the letter.

No Phone Calls.

A few Bell Telephone subscribers who tried to get the central at 11 o'clock, were puzzled at receiving no answer, but the hello girls had been given orders to stand away from the switchboards for two minutes and they did. The trains on all the railroads stopped wherever they happened to be, while all telegraph wires, both commercial and press, ceased to click.

The big policeman on the corner of Dundas and Richmond streets brought several motorists to a standstill. Apparently had forgotten all about Armistice Day, but the constable did not let them pass.

The girls at work in an establishment across the street from the Advertiser stopped the delivery of mail. A constable on the floor below kept his needle going full blast. He never let up for a second.

A Contrast.

The streets of the city presented a great contrast to that of last November 11 when the great news that the Germans had capitulated came hurrying over the wires, just as the thoroughfares were flooded with people and the streets were thronged with joy and celebration. The celebration today, although not of the same boisterous character, was more sincere, and Armistice Day, November 11, will always be a sacred and memorable day in Canada's history.

In Honor of Dead.

During the silence which lay over the city for two minutes this morning after the stroke of the eleventh hour, a solemnity in honor of the men who yielded up their lives in the recent war was played by the music of the bells. When a beautiful wreath of flowers was placed upon the monument there by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. Words were uttered, no official bodies were present, and no martial music was played. The music of the bells of the city was the only music of the whole city at rest, while memory's fingers played the requiem on the strings of those who have passed on from earth.

NOT DRUNK, BUT HE HAD NOT LICENSE

John L. McKinnon was discharged on a charge of driving an auto while in an intoxicated condition, but was fined \$10 for failing to have a taxi license, in police court this morning.

DRURY SAYS U. F. O. NOT IN ANY SENSE A CLASS GOVERNMENT

Will Seek To Serve the Interests of All.

URGES LOAN PURCHASES

Declares Country Must Deal Generously With Soldiers.

TORONTO, Nov. 10.—Before a gathering of more than 2,000 persons at a Victory Loan meeting in Massey Hall here tonight, E. C. Drury, premier-designate of the Province of Ontario, made his first public speech in this city since his selection as leader of the U. F. O.-Labor party. Mr. Drury's address consisted chiefly of an urgent appeal to the citizens to subscribe to the extent of their resources for the Victory Loan, but he made some references to the U. F. O. and his cabinet making. He was received with hearty applause and some cheers, and was given a sympathetic hearing. Mr. Drury shared the honors with Hon. Arthur Meighen, premier-designate of the Dominion, who also spoke in behalf of the Victory Loan. Rev. W. A. Cameron, pastor of Bloor Street Baptist Church, was another speaker.

E. R. Wood, chairman of the Dominion executive of the Victory Loan, who presided, pointed out the need of the Victory Loan, and expressed confidence that the objective would be met. He said that the Victory Loan campaign in Ontario had subscribed more than any other city in Canada, and he hoped to see Toronto again this year leading the whole Dominion.

May Lose Ticket. Mr. Drury, at the outset of his address, confessed diffidence at appearing at the meeting as "an attraction," he said, "I consented to come, though I am rather busy these days, and I am afraid I may lose my ticket in the cabinet makers' union, because I am working overtime. As I am not yet sworn in I should be retiring, in fact, I am retiring—some of the reporters are wondering where I am keeping myself."

The premier-designate then thanked the audience for its kind greeting. He took it, he said, as an evidence that the people believed the new party would make honest efforts to advance the best interests of the people of the province as a whole. He assured the audience that there would be no class legislation from the U. F. O.-Labor Government, as it was not in any sense a class government. "We are not out to get things for the farmers which they should not have," he declared. "We will administer the affairs of the province for every citizen in it."

The duty devolving upon the people to buy as many Victory bonds as they could was emphasized by Mr. Drury who said the country had to deal harshly and generously with the returned soldiers, so far as the country's finances would permit. Speaking of the people's responsibility for the re-establishment of the soldiers, he said: "I'm not much of a hand to shout patriotism, and he talked about 'I am not going to shout patriotism,' he said, 'but I hope to show in my conduct that I live for the benefit of the community.'"

Reverting to his reference in his address at Barrie a week to the depression that he believed was coming, Mr. Drury declared that he was not a pessimist, but the facts showed that the war was bound to come to an end. He said he thought it had already reached its peak.

Going Down. "It depends on the people and the Victory Loan," he said, "whether this deflation is serious or not. It depends on our ability to save and our ability to produce whether we suffer or not. In this connection the new premier of Ontario said he thought he could save his farm now and buy it back before very long at a much lower price than he would get for it now. 'But I am not going to sell the farm,' he assured the audience. 'It has been in the family a hundred years.'

"One thing that will not go down," continued Mr. Drury, "is the money invested in Victory Bonds. The money went in Victory Bonds is secure as long as the average industry, including farming as well as manufacturing, remains on its feet."

