When Mr. McMullen, commonly known as "Pointer" McMullen, was going to his work in the pork factory, he discovered the body of Wright in the water in a hole about 60 feet west of the Wonham street bridge. The hole is one of many "pike holes" in the neighborhood, and is of considerable depth. The body was standing erect, and was completely covered by water. On removal it was found to be that of Isaiah Wright. The face was somewhat swollen, but otherwise the body was almost in a normal condition.


