# SKY RACING BALLOON LANDS NEAR HAMILTON

Major Hersey's Balloon Decends After Splendid Trip -Travelled Over Six Hundred Miles-Was

Seen in Chatham

Washington D. C. and A. G. Absebett, landed 18 miles south of here early last evening, after a day's flight.

across Western Ontario, which was watched by thousands of people.

After crossing Michigan, the balloon was seen in East Dover Township, four miles north of the mouth of the Thames River, yesterday aftermoon. It then traveled west to Chatham, and was afterwards seen at Highgate, Elidgetown and Port Stanley. Coming east to Point Bruce promontory, the balloon was only 300 feet above terra firma, the ballast evidently giving out. At 6.13 p. m. it was reported at Caledonia and a few minutes later it landed.

The United States crossed the State of Hilmois, thence across Lake Michigan and Lake St. Clair, in the middle of Lake Eric, when a change of wind earlied it north into Canada, to the place of landing.

The distance from St. Louis to Hamilton, on an airline, is approximately 620 miles. Therefore the United States traveled about 610 miles, which is far ahead of the record made in the European race by Lieut. Lahm, whose balloon won the international cup by sailing from Paris to a point in England, 402 miles distant.

LACROSSE IN AUSTRALIA.

The Canadian lacrosse team sailed for Western Australia on Saturday after the third test match on the Adelaide oval. For some reasons it is just as well they are gone, for if there remained further contests to be fought here the arcoedingly bad temper manifested on Saturday might have developed into bitter feeling, and if in the meantime the peacemaker had not intervened the public would have attended the next match in expectation of seeing a series of fights instead of an interesting international contest on the lacrosse field. The Canadians are assustomed to a rough style of play, but some of them in the field on Saturday behaved with inexcasable brushity.

Unpleasant Incidents,
A number of unpleasant incidents happened during the game for which the oversea team were responsible. During the first quarter Camplin was punished by being ordered off the ground for five minutes for a most deliberate break of the rules hitting an opponent on the head with his lacrosse. Immediately after Camplin left the ground, Grace, another Camadian, caught the ball and threw it right amongst the crowd in the southern stand, as if to manifest his disagreement with the decision of the referee, Mr. R. W. Sellars, in penalizing Camplin. It is evident that rough play is a feature of Canadian lacrosse, for the members of the team all wear padded caps, padded jerseys, and gloves, but in Australia followers of the pastime find it possible to enjoy the game without introducing such roughness, as to necessitate padding for protection.

Ralsuli Threatens to Retaliate For French Interference

Tangier, Oct. 22.—The first conflict between the forces of the rival Sultans, Abd-el-Aziz and Mulai Hafid, between the forces of the rival Sultans, Abd-el-Aziz and Mulai Hafid, occurred Oct. 17 near Hettat, between Shawla and Mequinez, according to reliable reports received here from Mazagan with the result that a detachment of troops fighting with Mulai Hafid, the Sultan of the South, and consisting of eight regiments under Mulai Rachid and known as the first division, defeated the forces of Abd-el-Aziz, the Sultan of the North, and captured Kaid Bushta Bagdani, the commander-in-chief of all Abd-el-Aziz's forces in the field, who had with him eight pieces of modern field artillery. The favorable effect of this yictory to the standing of Mulai Hafid is incalculable.

During the night of Oct. 17 some of Mulai Hafid's men made a third raid on the custom house at Mazagan and seized 100,000 cartridges, and on the following night they made a fourth raid on the same place and captured 300,000 more cartridges.

The first division of the Imperial troops, consisting of 800 men, destined for Mogador, arrived at Tangler yesterday. Communication with Mogador is interrupted.

Some of Raisuli's followers have deserted him and come to Tangler. The native report of the occurrence gives as a reason for the desertion that Raisuli in retaliation for the French interference in the steps taken to secure the release of Kaid Sir Harry MacLean, "intends to kill MacLean by inches."



The Vote That Beat Him When

The Famous Chief Justice Was a Great Lawyer With a Short Political Career — Washington's Snub and Subsequent Frank Apology.

Judge Marshall was not only a great lawyer, but he was a fighter and militant to the last degree. Some insight into his character may be gained from his letters, one of which, dated March 27, 1794, is in the possession of his granddaughters. It was addressed to Archibald Shuart, a lawyer of Statuston, Va., and a friend of Marshall. The second was with England, which did not actively begin until 1812, was already brewing, and it was no small tribute to Marshall's prescience that he was able to detect trouble so far in advance.

"Seriously," he wrote, "there appears to me every day to be more folly, envy, malice and damned rascality in the world than there was the day before, and I do verily begin to think that plain, downright honesty and unintriguing integrity will be kicked out of doors. No more faithful body servant ever lived, however, and the chief justice included in his will a bequest for his trusty valet, who was to have a room in the servants' build-ing on Marshall street all his life and a woman to wait on him when he should become old and feeble.