In a final reference to his government, Mr. Drury, semi-humorously, said that the people's government, talking in the U. F. O. and Labor, and willing to take in others, so long as they do not come looking for cabinet seats."

He concluded his address by stating that it was the duty of governments to economize to the narrowest limits within the bounds of efficacy, and as much the duty of governments as of individuals to save. He expressed confidence that the province of Ontario would do its duty in connection with the Victory Loan. "Ontario has a fine sense of public duty," he added.

Offers Good Wishes. Hon. Arthur Meighen, who was given a hearty reception, expressed pleasure at meeting Mr. Drury for the first time, and he said he was sure he voiced the sentiment of the audience in wishing the U. F. O. the utmost success in the Ontario Legislature success in his choice of a cabinet, and in the conduct of the affairs of the province.

Mr. Meighen commented on Ontario and Toronto on their great achievements in patriotic efforts, and he was confident that the mistakes of the Government this country has stood unitedly behind the man at the front, filling the patriotic fund to the brim, supporting the Red Cross, the Belgian Relief and every other relief until nearly every dollar was being sent to work in every suffering country among the allied powers."

Mr. Meighen paid a warm tribute to the organizing genius of Chairman E. R. Wood, which had meant so much to the Victory Loan campaign.

He touched upon the financial obligations of the Dominion, and pointed out, amid applause, that out of every four dollars of the national debt, three dollars was owed to our own people.

Must Retrench. Mr. Meighen was emphatic in declaring that all Canadians must embark upon a period of retrenchment in order to bring the Dominion's debt in bounds. The finest method of saving was provided through the Victory Loan.

"Is there a man or woman who has cause to regret ever having bought a Victory bond?" he asked. He would venture to say that from one end of Canada to the other there was no person sorry for having done so.

Referring to Mr. Drury's prediction of business depression to come, Mr. Meighen said: "Whether prices fall or don't fall, it does not make any difference so long as we continue to produce goods for our own needs and to send to the outside world. By keeping our people busy producing this country is going to be prosperous, no matter what else happens."

Mr. Meighen spoke out plainly in regard to extravagance which, he said, was rampant in every province, and until the people as a whole learned

the lesson of thrift in that proportion we would have depression of some kind or other. The first essential was to produce and the next to save, and the man who bought Victory bonds to the utmost limit of his ability to buy helped the country to produce and himself to save.

Mr. Meighen paid a tribute to the motherland and her wonders in regard to the war, and referred in appreciative terms to Canada's recognition in the league of nations.

CLEMENCEAU SAID IT.

Premier Clemenceau of France, addressing a vast gathering at Strasbourg, declared that the solution of industrial unrest was work. Produce, says the "Tiger," and industrial and social ills will quickly be eradicated. The whole trouble with the world today, the reason for the non-production that has brought on perilous times, is that mankind in the mass imagined that as a result of the great convulsion there would at once be an improvement in the conditions of life that would provide the maximum of happiness with the minimum of effort. Men have failed to recognize that labor is one of the immutable laws of life. Without work, plenty of work, and hard work, little that is worth while can be secured and retained. The war has upset ages-old despotism and anarchy, but it hasn't magically brought about an era of ease for mankind, as millions seem to have expected. A very short spell of idleness such as the world is experiencing today will bring industrial and social ruin to mankind, but a general recognition that work is vital to progress, prosperity, health and happiness, that labor is an unchangeable law, will bring the necessities, comforts and even luxuries of life once more within everybody's reach, and this will produce the contentment and stabilization so badly needed by the world over.

THE FARMERS AND THE "FRILLS."

An unimportant question, perhaps, but one that will force itself on the attention of the new farmers' Government from the opening day of the session of the new Legislature will be the retention or disappearance of the residue of medieval ceremony that still attaches itself to so democratic a body as the Ontario Legislature. Of late years there had been some tendency to add to the "frills and feathers," and Toronto has been approaching Ottawa in the extent of non-sensical procedure that attached to its government. We hardly think the new Legislature will be found very much interested in having its session opened by a lieutenant-governor in knee-breeches, coming down in a state coach and attended by a guard of honor. In fact, they may be found decidedly hostile to a continuation of this and other ceremonies that may have been in place in days when Tudors or Stuarts reigned in England, but that have no meaning for a Canadian province.

The effort to create a semi-royal court at Ottawa has always appealed to some people in the capital city. It has never really succeeded, and even less success has attended the efforts at Toronto to ape Ottawa. There has always been an element in the Legislature hostile to the extravagant cost of Government House and its maintenance, and the new Government is hardly likely to be very sympathetic to this costly variety of provincial court.

WORK FOR THE CHURCHES.

