THE STRIKES OF THE FUTURE.
The March 31st of transportation to be abolished and the Ballot to Regulate.
SCANTON, Pa., June 9.—Powderly denies that he has been captured by the Communists, and further, that he is to march to the front with his views in regard to strikes, etc., overruled at the Cleveland convention. However, he says, no local assembly of the Knights of Labor can inaugurate a strike until the members have first voted on the question by secret ballot. Each man must record his verdict, after which the executive board of the district will be called in, and will endeavor to effect a settlement by arbitration. So that a strike is not to be undertaken except as a last resort. Not only that; every week during the continuation of a strike the men will vote secretly whether they will continue to do so. The feeling of the order is strongly against strikes. If a strike erupts beyond a district in which it originated, it becomes a matter for the General Executive Board to determine.
