3.-Books must be returned within fourteen days from date of issue; i not, a fine of 50 cents will be made for each additional week or part of a

4 -Books must be returned in as good condition as when issued, otherwise the librarian has power to

charge for damage done. 5.-Books will only be issued and received back at certain hours each day, excluding Sundays and holidays such hours to be posted in the lib-