Some of our thinkers tell us that we shall never have economic peace and stability, until Christianity has been restored among the people. But has genuine Christianity ever been more the religion of the people than it is today? Certainly the spirit of co-operation and brotherhood has never before shown itself so strong as in our unions, associations and organizations for mutual help, or in our literature of

militant democracy. The church has done its best in the past, and is still doing heroic work for better things, but today it is buttressed by many secular agencies of brotherhood.

Perhaps the church might widen and strengthen its work if it would supplement the traditional lines of effort by more modern and semi-secular activities. Into any such activities the church knows how to infuse its own particular spirit; it can assimilate them to the more traditional character of its work. Already the churches have interested themselves, in a practical way, in various social and economic causes. Why should not the churches take up studies of modern thought also, modern political, social, philosophical and psychological theory? Frail denominations or societies are "beating them to it" to use the expressive slang phrase. Modern ideas sadly twisted, orientalized, sensualized, or variously perverted, are spread among the curious or the eager to learn by eccentric agencies. Is it not the church's business to provide the people with safe and sane popularizations and criticisms of modern thought on political and social subjects, especially as all political and social thought has its religious implications? Mere denunciation of modernism, in toto, or of science and its positions, will not satisfy intelligent people any longer. The day for that is past. Science justifies itself to reason by its achievements, its inventions, its promotion of human welfare; it is not mere theorizing, like the "science" and philosophy of long ago, but by its fruits ye know it.

The churches might conceivably work with the universities in an effort to direct the philosophic, ethical and political studies of the people. Many who have felt a want of attraction in the church's time-honored program would be drawn by its competent handling of the more richly complex systems of modern thought. Could not the churches, in co-operation with colleges and schools, institute evening, Sunday and Saturday afternoon classes in ethics, economics, sociology and politics, inspiring the whole study with the reverent and idealistic spirit of religion? Such books as Bakunin's "God and the State," "The Political Theory" of Mazzini and the "International," William James' "The Will to Believe," "The Varieties of Religious Experience," Josiah Royce's "The Philosophy of Loyalty," P. E. More's "Aristocracy and Justice," Bertrand Russell's "Paths to Freedom," D. H. MacGregor's "Evolution of Industry," E. Barker's "Political Thought in England From Herbert Spencer to Today," J. B. Bury's "History of Freedom of Thought," books by Hobhouse, Webb, Lenin, etc. Are the people up to this sort of thing, it may be asked. At any rate, thousands upon thousands are drifting about under the misdirection of eccentrics and "cranks," whom a reasonable and enthusiastic co-operation of church and college might keep somewhere near to standard and sensible lines of thought.

If it be objected that the church must deal only with the Bible or creeds drawn up in old, unhappy, far-off days, the answer is that the Bible was not embalmed and mummied in the fourth century, but has kept on growing ever since. The epistles of St. Paul to his congregations interpreting the gospel teaching for his time have been followed by successive interpretations of ideal living down to our day, and for modern people really to understand what Christianity means for them, they will do well to study under a wise direction from church and college the epistles of James to the Americans, Tolstol to the Russians, Russell to the English,

etc., as referred to above. None of these is perfect, but as attempts at vital interpretation of the human lot, they all call for criticism and application.

