London, March 30.—The Germans attacking yesterday at Demuin and Mezieres pressed back the British from Mezieres, the War Office announced. All the enemy's attempts to capture Demuin broke down after sharp fighting which lasted through the afternoon.

The statement follows:

"North of the Somme only local actions have taken place. South of the Somme the enemy's attacks yesterday at Demuin and Mezieres succeeded in pressing back our troops from the latter village. We'secured a number of prisoners in our counterattacks. At Demuin all the enemy's attempts to capture the village broke down after sharp fighting which lasted throughout the afternoon.

"During the past week our calvary have fought with great gallantry, both mounted and dismounted, and repulsed the enemy, inflicted heavy losses on him in numerous engagements."

Military Service Act

Important Announcement to All

KEMPTED and to the Public Generally

N dealing with the very large number of claims for exemption brought forward for consideration in connection with Class 1 under the Military Service Act, it has occurred, as was inevitable, that as a result of false statements and difficulties put in the way of investigation, some individuals have secured exemption

whose proper place is in the Army. It is not the intention of the Government to allow these men to evade permanently their obligation to bear their part in the military defence of the Country and of the ideals for which we are fighting, To do so would defeat the purpose of the Act, and cause grave injustice to men in the second class necessarily called out to fill their places,

Exemptions Granted on False Grounds

It is, therefore, proposed to scrutinize carefully all exemptions granted to date in order to separate those which have been granted on false or insufficient grounds from those that are well founded,

With this object in view the various Registrars under the Military Service Act have been instructed to issue a series of questionnaires to exempted men. These questionnaires must be filled up correctly and returned promptly under penalty of forfeiture of exemption for failure to do so.

Exempted Men Who Have Changed Address

It is therefore important in their own interest that all exempted men who have changed their address since their exemption was granted and who have not already notified the Registrar of such change should notify him at once. \ Under the Regulations it is the duty of exempted men to keep the Registrar advised of any change of address, and failure to receive the questionnaire by reason of neglect of this duty must be treated as equivalent to failure to return the questionnaire after receipt.

Citizens Urged to Assist

In many instances information has been furnished by members of the public which has led to the cancellation of exemptions obtained by false or misleading statements. Further co-operation of this character is invited. The Government regard it as the Duty of all loyal citizens, not only to the Country, but to the men at the front, to assist in this way in securing reinforcements on a just and legal basis. Correspondence of this character will' be treated as strictly confidential and will receive the fullest investigation.

Get away for a moment from the clamour of the street; go into your room, at once, or to-night if you are not now at home, and ask yourself this question:

"Have I actually done anything that could count as National Service for my country during the forty bloody months of her suffering?"

Put down in hours the actual time that you have worked. Then, if before your conscience you can say, fearlessly, that you have done a man's service to your country, well and good-we know that you will do even more. But if there is the thought drumming through your mind that all-everythingthat you have done, is a mere nothing, just a sop to conscience, then as you are worthy of your manhood, make a speedy decision to devote the next few months of your life to National Service.

Outside of our armed forces only one kind of civilian labour ranks as National Service for men. That is Service on a farm.

That is why the Government in all seriousness exempted the farmer and the farmer's helper from military service.

If you are not quite sure whether your work could be done by a woman consult the list of occupations. These do not include all occupations. There are many others.

Sheer necessity urges that many men in these occupations should give place immediately to women, while they, the men, take up farm work temporarily.

This applies particularly to single men who can move with little or no inconvenience. Positions can also be found for married men who wish to move their families to the country.

Organized Labour Endorses This Crusade---Remember That !

In a memorandum to members they specifically, as a matter of national necessity, agree to:

(a) The exemption from compulsory military service of all farm help.

(b) The substitution of female for male help in order that certain classes of male help may be released for essential National Labour Service, that is, Farm Labour.

(c) The stipulation that women who temporarily replace men who go upon the farm shall receive the same pay for service equal to the man replaced, so that the rates of wages for men shall not be lowered.

Farm Wages are Good

At present farm wages with board are in many cases equal to, if not better, than city wages without board. So that the handicap of wages should not be magnified.

A day of reckoning is coming; a day when that irresistible force, Public Opinion, will judge a man by his work, and will judge employers by the work they are retaining men to do.

