Bay Halifax Co. is one of the companies that three residents of that community perished by drowning on Monday. They are Thomas Boutillier, Alexander Martin and Robert Martin, the two latter being brothers. Their smashed, overturned boat came ashore in the surf yesterday and definitely confirmed the fears that had been aroused by their absence for several days.

The three men had gone out to haul their nets off shore. At first there was not much alarm over their non-return as the weather being squally and the distance the boat had gone from the bay being about three miles, it was thought they might have put in to some cove along the shore. But on Wednesday their failure to return confirmed the fears that they had been drowned, in the heavy seas running on Monday, and all doubts were set at rest by finding the boat yesterday.

Thomas Boutillier was about 28 years of age, Alexander Martin was 30 years of age, and Robert Martin 15. Mr. Boutillier's parents are living and an aged father survives the Martin boys. None of the bodies have yet been recovered and owing to the gale which has swept the coast the last three days, little attempt could be made to search for them.

Lies on Bottom of the Annapolis

Digby, October 20.—The schooner E. Mayfield, with a cargo of 60,000 brick for the St. John Sugar refineries; lies at the bottom of the Annapolis river, submerged, twenty feet at low water. Captain Burton Merriman, who owned and sailed the schooner and his three young sons, who formed the crew, had a close call from watery graves, getting away in the boat as the vessel was going down. The youngest son, a mere boy, was snatched from his sleep in a bunk just in the nick of time. The Mayfield left the brickyards of the Nova Scotia Clay Works before daylight on Sunday morning, using only motor power. The engine broke down and this left the vessel at the mercy on the ebb tide. The Mayfield struck one of the new ice piers in the middle of the river, making a gaping hole in the hull, and after remaining afloat five minutes went to the bottom off Allen's Creek. The captain and crew lost all their belongings. Much sympathy is expressed for Captain Merriman, who was well known here and all the Bay of Fundy ports. He is having lots of trouble this year. Recently he was the loser in a heavy law suit at Parrsboro, his home town, and his wife now lies at the point of death in Parrsboro. There is very little, if any, insurance on the vessel.

TAKE WISE PRECAUTIONS

There appears to be quite a general epidemic of Typhoid in different parts of this province. While Kentville has escaped it is, considered wise that precautions should be taken so as to prevent this disease from getting a start here. The recent heavy rains have overflowed all the brooks, watercourses and fields and naturally the surface drain age will have a tendency to pollute the waters from which cows drink and the water supply is obtained. To be on the safe side we have been asked to request the citizens to boil all drinking water and milk as well. Better to take extra and perhaps unnecessary precautions now than to let typhoid get a foothold here as it has in Halifax and other places.

Poultry Meeting

This evening in the Court House Prof. Landry, of Truro, an expert on Poultry, will deliver an address which will be of great interest to all breeders and others who relish poultry and their products. This meeting will probably lead to the formation in this county of a Poultry Association, a thing that is much needed to encourage this most important industry. The experimental farm here has added a branch in poultry raising and Mr. Bouden a young man who is enthusiastic and competent in the work has taken charge. This work will be conducted for the benefit of poultry growers and now seems the proper time to make a forward movement in poultry raising. The home market for fowls and eggs is good, and there seems to be no better adjunct to successful farming than this. All interested are invited to attend at the Court House tonight to hear Prof. Landry.

Destructive Fire at Wolfville

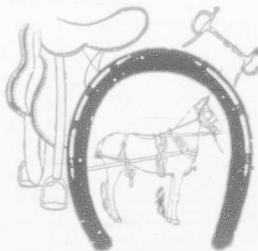

The Panama Canal

Panama, October 17.—The first lockage at the Pacific end of the Panama Canal occurred yesterday when the tug Miraflores, three barges and two other crafts were raised together through the west flight of the Miraflores Locks, 36,85 feet above the sea level.

The lockage was made without a hitch, all the machinery working with the same precision as obtained in a similar operation at Gatun Locks, recently. In this connection the mistake is frequently made of supposing that the waters of the Atlantic flow into the Pacific and vice versa. It is not so. By means of locks vessels will be raised to the highest of the lakes in the mountains between the oceans and by the same means were do to the sea on either side as the case may be.

Oats Create a New War Scare

A war scare has been started in Berlin by a statement in the usually well-informed newspaper, the Lokalanzeiger, that France is hoarding war stores.

In the last two months, according to the story, France has secretly bought in Germany 8,000 tons of oats as food for French army horses, as against only 100 tons of German oats purchased by France in the first six months of the current year. Four thousand tons were bought in July and 4,000 tons in August.

It is also asserted by the paper that 36,000 tons of wheat in July and 3,000 tons in August found its way from Germany to France, to be eaten, of course, by the French army. "Suspicion arose some time ago," adds the Lokalanzeiger, "that France's unexplained demand for wheat and oats could only be for war stores. If one compares France's recent importations from Germany with her importations in the same period last year, there can be no possible doubt that these are a provision in case of war." —Pioneer.