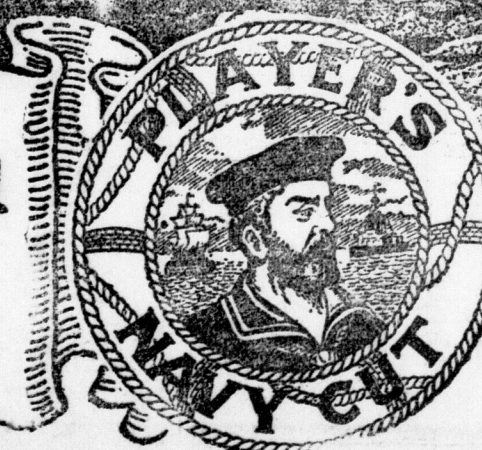

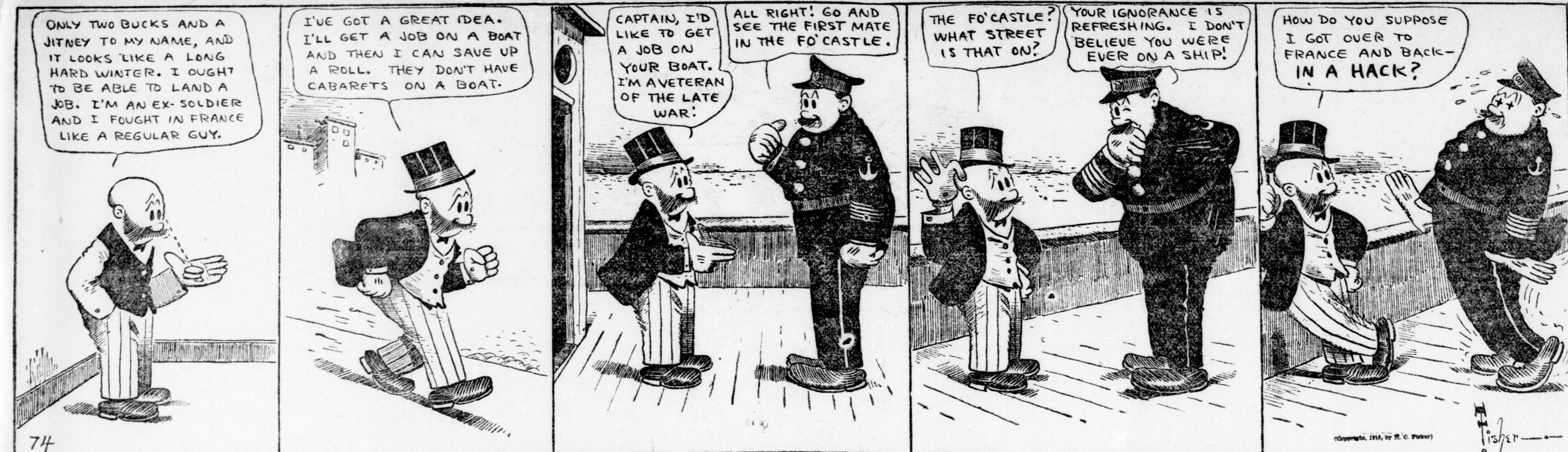

He is five feet two inches tall, and carries most of his weight above the waist. He has been aptly termed a pocket edition of Bob Fitzsimmons. His first bout in this country will be a ten-round no-decision contest probably at Milwaukee, Thanksgiving day, or the following week. Two other similar bouts are also tentatively planned for points near St. Paul, and on the Pacific coast during the Christmas holidays. Wilde is under contract to return to this city the first week in January to start training for his championship bout, and will probably select quarters in New Jersey at a point near a golf course, where he can play the game, which forms part of his regular training routine.

BURKHART OF ARGOS SUSPENDED BY BIG FOUR OFFICIALS

Said At Board Meeting He Would Get Even With Herscovitch, and Was Taken Seriously.

TORONTO, Nov. 10.—The board of governors of the Inter-Provincial Rugby Union have suspended "Babe" Burkart of the Argonauts for rough play when O'Brien, the Montreal halfback, was injured in the game in Montreal, and here two weeks ago.

The decision is a peculiar one inasmuch as the governors declare that while they think Burkart was responsible for the injury to O'Brien, they did not believe serious injury was intended. FREIGHT CAR FACTS FOR WINTER MONTHS VITAL TO SHIPPERS

Canada Railway Board Makes
Statement as to
Conditions.

The Canadian railway board has issued the following:

Three tons have fallen from the average load of the Canadian freight car. Instead of carrying 27.4 tons, as in 1914, the average car is now carrying only 24.4 tons. This does not mean a decrease in the total volume of freight moving, but an increase in the number of cars required to handle a given tonnage; an increase in the amount of tonnage (weight of cars less freight) to be handled in each train; an increase in the number of engines required, the crews on duty, the cost of consumption and the trackroom occupied. The reserve margin of cars and engines is thus diminished and an unfavorable situation created alike for the railways and the shippers. To the latter, it may therefore be of interest to consider the following review of the transportation situation and the prospect for the approaching winter.

Peace and Transportation.
The cessation of hostilities in Europe with its profound effect upon industry on the North American continent, as elsewhere, has had corresponding influence upon the traffic movements and railway problems. The task of moving munitions of war eastward was quickly replaced by the task of moving returning soldiers westward. Following a lull in all domestic freight movement, new currents of traffic set in tending to approximate, in some degree, the old movements prior to the war. On the whole, however, up to the first of July last, the transportation situation became easy. Cars were plentiful. The necessity for loading them to full capacity became less apparent and, in spite of warnings from this board, the average load dwindled seriously, as noted at the beginning of this article.

Conditions now, however, are not so satisfactory. In March and April, the usual movement of box cars from the wheat-growing areas commenced in both the United States and Canada. In the United States, where strikers in car repair departments were adding to the natural disadvantages of the "car pooling" arrangement, and where cars are, on the average, older than in Canada, the superior condition of Canadian box cars for carrying grain, led many of these cars into the American West, where the wheat movement begins in July, two months before the Canadian movement is under way. The balance of cars owing by the United States to Canada was thus increased materially, so that today there are approximately 42,000 Canadian box cars in the United States as against 19,000 American box cars in Canada; a net balance of 23,000 cars due Canada and unlikely for some time to be available to this country. This figure, it should be observed, is equal to over 15 per cent of the total Canadian box car supply.

