## The Teaching of Languages

- IN THE municipal schools in Nova Scotia it is customary for the student to begin the study of French and Latin in the seventh and tomary for him, when matriculating after five and four years of work in each language, to have the slighest command of neither,-not sufficient of French to ask for a piece of bread and butter in the tongue, nor of Latin to comprehend and appreciate the simplest classical author. It is indeed unusual if he have these attainments upon graduating with a college degree.

Though French is the native tongue of wenty-four percent of the population of Canada, whe speaking the fit to employ teachers capable of speaking ther lavguage. And three strikes on them from the beginning.