Once John Marshall was induced to

undertake a political career, and it proved the most bitter experience of his life. In 1798, the year before Gen-eral Washington died, he summoned Marshall to Mount Vernon. Washing-ton knew Marshall net only as a man of wonderful ability, but also as a Federalist in politics. Washington was anxious to strengthen the Federalist party in congress, and his purpose in inviting Marshall to Mount Vernon was ington, with considerable heat, abrupt-ly bade Marshall good night. At sun-rise the next morning Marshall arose, rise the next morning Marshall arose, intending to make his way to the Mount Vérnon stables and ride off, trusting to time to heal the breach. He tells the magistrate also that he threw a Eucharistic dove, one of the missing treasures, into the River Seine, near the Font des Arts, the day before he surrendered.

Thomas has declared that he received a commission of \$500 for this statue, which subsequently was said to have been sold in the United States by a Paris dealer.

# FRENCH ARE REPULSED

Moorish Troops Equipped With Field Guns Attack Camp

Paris, Oct. 23.—A despatch received from Admiral Philibert, the French naval commander in Moroccan waters, said the 5,000 Moors who attacked the French recomolitering party recently belonged to the army under the command of Mulai Rachid. Rachid did his utmost to prevent this attack, but his men could not be controlled. Gen Drude, who came to the rescue, pursued the aggressors for four miles and inflicted severe losses upon them. Col. Defretay, the commander of the recomolitering party, is held partly responsible for the incident; he had gone beyond the limit of operations fixed in his instructions. The colonel has been placed under arrest for a period of thirty days.

fagnificent Spectacle-Electric Plant Illumines Scene Hitherto Shrouded After Sunset-Huge Searchlights of Many Colors Enhance Beauty of London, Oct. 22.—Prolonged earthquake slocks beginning at 5 o'clock yesterday morning and lasting for several hours have been recorded on the instruments on the Isle of Wight, and at Laibach, Austria. The distance of the disturbance is estimated at over 3,000 miles. Telegrams received here from St. Petersburg report earth shocks in Central Asia, at Lattajurgan, Samarakand, Khokand, and elsewhere, which caused the injury or collapse of many buildings. At Samarakand the shocks lasted intermittently from early morning until yesterday afternoon. Two women were killed by falling houses, and the population of Samarakand is now camping out. of Nature's Great Show-Thousands

All the folks of Niagara Falls crossed the river into Canada on a recent evening to see their great water falls illuminated by J. Il5,000,000 candle power. The figures sound big, but they are accurate and in keeping with all the other statistics concerning Niagara, says a Niagara Falls correspondent of The New York Post.

The procession over the border was led, at least figuratively, by Anthony C. Douglass, mayor of the city of Niagara Falls. He brought about the illumination as an experiment. If his people approve, the New York town will buy the plant for \$100,000 and will maintain it as a municipal enterprise at a cost of about \$3,000 a year. To be perfectly frank, it is to be a great spectacular advertisement for Niagara Falls and the nearby places on the Canadian side.

W. D'A. Ryan, the illuminating engineer of the General Electric Co., is the man who has done this thing. He evidently anticipated objection and explained that he had never lost sight of Niagara as it is and headn't for one moment thought he could improve upon it. He simply sought to continue nature's great show after dark. He promises, and so does Mayor Douglass, that no brand of whisky or patent medicine shall ever be fiashed upon the cascade or worked out in colored lights upon the clouds of mist. So, after all, the illumination does not cheapen America's great Niagara. It merely cheate the night by turning it into day all up and down the gorge. It gives wonderful timts to the falls themselves and to the vapor above them. The sensational feature of the night light is that it is concentrated on the locaning waters of the American and Canadian falls, making them stand out dasslingly distinct against the blackness of the grim rock cliffs between and on the outer sides.

The batteries of illumination consist of fifty powerful searchlights equipped with both thrity inch and sixty inch projectors and operated by electrical engines of 300 horsepower. Their combined light is the equivalent of that of light visible for 125 miles.

The romance of a diamond valued at from \$100,000 to \$150,000 is occupying the attention of the Indian courts. It was stolen in 1842 from Shah Suja, the amir of Afghanistan, and is said to have brought misfortune upon each of its successive owners.

It was stated that the present amir, hearing of its reappearance, claimed it, and that the Indian Government retused to consider the claim. The Government, however, is in no wise concerned with the disposal of the diamond, which, whatever its previous history, is known to have been for nearly a quarter of a century the property of an old Afghan chief, Amir Uddowlah, who showed it wrapped in ancient cloth to various Europeans in India.

Amir Uddowlah died, leaving, like most Afghan sirdars, a large family. Some of his relations are now in Kabul, others in Turkestan, others in India, and the settlement of the competing claims to the estate, including this intrinsically very valuable diamond, which is one of the principal assets, has devolved upon the civil court of Rawal Pindi, which is unable to surrender the stone until the usual legal formalities are fulfilled—the consent of all the heirs, for example, being necessary before it could be made over to the amir's permanent agent in India, who, it is understood, has made some offer for it.