The Loss Checked.
While this loss of cars to the United States has been checked and will ultimately be rectified by the return of the Canadian cars, serious additions to the volume of traffic to be handled by the Canadian roads are imminent. The shipment of coal from the Western Canadian mines since the beginning of the fuel year, on April 1, is, to date, only one-third of the amount forwarded in the same period last year. Movement by rail is correspondingly delayed and cars will be detained in the West accordingly. More serious still is the prospect that American ports will be closed this winter to Canadian exports. Sixty per cent of Canada's export grain usually passes out by American ports. This will remain to be handled across Canada to Montreal, St. John and Halifax in Canadian box cars—adding one hundred and fifty per cent to the volume of export grain now taken care of through the ports of the Dominion, and adding much more than 150 per cent in terms of car-miles.

The seven thousand new freight cars built since last year are not one-third of the number now detained in the United States. The additional requirements for coal carrying and for the wheat trade—if the proposed American action is taken—will be extremely serious. At this time of year, too, comes a heavy movement of perishable farm produce, moving before the cold weather will necessitate using special cars. Yet, in the face of these factors—the average load per car in Canada has fallen three tons!

Shippers, Attention!
The very serious attention of all Canadian shippers is called to this fact. It means that where eight cars were formerly required, nine are now necessary! Where 150 tons of tare-weight were thrown upon an engine for every 216 net tons of freight, there are now 180 tons! Labor scarcity, once the excuse for the light loading, is no longer a fact. It is important in the interests of the country, that the heavier loading practices be restored. Railway efficiency is part of your factory, mine, mill or warehouse efficiency.

How To Help.
The shipper can protect himself by:
1. Loading cars to the full visible or carrying capacity.
2. Prompt loading and release of the car.
3. Ordering cars only when actually needed.
4. Reducing the diversion and re-shipment of cars to a minimum.

WORK HAS COMMENCED ON OXFORD-COBALT MINES

COBALT, Nov. 10.—Work has been started on the Oxford-Cobalt claims which are situated in East Coleman in the vicinity of the Beaver and Temiskaming mines. The plans are to get the property in shape to start active mining and development work in the spring.

Work has been started laying the power line to the property and the erection of a hoist-house and clearing of the surface will be gone ahead with simultaneously.

The Oxford-Cobalt claims were staked a number of years ago by Professor Russell of Woodstock college and are about the last remaining claims in this wealthy silver area to be mined. Its position is promising, being almost directly opposite the excellent Kerr Lake Mine, with the Temiskaming and Beaver to the east of it.

The company claims that running through the entire length of its property is the most clearly defined fold and fault plane in Southeast Coleman. This fault plane has been traced from Kerr Lake across the diabase sill and runs the length of the Oxford-Cobalt property towards New Lake. Prof. Russell said that the outlook for his property is very similar to that of the Beaver, where three excellent rich veins have recently been found.

Only the assessment work necessary to secure the patents have been attempted, yet this work has disclosed a strong vein system on the surface. One of these veins is heavy with Cobalt ore, while native silver was discovered in another as a result of a shot placed in it.

DORCHESTER, Nov. 10.—Martin Nugent has sold his 50-acre farm on the north side of the railroad to Henry Barker for \$4,500. Robert Barr of Dorchester has purchased the fine property lately owned by Morris McMurray on the south side of the river for \$3,000. James Turpin of Dorchester has bought the estate of the late Hugh Willis, consisting of 150 acres for \$9,000.

