Capital is naturally timid, and does not advertise itself, ordinarily, as being ready to jump into anything and everything which comes along. Capitalists are like the Missourian-they require to be shown; and it must be conceded that, under existing conditions, it is a matter of difficulty to demonstrate, to a shrewd investor, good reasons for placing large sums of money in this country.

The resources are here, which should and would guarantee large returns for every dollar invested here, were it not for the laws which so hedge the mine operator about, that he is in many instances practically helpless.

It will be remembered that, during the winter, many learned dissertations upon the subject of meat appeared in the columns of our contemporary, the News. The News' "beef editor" became very much alarmed at the dire results which were bound to follow from an overstocked meat supply in Dawson. We had it from the veracious narrator that, when spring opened, hundreds of carcasses of beef would be given away, and other hundreds thrown into the river, as a result of the high prices which prevailed for meat during the winter. 