Men and women will look hard at the clerks in stores, offices, warehouses and factories. We are down to elementals to-day, and our people will not tolerate the thought that while so many of our sons are perishing in

the bloody struggle in France, so many men are doing work that can easily and efficiently be done by women without sacrifice to their womanhood or health.

Remember Your Effort is Voluntary

The production of food is the paramount work of Canada to-day.

In going to work upon a farm, the farm is actually your channel of National Service. That is the attitude you should take towards the matter.

We owe it to our nationhood and to our Allies, who stand with us through the Ordeal by Battle to see that no effort is spared to insure to them a sufficient food supply.





CHICKEN FEEDING

Advice To Poultry Raisers-How to Care for the Young Chicks

The young chick is a very interesting creature. As soon as it is hatched it knows how to eat. It is no sooner able to stand up then it begins to pick at small objects. Instinct has taught it to search for

Although the little chick seems to want food almost as soon as it is hatched it should not be fed until about thirty-six hours later. The reason for this is because the chick has a supply of food within its bedray street of the chick had a supply of food within its bedray street of the chick had a supply of food within its body sufficient for about a day after it is hatched. The chick has been developed from the contents of the egg, and at hatching time a nor-tion of the yolk is still left. This portion of the unabsorbed yolk serves as food for the chick for some

time after hatching. Feed little at a time, but feed often. The chicks should receive their first feed, then, when they are about thirty-six hours old. One of the most important things to bear in mind is to feed the chicks a little at a time; One of the greatest dangers in feeding chicks is in giving them too much at one The chick can ony digest a little food at a time. For this reason the chicks should be fed small amounts at each feeding, but they should be

fed eften. Another important rule in feeding chicks is to make them take plenty of exercise. It is natural for chicks to search for food and so some of the tood given them should be fid in fine straw or other material where they will have to scratch for t. Exercise ten'ds to keep the chicks

in good health.

The Method of Feeding.

The chicks should first be given some grit, such as clean sand, and some water or sour skim milk. The sour skim milk is a very good food for chicks, and it tends to keep them

in a healthy condition.

The first grain feed given should be a moistened mash made up of some of the ground grains. A good mash is made up of four parts of bran, four parts of oatmeal, two parts commeal, one part middlings. one part beef scraps and one part chick grit. All these parts are by weight and the different materials weight and the different materials are mixed thoroughly. The mixture is just slightly moistened with water or sour milk if it can be obtained. This moistened mash is fed to the chicks three times a day, morning, moon and evening, for several days. During the same period the chicks are fed in the middle of the forenoon a mixture of four parts bread coumbs and one part of hard boiled egg and in the middle of the efteregg and in the middle of the afternoon they are fed outmeal. That is, the chicks are fed five times every day and this rate of feeding is continued until the chicks are about five weeks old. The order of feeding is mash in the morning. bread and egg mixture in the mid-die of the forenoon, mash at noon, catmeal in the middle of the after-

SEED CORN SITUATION

upplies in Western Ontario This Year Insufficient For Needs

Supplies of seed corn usually available in Western Ontario for Canadian ensilage growers are this year insufficient to meet local requirements. The seed corn crop of the more northern States is also insufficient to supply home needs, which leaves as the only source of supply to Canadian ensilage growers the late varieties grown in or south of Kansas, Missouri, Tennessee and Virginia. These late varieties include Red Cob, Mastodon and Mammoth Southern Sweet, which, although giving a large tonnage per acre, are somewhat low in dry matter and make silage of rather poor quality. However, the ensilage growers of Eastern Ontario and the southern part of Quebec may this year consider themselves fortunate in obtaining even late varieties of seed corn. In districts where only the early varieties can be grown successfully, farmers may grow oats and vetches for ensilage or hay.

Canadian seed corn dealers negotiate their purchases direct with United States seedsmen and send their orders through the Toronto office of the Seed Purchasing Commission for confirmation and assistance in securing export permits and transportation. Dealers are allowed a net profit not exceeding five per cent. on carlots and seven and a half per cent. on less than carlots in wholesale quatities. Prices are not fixed, but will depend on the market when others are placed.