ALL NEUTRALS DECIDE TO JOIN LEAGUE

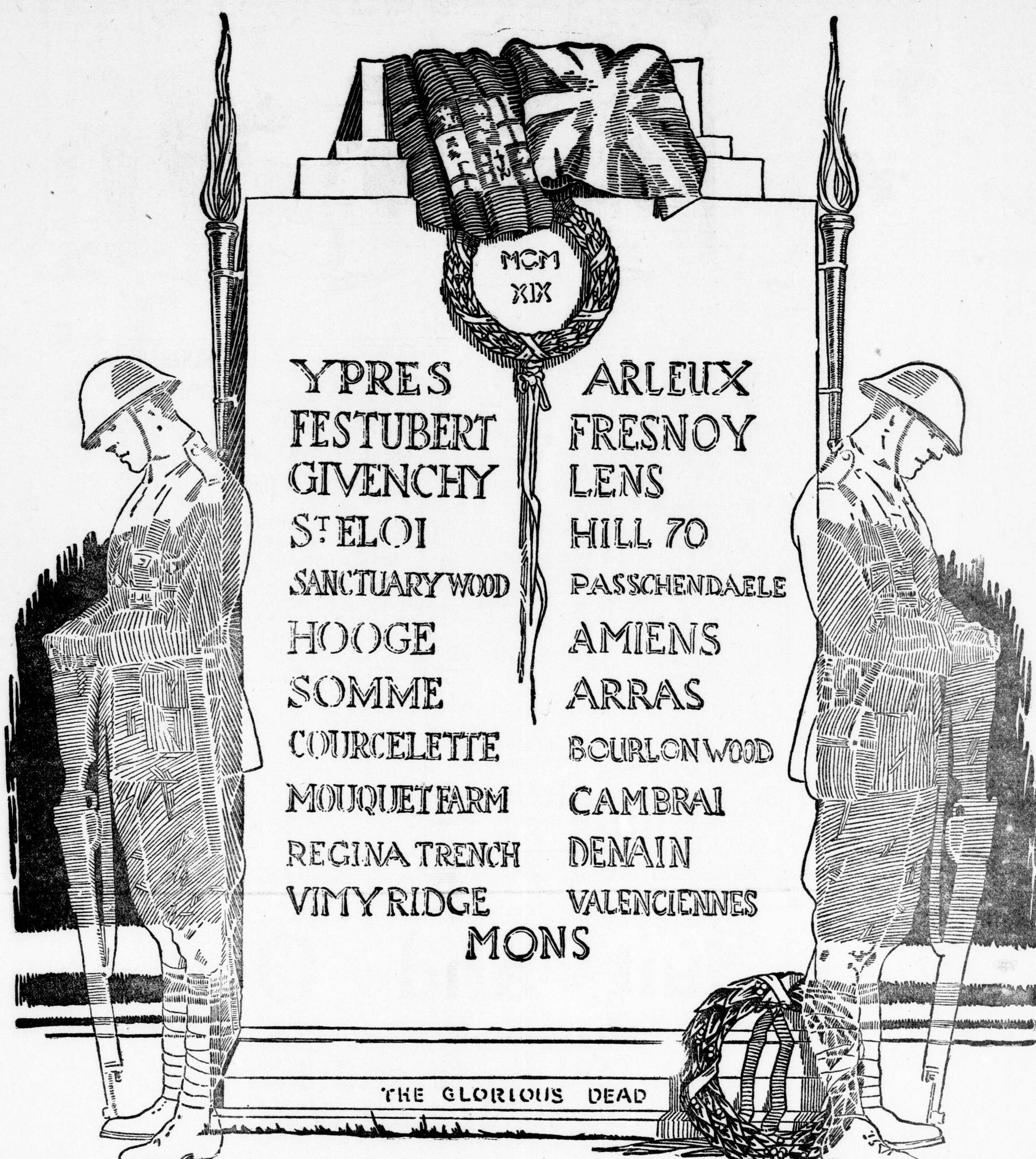

FIFTIETH BIRTHDAY OF SALVATION ARMY FITTINGLY OBSERVED

Pioneer Tells Interesting
Story of Organization.

VERY POPULAR ABROAD

In Korea and Japan Army
Has Proved of Great
Value.

Fifty years ago yesterday in London, England, the Salvation Army was born. Under the leadership of the great Gen. Booth, the small band of people grew, and in spite of the greatest opposition and hardships, spread throughout the world. Last night in the many countries where the operations have spread jubilee services were held in celebration of the 50th birthday of the organization.

The citadel on Clarence street last night was crowded to the doors when a novel and beautifully picturesque service was held by the united corps of the city. Commissioner W. J. Richards of Toronto, chief over Eastern Canada, was in London for the occasion, and his address was the feature of the program. Behind him, filling the stage, sat scores of young people dressed in the national costumes of various countries, and in the dress of the different branches of activities carried on by the army.

Friend of Gen. Booth. Commissioner Richards is one of the big men of the Salvation Army, being connected with it during its early struggles in old London and the various cities of England. He was closely connected with the late Gen. Booth in his work, his son being its private secretary of the general during the last seven years of the great organizer's life.

After leaving England, Commissioner Richards visited and worked for the army in practically every country in the world, including the South Sea Islands, and so was well able to give a vivid account of the work and a general sketch of the history of the Salvation Army in a highly humorous and instructive address.

He said that although he had been agnostic to the extreme in his younger days, he was converted on the third night after attending his first meeting of the Salvation Army. He was selected by Gen. Booth to go out and conduct meetings soon after, though he had very little experience. However, it was a way with the general to throw men in, and so make them either sink or swim.

His Experiences. He told of his many humorous experiences while conducting his first meetings among the roughest elements of London and other English cities. If he could not convince a man in any other way he would pull his long hair down over his eyes, and, glaring through it, would intimidate him. Many various ways were tried in making converts.

Commissioner Richards said that he saw the first band of the army organized, and this prompted him to start one on his own account, and so he was personally responsible for the second band of the Salvation Army. This band is still in existence, although many of the original members have died, but their children have grown up and taken their places.

He told of the work carried on in foreign countries. After leaving England he went to the island of Java. After carrying on work here among the natives, the army was requested by the Dutch authorities to take over the instruction of the colony of lepers on the island, who up to this time had been given no consideration. The army was able to better the condition of these unfortunates. Many of the victims were converted. From this island the operations spread to other islands of the Pacific.

