It is a fact, upon which there can be no argument, that title to mining property, the value of which runs into hundreds thousands of dollars, may be through failure to observe insig. nificant technicalities in the law. Such features of the regulations furnish multitudinous opportuni tics for the professional litigant and. natio ply, make the investo wary of placing his money wher it will be subject to loss from such causes.
The exactions of the govern ment, levied upon the miner and claim owner at every turn they make, have become so we known in the money center that, as a result, the opinion holds that investments in the Klondike are doubtful propos tions, even where the groun involved is known to be rich Capital is naturally timid, and does not advertise itself, ordinarily, as being ready io fump into anything and eve $y$ thing which comes along. Cajutalists are like the Missourian-they require to be shown; and it must be conceded that, under e evisting conditions, it is a matter of diffiluy to demonstrate, to a shrewd ing large sums of money in this country
The resources are here, which should and would guarantee large returns for every dollar invested here, were it not for the laws which so hedge the mine operator about, that he is in many instances practically helpless