Improved Conditions. In Korea the Salvation Army is looked on by the natives as a protector. In Japan it is regarded with a friendly spirit. At one time Japanese girls could be sold by their parents into houses of ill-fame, and the law of the country prohibited them from leaving this life of shame. Through the efforts of the army, backed by an influential paper of the country, the law was repealed, and 50,000 girls were given the opportunity of leaving the life.

He dealt at some length with the work in Russia, where he said that it is feared many numbers have become martyrs, meeting their death at the hands of the Bolsheviks. Remarkable strides have been made in China, Finland and Denmark. Much work is being done among the black heathens of Africa, and among the natives of India. Never before has the work flourished as it has at the present time.

Singing and a recitation completed the program.

EAST MIDDLESEX IS FAR-BEHIND AS LOAN CAMPAIGN NEARS END

Lucan, Biddulph and Dorchester Doing Well, But Only
54.20 Per Cent Sub-
scribed.

East Middlesex took another bounce upward in the campaign for \$1,150,000, subscribing \$53,650 for 77 bond applications Monday. However, the county is still a long way behind its objective, as, with over two-thirds of the time gone, it has subscribed but 54.20 per cent of its goal. The total number of applications to date is 811.

Lucan, Biddulph and Dorchester are doing well, especially Lucan, which is expected to reach the 100 per cent class today. Biddulph and Dorchester are making a steady climb, and should be among those present with honor flags when the campaign closes Saturday night. Lobo and Nissouri are the weak spots so far, but Lobo was away behind last year at this particular time and came with such a rush at the finish that the township was at the top of the heap at the end.

Organizer G. E. Cork stated last night that any person wishing to invest in a bond and who has been overlooked by a canvasser merely has to phone county headquarters in London at his (Mr. Cork's) expense, and a canvasser would be immediately sent out. The county phone number is 1751.

LABOR'S INDORSATION OF THE PLAYGROUNDS QUESTION IS SOUGHT

Public Will Be Supplied With
Plenty of Information Be-
fore Vote Is Taken.

At the meeting of the playgrounds committee held yesterday afternoon in the chamber of commerce, it was reported that the educational or publicity campaign preparations are progressing apace, and every phase concerning the city playgrounds question will be clearly explained in various ways to the ratepayers before the January elections. The meeting, which was attended by representatives of the local branch of

the Social Service Council, the Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Club and Mothers' Club, was of routine nature. Several committees were appointed to office. A delegation, consisting of the following members, will wait upon the trades and labor council at its next meeting to solicit the support of that organization. Morley Adams, Rev. J. G. Stewart, T. D. McCullough, C. Rowntree.

Merchants of the city will be approached by James Gray, A. McLeish and C. Rowntree and asked to give space in their newspaper advertisement for a small display of reading matter advocating the adoption of the playgrounds scheme. The advertising committee consists of E. V. Buchanan, A. F. Nash and W. E. Kelly, who will shortly plan the publicity campaign.

Attention was also paid the other advertising medium—public speaking—and a speaker's committee was formed, under the leadership of Mrs. John Gemmell of the Mothers' Club and Social Service Council, local branch. The other members elected are Jared Vining, E. R. Dennis, John Cottam, A. F. Nash and Adjut. J. Martin of the Salvation Army. The support of the clergy will be sought by T. D. McCullough. It was reported that the Independent Labor Council has already pledged its hearty support.

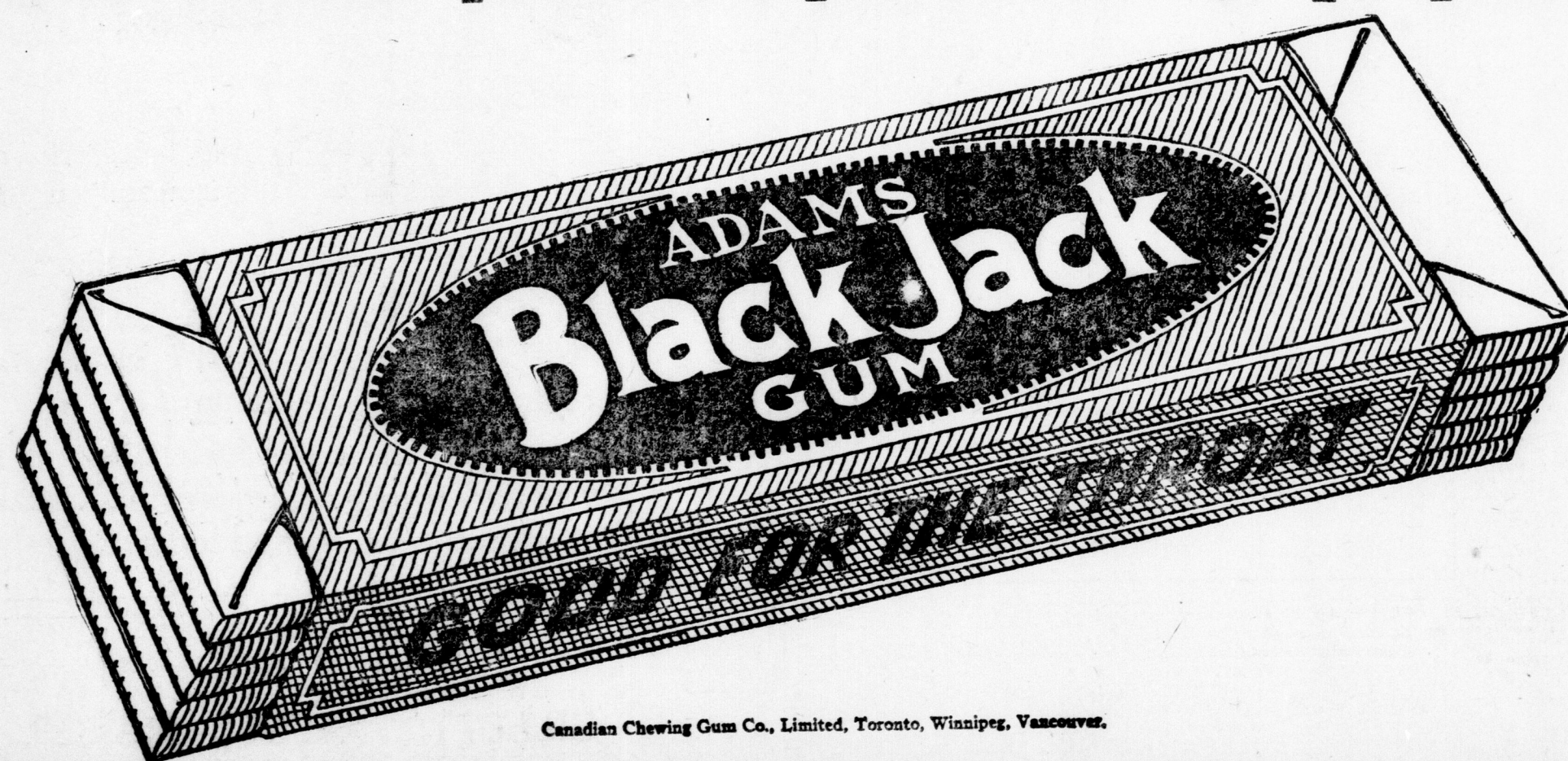

Building Figures Are Nearing \$2,000,000 Mark for the Year

Building figures for the month have reached the total of \$25,865. This, added to the total of the previous months, \$1,974,010, brings the total for the year to \$1,999,875, only a short distance from the \$2,000,000 mark.

For Paper says the figures will pass this by the end of the year.

A permit was issued Monday for the largest house which the London housing commission has undertaken to build so far. This is a two-story brick veneer

dwellling for R. S. Simmons on Charlotte street. It was designed by A. M. Piper and is being built by E. Moyer at a cost of \$3,430.

Thomas Linnore is building a one-story brick house on Langarth street at a cost of \$2,200. Mrs. J. Plasted is building two houses on Pleasantly street. Each will cost \$2,500, and will be two-story brick veneer dwellings.

Grafton & Co. are enlarging their store front at a cost of \$1,500.

CHINESE NATIONALISTS HAVE FORMED LEAGUE

Rooms Opened on Clarence Street Saturday.

Charlie Chau is the president of the Chinese Nationalists' League formed in this city and opened on Saturday. The office of the league is located on Clarence street in the rooms formerly occupied by the H. D. S. Association.

Almost every large city in the Dominion has a league of this sort. It is organized for the advancement of the Chinese in this city of whom there are no small number, and to aid those Chinese who might be in distress at any time or to assist in placing Chinese who come to the city from outside places.

CITY FISH MARKET HAS NO NOTIFICATION OF DAY AND NO FISH TO SELL

Although today is national fish day, the day adopted by the Government to popularize the consumption of fish, no notification has been given to the city fish market and no extra supply of fish has been received for the occasion.

Only four hundred pounds of fish were received on Saturday instead of the usual six to nine hundred. Yesterday not a fish graced the city stall in the market house. For today the personnel of the market was absolutely ignorant

of the fact that it is to be the national fish day.

The information when the day is to be celebrated usually is received from Toronto, and an extra supply of fish is received by the municipal market. Last year over a ton of fish was sold on that day, being double the amount for the average daily sale.

Great trouble is being experienced in securing enough fish to fill the daily demand at the present time. Storms on the Great Lakes are given as a reason for this. Some whitefish is still being received from Lake Nipigon, but cold weather and snow prevail in Northern Ontario.

Other fish markets in the city report they were prepared for the day, and claim that they are able to fill the demand day to day.
